Born a Kansas City waif, "The Kid" came to West Texas in 1884 with a man named Lattimore and Frank Only 13 years of age at the time he adopted the name of Billy Parks but four years later when he went to Kansas City with a shipment of cattle, he returned with his real name, Billy Pardlow, which he had dis-covered through some friends.

He worked on the Pitchfork ranch in 1892, gathering Matador ranch cattle. One day Geo. Martin, who was with the wagon, saddled a horse and asked the Kid to "dust him off." The horse fell and Pitchfork Kid was injured permanently. Only 20 years of age at the time, the Kid remained unconscious for 19 days and was never completely normal again.

He made a top hand, however, and in 1897 won first roping money at the Seymour Cowboys

He was killed in an accident in New Mexico and is buried in Amarillo. His name still remains on the membership rolls of the Matador Masonic lodge.
