## POWER COMPANIES SURVEY REVEALS INCREASED SERVICE

ABILENE—From 1946 to 1952 customers of electric power companies serving 90 per cent of West Texas increased a total of 66 per cent, while revenues rose 79 per cent, payrolls jump- ed 121 per cent and fuel costs went up 104 per cent, according to results of a survey published in the current issue of West

**URGES FARMERS TO START BABY CHICKS NOW FOR FALL EGGS**

Despite the recent decline in egg prices, it is still good business for farmers to start baby chicks this spring, E. B. Powell, director of research for Purina, stated this week.

"This drop in prices may cause some farmers to give up on baby chicks this year," Powell stated, "and we may wind up with an egg shortage next winter."

Powell pointed out the population growth since the last "baby chick season" will swell the normal demand upwards of a billion eggs next fall. The present market seems to be having the tendency to decrease production too much.

"The logical result of a heavy decline in replacement chicks," he continued, "will be fewer eggs next fall when the chicks put down now will be laying best."

He reminded farmers of a similar market condition a couple of years ago, when the egg market broke sharply in the spring, but bounced back to new peaks the following fall.

"Good weather, better breeding and better feeding have combined to make a temporary egg supply larger than usual," he explained. "Obviously, this has forced the egg prices down. But the situation offers an unusual opportunity for egg profits next fall, according to most market experts. And here is their reason—some poultry keepers will not raise chicks this spring. So there should be fewer pullets and fewer eggs next fall and winter. In the past, this has made extra high egg prices during that time of the year."

"Don't be misled into cutting down on chicks this spring," he cautioned, "let the other fellows quit."

Some poultry flock owners were panicked into getting out of the egg business in 1950 when egg prices dropped to 30.7c that spring. Yet in the fall and winter of '50, prices hit 57.7c per dozen, Powell stated.

"The farmer who has chickens in production next fall should have some mighty good property," he concluded, "and he stands a good chance to show a satisfactory poultry profit."

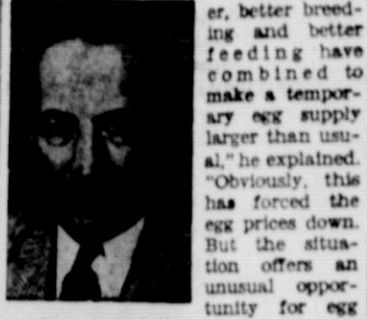

**HOMEOWNERS MAY BE  
 LIABLE FOR ACCIDENTS  
 ON PREMISES**

Can a homeowner be held responsible for accidents that happen to other people while they are on his property? Lawyers say it is difficult to state a hard and fast rule about liability for such accidents because the facts differ so much from case to case. However, some conclusions can be drawn by noting how the courts have decided in specific cases which have been brought before them.

A postman delivering mail slipped on a child's roller skate one morning. He sued the homeowner for damages. The court held that the delivery of mail is for the benefit of the homeowner and that he must take care to remove any conditions on his

property which would make delivery of the mail dangerous.

Then there was the case of the meter-reader who slipped and fell on the basement steps and the courts held the owner responsible because the steps were defective.

On the other hand, a guest sued her host because she slipped and fell when she stepped on some beans strewn about the owner's living room. The host's children had been playing with bean-shooters on the day she chose to visit. The court held in this case that the host was not liable for her injury.

Similar cases where social calls resulted in disaster involved a guest slipping on a small scatter rug, and another overnight guest who slipped and fell in a shower. Both cases were decided in favor of the homeowners—not the visitors.

From these cases it may be seen that the law is usually more strict about accidents befalling tradesmen and others who enter your premises in the line of duty, so to speak—postmen, laundrymen, meter-readers, delivery boys and the like—than it is in the cases of those who enter your home for purely social reasons.

This does not mean that a homeowner is absolved of all responsibility for injury to his guests. If he knows a dangerous condition exists, he has a duty to correct it and can be held liable for accidents which might happen if he doesn't. For example, a rotted tree branch fell to the sidewalk, injuring a passerby. The general rule here is that the owner was responsible because he knew of the defective condition and should have remedied it.

