





Fixing Up . the Farm by BURTON WILLIAMS

Exterminating Rats

WITH grain and food conserva with grain and food conserva-tion a pressing need today, one of the prime considerations of nearly every farmer should be ex-termination of rats. The annual damage to feed and flocks inflicted by rats amounts to millions of dol-lars. Not only do rats consume and spoil feed, but they kill chicks, spread diseases and damage buildings.

Number 1 on your program of rat extermination should be clean-ing up trash piles and refuse of all kinds, especially in and near farm buildings. Then prepare for the kill by placing unpoisoned bait at locations frequented by rats. Repeat this operation for several nights to coax the rat population out in force. Meat or fish is good bait, being a change of pace from the rats' usual grain diet. After lulling the rats into a false sense of security, place poison on the bait. About a week later repeat extermination, using different bait.




