Five Meet Death In Crushed Cars

IMPACT of two speeding automobiles on U. S. Highway 70 about three and one-half miles east of Paducah Saturday night brought death to five men. Two Matador residents, Marvin Bloodworth, 49, and Commodore Davis, 41, were killed instantly. Forrest Aubrey, 37, of Paducah, died shortly after in a Paducah hospital. Ernest Aubrey, 21, his brother, and driver of the west bound 1941 Ford in which three men were riding, died Sunday morning. Pfc. Luther T. Roberts of the 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N. C., third passenger in the car, is reported to have died in a Wichita Falls military hospital, where he was taken after receiving treatment in Paducah. Roberts' home was Niles California. The accident occurred about 11 p. m. Saturday.

The Bloodworth 1949 Chevrolet was completely crushed by the impact. It is not known whether Bloodworth or Davis was driving at the time of the accident. Bill Jameson of Jameson Machinery company here who drove the wrecker truck which brought the wrecked car back to Matador, said that evidence at the scene of the accident indicated both cars were in the center of the highway when they collided. Engine of the Bloodworth Chevrolet was driven back under the instrument board and the steering shaft pushed up near the car's roof. Force of the impact shelled the starter out of its case. Mechanics declared the new car valueless except for scrapiron and few parts which might be salvaged.

Final Rites For R. M. Bloodworth Held Wednesday

Final rites for R. M. Bloodworth were held Wednesday morning at 10:00 o'clock in East Mound cemetery by members of the L. O. O. F. Lodge of which he was a member, the body having been held over until the arrival of his son, Jackie Bloodworth, from California.

Funeral services were conducted in the Baptist Church Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 by Rev. Marvin Brotherton, pastor of the Methodist church and long-time friend of the family. Rev. Clifford Potts, Baptist pastor, assisted. Pallbearers were: J. W. Haney, J. C. Green, sr., Bill Wason, J. C. Green, jr., A. A. Harp of Matador and Johnnie Grace of Seagraves. McDonald Funeral Home was in charge of interment.

Robert Marvin Bloodworth was born at Leonard, Fannin County, Texas, September 27, 1900 and departed this life November 26, 1949 at the age of 49 years, 1 month and 29 days. Having lived in Leonard, Texas until he was 12 years of age the family then moved to Celeste, Texas, where he joined the Methodist Church.

He was married August 2, 1922 to Miss Gertrude Kennedy in Durant, Oklahoma. To this union were born two children, a son, Robert M. Jr., and a daughter, Edith Alene, now Mrs. R. A. Echols of Hardin, Montana.

In addition to his wife and children he is survived by one grandson, Robert Armstead Echols, two brothers, Earl of Lubbock, and Roy of Slaton, Texas; one sister, Mrs. L. D. McHenry of Ventura, Calif.; three step-brothers, five step-sisters and his step-father, J. C. Kennedy of Matador.

Matador Resident Pleads Guilty To Attempted Arson

Mrs. A. E. Westmoreland, Monday, entered a plea of guilty to charges of attempted burning of her home in north Matador on the night of October 22, in District Judge Alton B. Chapman's court and received a four-year suspended sentence.

Mrs. Westmoreland was released from jail on probation, to her brother, Tom Houston, of Galveston, with whom she will reside in the future.

Only slight damage resulted to the home from the arson attempt. Members of the Matador Volunteer Fire Department are declared to have found kindling, furniture and bed materials saturated in coal oil, when they entered the home and extinguished the fire.

Community Is Stunned

News of the tragedy spread rapidly early Sunday and brought an atmosphere of tension and shock to the entire community.

Mrs. Bloodworth was at her home in north Matador alone when notified of her husband's death by the sheriff department.

Her daughter, Mrs. Bobbie Echols, lives near Big Horn, Montana, and her son, Robert M. (Jackie) Jr., in the armed services, was believed at the time on the high seas enroute home from the South Pacific, to receive his discharge after reaching California. He was located, however, on the west coast.

Local Radio Used In Locating Son

Efforts were made Sunday and Monday through the Red Cross to locate the victim's son believed to be enroute home from the Pacific. Monday night a powerful short-wave radio station operated by Marshall Day here in Matador was employed to aid Mr. Day, who is able to talk by voice to more than 100 points throughout the world, had a message relayed through the Red Cross short-wave station in Washington, in effort to reach the youth. He hoped to contact the ship on which young Bloodworth was a passenger in event he was on the seas. While his mother waited with a group of neighbors at Mr. Day's home, she was called to the telephone. It was her son calling long distance from the West Coast. It is not known definitely whether he was informed of the emergency through the regular Red Cross channels or as result of Mr. Day's relayed short-wave messages.