The law is especially zealous in protecting small children. In many situations where no liability would be imposed for injury to an adult, you may be held responsible to an injured child. If you have a piece of machinery, a pond, a well or some other apparatus or condition attractive and dangerous to a child on your property, it may be your

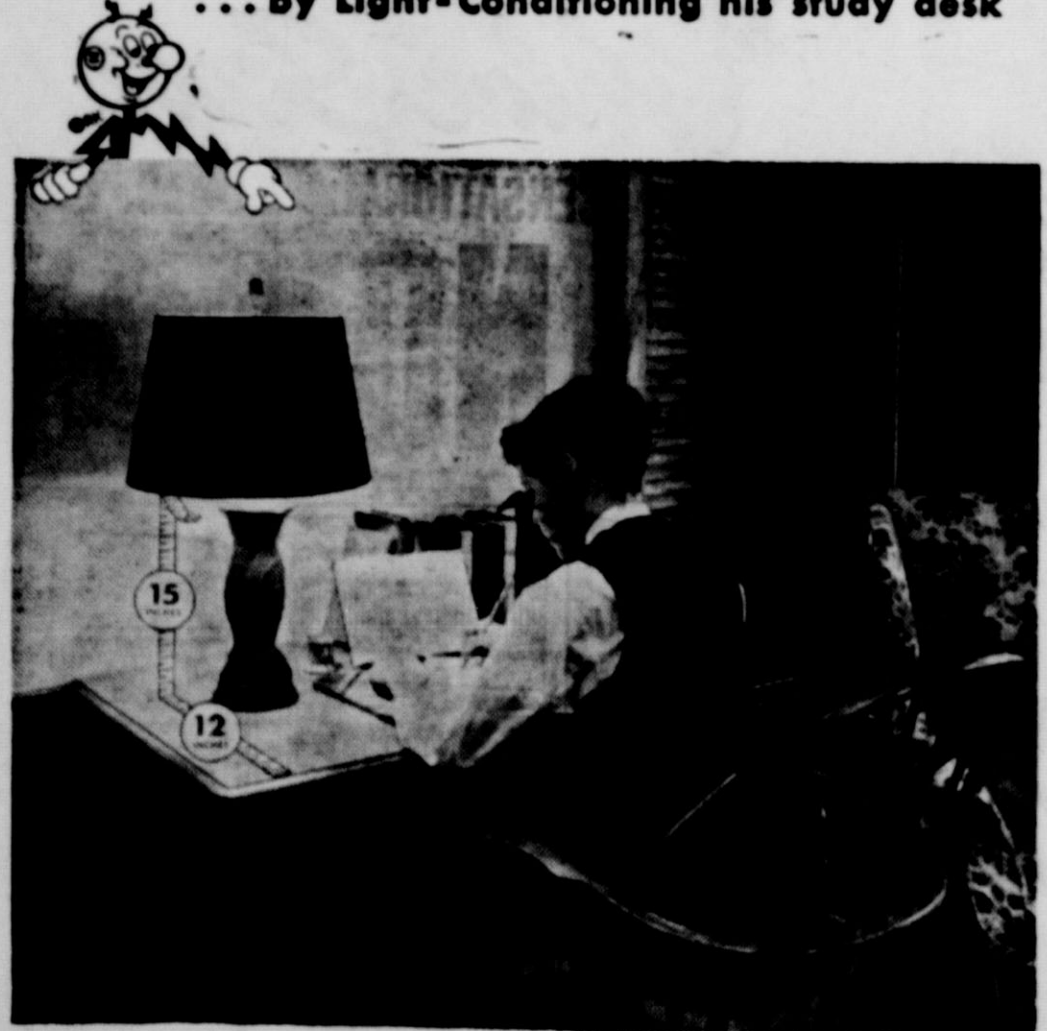
