**THE STATE OF TEXAS**  
**TO GUY BECK, GREETING:**  
 You are commanded to appear and answer the plaintiff's petition at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of the first Monday after the expiration of 42 days from the date of issuance of this Citation, the same being Monday the 13th day of October, A. D. 1947, at or before 10 o'clock A. M. before the Honorable District Court of Motley County, at the Court House in Matador, Texas.

The nature of said suit being substantially as follows, to wit: A suit for divorce, alleging that plaintiff resides in Motley County, Texas, and that the residence of defendant is unknown; that plaintiff and defendant were legally married in Walters, Oklahoma on or about the 31st day of January, 1942, and lived together as husband and wife until about the 6th day of August, 1946; that at all times while married to defendant, plaintiff conducted herself with propriety, doing her duty as a wife, and treated defendant with kindness; that defendant, within about a year after their marriage, commenced a course of unkind, harsh and tyrannical conduct toward plaintiff, which continued with slight intermission, until plaintiff separated from defendant on or about the 6th day of August, 1946; that defendant repeatedly exhibited extreme jealousy toward Plaintiff's family, her friends, and any person with whom she would have the most casual conversation; that defendant is a person of violent passions and of ungovernable temper, and on many occasions, while plaintiff lived with him, defendant addressed to plaintiff opprobrious epithets and threats of personal violence, and did commit acts of personal violence on plaintiff by striking her with his hands and fists; that on or about August 6, 1946, defendant caught plaintiff by the arm and jerked her out of bed violently, causing her hip to strike the floor and inflicting a severe bruise on her body; that such threats and acts of personal violence by defendant's extreme jealousy and by his fits of temper, kept plaintiff so intimidated and worried that it affected her health so that to have any peace of mind and comfort, plaintiff was forced to separate from him; that no children were born of said marriage, and no community property exists.

If this Citation is not served within 90 days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

**Poor Hearing Is Great Handicap To School Child**

The child who cannot hear is badly handicapped. Hard-of-hearing children are often considered backward and become greatly retarded in school when in reality they may be highly intelligent but simply cannot hear much of what is said to them. Children who appear backward in school should be observed carefully to determine if hearing is a factor in the situation.

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, many injuries to the ear can be prevented by keeping foreign objects out of the ear canal, taking good care of the ears during colds and other diseases and observing certain precautions when swimming.

"The cause of middle ear trouble often is diving and swimming," Dr. Cox said. "Protect the ears by wearing a rubber cap, or ear plug."

The State Health Officer declared that no hard instrument of any kind should be used in cleansing the ear canal since it may be injurious. Using ordinary precautions can do much to avoid minor ear trouble which may later lead to partial or complete deafness, the Doctor added.

**HORSE SHOW IS FREE FEATURE OF CHILDRESS FAIR**

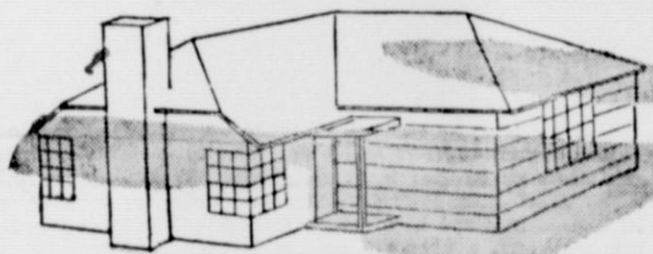