Bloodworth arrived here by plane early yesterday morning and was permitted to view his father after arrangements had been made to hold the body until Wednesday morning for interment following funeral services at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Echols also arrived in Amarillo by plane from Montana and reached Matador Monday.

TRAIL DUST

No other silence is related to the hush that fills a church like that when the pews are no longer empty and the casket's arrival is pending. Awe, terror and grief press their faces to the windows of the soul and time seems slowly on the heart's muffled drums.

Death was a bride at the flower-decked altar awaiting her groom. Voices of the choir rose strong and vibrant with emotion. My friend was beneath the casket resting on the casket cover. Through misty eyes I could see his loved-ones breathing the little smokeless flames of grief that seared their hearts and left coils of sorrow against the thoughts. Life's river flows backward to its source and the old spring afternoon when we walked through dusty grass among little syrup buckets in which our school lunches had been packed. The caustic years had eaten away some of the detail but I remembered the hot summer day we swam together in a muddy lake, and excursions when we rode the distant and lonely hills. Together we had dreamed the dreams of youth.

Now now was the final testimony of his friends and that he had not dreamed in vain. His death, a mighty legacy of friendship, was in the strong traits of human hearts. I could hear his voice and his laughter ringing from past, or from eternity.

Sentiment is a painful vagary. A mechanic drove the old automobile into the metal graveyard where the bones of other cars were being picked for needed parts. The engine coughed and died. Here was the last mile, like an old horse driven to the yard. Presently oil was falling from the heart of the old engine; grimy hands removed a part from beneath the raised hood. Pridelike hands that have once opened the now ragging door when the engine bangs with newness; what secrets, what dreams, what sorrows did the old car know? Forsaken, abandoned thing at the end of the road.

Failure can not stand ridicule. A man is defeated who retains his laughter.

Inside the wagonyard sides of the crushed fodder engulfed the sheds and plank fences. A sum of trash, floated on the water trough, and the big wooden windmill wheel twisted in agony to be free before the wind. In one corner of the enclosure a group of chickens stood close together in the sun. Tears of mud clung to the fruit the agent's cheeks when he drove his buggy and team inside the gate. He fed the poor horses lazily and anointed the collar on their shoulders. Half the red sun was dunked in the horizon when he entered the unlighted hotel. Darkness was a signal for the blizzard to release his fury. It was as if all warmth in the world had fled before the wind. The skies thundered with their burdens of sand and dust, and loose sheet-iron on the buildings cried for mercy. Dawn was a melancholy blade of light in the blizzard's teeth.

The shivering man wrapped his thin and threadbare coat close and waded through drifts of snow to his horses. Despair flooded his eyes. One of the animals lay as cold and rigid as the wind-swept earth. The stranger departed two days later riding the remaining horse and the wind sun covered the tracks and in the dim road. He never returned to the little track of the trees. He never knew the fragrance of the peach blossoms that followed more suspicious seasons in an unflamed land.

Ginning Ahead Of All County Records

Cotton ginning in Motley county yesterday morning had exceeded all available former county production records, according to County Agent J. R. Emmons. At 10:30 yesterday morning the eight county gins had turned out 21,464 bales from the 1949 crop. Mr. Emmons said the highest former big-crop record he could find was 17,000 bales.

The Tribune will appreciate any authentic records which readers may have of larger than 17,000-bale production.

Mr. Emmons said yesterday that he counted 737 bales of cotton on gin yards waiting to be ginned.

Emmons said estimates are that between 60% and 75% of the cotton has been harvested but that many former estimates of a 30,000-bale crop are being stepped higher.

The cotton-puller situation has reversed its position since the start of the season. More pullers are in the county than needed. Mr. Emmons said he turned away several large crews yesterday because no fields are available. He said one crew had a capacity of 15 bales per day but that he was unable to locate work for them.

County Agent J. R. Emmons said yesterday that the quail crop is extremely short and that outside hunters are going to find an unfriendly attitude here in most instances. He said most pastures are closed to hunting.

