Rugged Area on County Line Is Scene of Grim Air Tragedy

FLYING through a blinding sandstorm shortly after noon Friday a new Army Air Force B45 jet bomber crashed in a rug-ged area almost on the line between Motley and Cottle coun-ties, approximately five miles north of US Highway 70. The plane with the speed of a shooting star, disintegrated when it struck a clay ridge between two gypsum rimmed canyons about two miles east of Cow Hollow tank, just north of the old Paducah-Matador wagon road, and carried four young flyers