Besides the short quail crop, Mr. Emmons declared that outside hunters are going to run into another serious problem. Danger of fire in the tall, dry grass of Motley county pastures is going to cause many ranchers to keep gates closed that may have formerly been opened to hunters.

JAIL REGISTER SHOWS BOOMING BUSINESS MONTH

Ginners, farmers, merchants and other businessmen are not doing all the business. Motley county jail, which has remained almost vacant for months at a time during previous years, has just closed its most successful month in history, so far as customers are concerned.

Sheriff John Stotts said yesterday that it was the first time two pages of the jail register have been required to list all the visitors.

He said 11 customers were registered out of the Flomot community within two days recently. Among the guests were members of the Indian cotton-puller group who have provided the sheriff's department with a constant source of diversion.

Sheriff Stotts declared that Spanish-American cotton-pullers in the county have been orderly and required little if any attention.

Most of the approximately 40 prisoners in jail during the past month have been charged with intoxication.

CHEST DRIVE IS PROMISING

Results of Matador's second annual Community Chest drive appeared promising yesterday as workers continued their assignments to attain the budget goal of \$3,000.

No definite report of the drive, which will continue through Saturday, was received yesterday, however, workers declared the response had been good in most instances. Principal difficulty appeared to be the extreme busy season which makes contacts slow and in some instances, impossible, where merchants, businessmen and farmers, are not available.

Chest President J. E. (Jake) Edwards declared the drive had faced some difficulty in securing workers who were not already employed during the fall rush. The chest is supported by residents of the Matador school district.

The 1950 budget is set as follows: Boy Scouts \$400, Girl Scouts \$200, Salvation Army \$60, Crippled Children's Fund \$200, Local Child Welfare and emergency activities \$600 and emergency relief fund \$1,425. The emergency fund is set up for all kinds of emergencies for which individual solicitations were taken before the Community Chest was established here. Over 85% of all funds collected remain in the community to aid needy in the area.

Future plans of the project are uncertain. Money left in the fund after Saturday's event will be held for a time in case the plan is restored to activity.

The event has been made possible by regular weekly contributions from business and professions men contributing \$8 in fission men month Coupons have been given to customers without charge. Amount of the fund for Saturday is \$520.



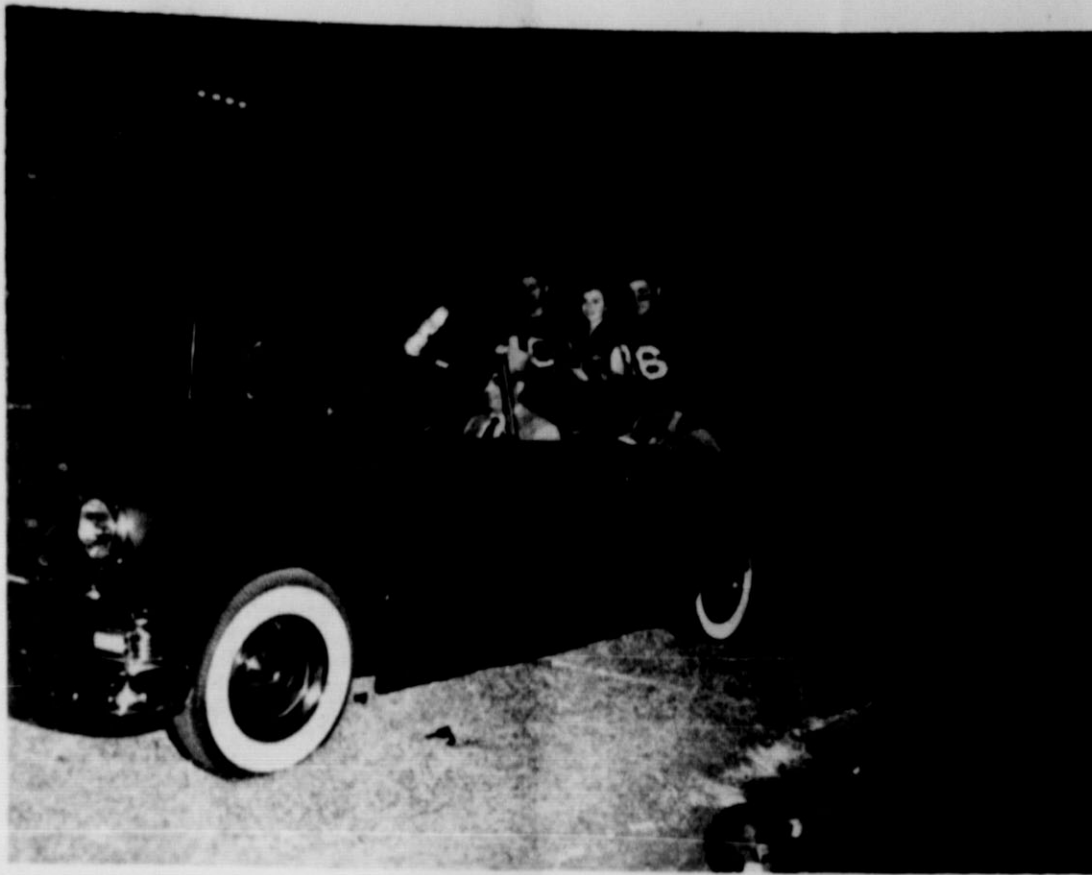

This activity is conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

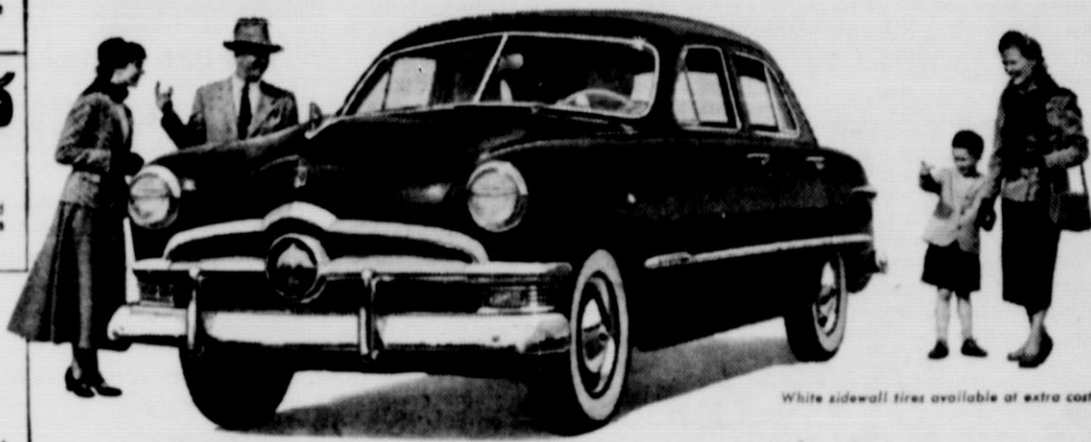

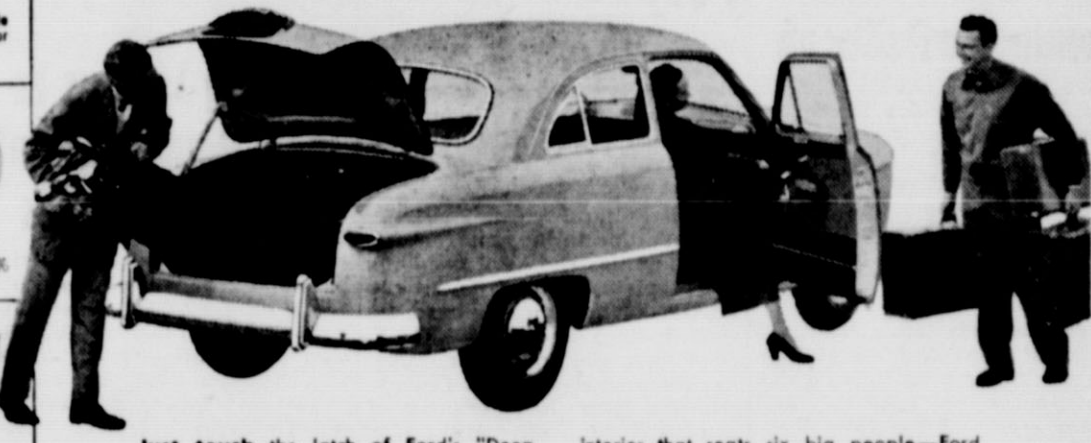

Crosbyton Bandit Victim Formerly Lived Here

Armed bandits struck in Crosbyton late Saturday as three men kidnaped and shot the owner of a Crosbyton dry goods store and escaped with \$300 to \$400.

A. W. Wallace, 45, former Whiteflat merchant, the store owner, was slugged in the store about 10 p. m., by three men who forced him to accompany them on a wild ride during which they constantly beat him with a gun, then shot him in the left arm and in the back of the head as he walked away from their car at their orders on rural road 15 miles southwest of Crosbyton.

He later made his way to a farmhouse and was taken to the Crosbyton General hospital where his condition was described as satisfactory early this week.

Mrs. Wallace said the trio entered the store, still filled with customers, about 10 p. m.

Following a pattern almost identical to that described by witnesses to the holdup of the Economy department store in downtown Lubbock last Saturday night, the men deployed, one taking a station at the rear of the store, a second at the middle near the cash register, the third remaining at the front door.

One bandit approached a son of the owner, Alton, 17, and demanded the money in the cash register. The youth gave him the money, totaling between \$300 and \$400, which was placed in a leather suitcase.

Two of the men then told Wallace to open the safe.

Owner Struck With Gun

When Wallace told them he did not have the combination to the safe, a walk-in type vault, one of the gunmen pistol-whipped him about the head. A moment later one of the men fired a shot into the ceiling, apparently intending to frighten Wallace into opening the safe. A typewriter, a stove and a quantity of merchandise were knocked over as Wallace struggled with the gunmen.

One of the bandits turned a gun on Alton who had run to the back of the store to investigate the shooting.

As the trio left, they turned to warn those in the store "if you

know what's best for him, you'll all stay in here."

Alton told officers later he ran to the front of the store after the gunmen left and saw the men turn down an alley. He then ran to a back door and looked out to see a car pulling away. The car appeared to be a 1950 Studebaker he said.

Car Parked Near Store

A number of witnesses later reported a car of that description had been parked near the rear of the store for approximately a half hour before the

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holdup.

A woman, said by witnesses to have been in the parked car, was not present when the bandits took him from the store, Wallace said.

Wallace, shoved from the gunmen's car about 15 miles east of Crosbyton, made his way to the farm home of E. G. Rich, who returned him to town.

Ordered To Walk Away

Wallace told officers he had been ordered to walk away from the car, and had moved only a few feet when he was shot twice.

The men earlier had threatened to kill him because he had refused to open the safe, he said. Two of the bandits, who rode in the back seat with Wallace

pistol-whipped him constantly from the time they entered the car until he was pushed from the vehicle, he told officers. He did not lose consciousness, he said.

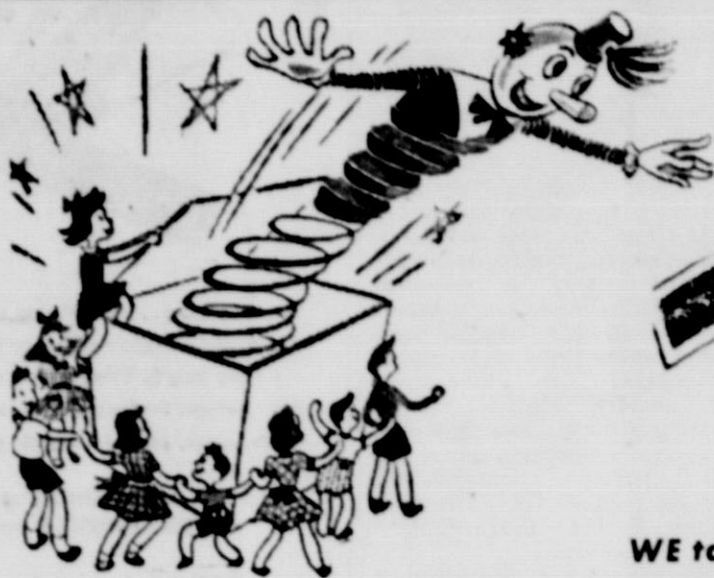

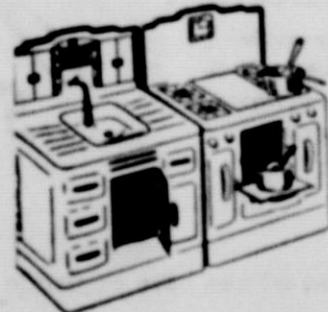
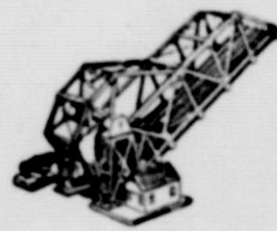
