

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 2

SECTION 1. THAT SECTION 31A OF ARTICLE III, CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: "SECTION 31A. THE LEGISLATURE MAY PROVIDE, SUBJECT TO CERTAIN RESTRICTIONS, REGULATIONS AS MAY BE DEEMED EXPEDIENT FOR ASSISTANCE TO, AND FOR THE CARE OF, PERSONS WHO ARE OVER THE AGE OF SIXTY-FIVE YEARS AND WHO ARE INMATE OF ANY STATE-SUPPORTED INSTITUTION, WHILE SUCH INMATE HAS RESIDED IN THE STATE FOR ONE YEAR IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING THE FILING OF SUCH APPLICATION."

THIRTY DOLLARS PER MONTH, AND FOR THE ASSISTANCE OF NEEDY CHILDREN...

"FOR THE ASSISTANCE OF NEEDY CHILDREN UNDER SIXTEEN YEARS OF AGE, REMOVING THE THIRTY-FIVE MILLION DOLLAR (\$35,000,000) LIMITATION UPON AMOUNT OF STATE EXPENDITURES FOR SUCH PURPOSES; DISQUALIFYING PERSONS WHO DISPOSE OF PROPERTY UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS; PROVIDING A MAXIMUM PAYMENT OF THIRTY DOLLARS PER MONTH FOR OLD AGE ASSISTANCE PROVIDING FOR THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PROVIDING THAT EXPENDITURES FROM STATE FUNDS SHALL NOT EXCEED THE EXPENDITURE FROM FEDERAL FUNDS RESPECT TO ANY INDIVIDUAL AND PROVIDING WITHIN THE STATE IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE ASSISTANCE AND PROVIDING A LIMITATION OF FORTY-TWO MILLION DOLLARS (\$42,000,000) PER YEAR ON STATE FUND EXPENDITURES FOR SUCH PURPOSES EACH YEAR."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 3

SECTION 1. THAT SECTION 49-B, ARTICLE III, CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS: "SECTION 49-B. THERE IS HEREBY CREATED A BOARD TO BE KNOWN AS THE VETERANS' LAND BOARD, WHICH SHALL BE COMPOSED BY THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AND THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE. THE VETERANS' LAND BOARD MAY ISSUE NOT TO EXCEED ONE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$100,000,000) IN BONDS OR OBLIGATIONS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS FOR THE PURPOSE OF GREATLY IMPROVING THE STATE OF TEXAS AS AN OBLIGATION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, IN SUCH FORM, DENOMINATIONS, AND UPON THE TERMS AS ARE NOW PRESCRIBED BY SENATE BILL NO. 29, CHAPTER 218 OF THE ACTS OF THE FIFTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE, PROVIDED, THAT WHEN THE LIMITATION OF TWENTY-FIVE MILLION DOLLARS (\$25,000,000) IS USED IN SAID SENATE BILL NO. 29, THE SAME SHALL BE AFTER BE CONSTRUCTED AS ONE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$100,000,000); OR AS SAID ACT MAY BE HEREAFTER AMENDED, OR BY OTHER LAWS THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY ENACT; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT SAID BONDS SHALL BEAR AN ANNUAL RATE OF INTEREST NOT TO EXCEED THREE PER CENT (3%) PER ANNUM, AND THAT THE SAME SHALL BE PAID FOR NOT LATER THAN PAR VALUE AND ACCRUED INTEREST."

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THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA SUBSEQUENT TO 1945...

THOSE OPPOSING SAID PROPOSED AMENDMENT SHALL WRITE OR HAVE PRINTED ON THEIR BALLOTS THE FOLLOWING WORDS: "AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 49-B, CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, FOR INCREASING VETERANS' LAND FUND FOR THE PURCHASE OF LANDS IN TEXAS TO BE SOLD TO TEXAS VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II, AND TO TEXAS VETERANS OF SERVICE IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA SUBSEQUENT TO 1945." IF IT APPEARS FROM THE RETURNS OF SAID ELECTION THAT A MAJORITY OF THE VOTES CAST WERE IN FAVOR OF SAID AMENDMENT, THE SAME SHALL BECOME A PART OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION AND BE EFFECTIVE FROM THE DATE OF THE DETERMINATION OF SUCH RESULT AND THE GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION THEREOF. SEC. 3. THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS SHALL ISSUE THE NECESSARY PROCLAMATION FOR SAID ELECTION, AND SHALL HAVE THE SAME PUBLISHED AS REQUIRED BY THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS OF THE STATE. (TO PUBLISH AUGUST 9, 16, 23, 30)

THE VETERANS' LAND FUND

THE VETERANS' LAND FUND SHALL BE USED BY THE BOARD PURSUANT TO THE PURPOSES HEREIN SET FORTH. THE BOARD SHALL BE COMPOSED OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AND THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE. THE BOARD SHALL HAVE THE POWER TO PURCHASE, HOLD, LEASE, CONVEY, MORTGAGE, AND OTHERWISE DISPOSE OF LANDS BELONGING TO THE VETERANS' LAND FUND. THE BOARD SHALL BE AUTHORIZED TO BORROW MONEY ON THE CREDIT OF THE VETERANS' LAND FUND FOR THE PURPOSES HEREIN SET FORTH. THE BOARD SHALL BE SUBJECT TO THE SUPERVISION AND CONTROL OF THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO FILE AN ANNUAL REPORT WITH THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO MAINTAIN ADEQUATE RECORDS OF ALL TRANSACTIONS. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO KEEP ADEQUATE RECORDS OF ALL MONIES RECEIVED AND PAID. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO KEEP ADEQUATE RECORDS OF ALL LANDS ACQUIRED AND DISPOSED OF. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO KEEP ADEQUATE RECORDS OF ALL BONDS AND OBLIGATIONS ISSUED. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO KEEP ADEQUATE RECORDS OF ALL INTEREST PAID. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO KEEP ADEQUATE RECORDS OF ALL EXPENSES INCURRED. THE BOARD SHALL BE REQUIRED TO KEEP ADEQUATE RECORDS OF ALL ASSETS AND LIABILITIES. NO. 8
PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 480 OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF RURAL FIRE PREVENTION DISTRICTS SO AS TO PROVIDE THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY AUTHORIZE AN AD VALOREM TAX NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY (50) CENTS ON THE ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLAR VALUATION FOR THE SUPPORT THEREOF; PROVIDED THAT NO TAX SHALL BE LEVIED IN SUPPORT OF SAID DISTRICTS UNTIL APPROVED BY VOTE OF THE PEOPLE RESIDING THEREIN.

SECTION 1. THAT SECTION 480 OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BE AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
"SEC. 480. THE LEGISLATURE SHALL HAVE THE POWER TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT AND CREATION OF RURAL FIRE PREVENTION DISTRICTS AND TO AUTHORIZE A TAX ON THE AD VALOREM PROPERTY SITUATED IN SAID DISTRICTS NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY (50) CENTS ON THE ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLAR VALUATION FOR THE SUPPORT THEREOF; PROVIDED THAT NO TAX SHALL BE LEVIED IN SUPPORT OF SAID DISTRICTS UNTIL APPROVED BY VOTE OF THE PEOPLE RESIDING THEREIN."

SECTION 2. THE FOREGOING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE SECOND TUESDAY IN NOVEMBER, 1951, WHICH ELECTION ALL BALLOTS SHALL HAVE PRINTED THERE-

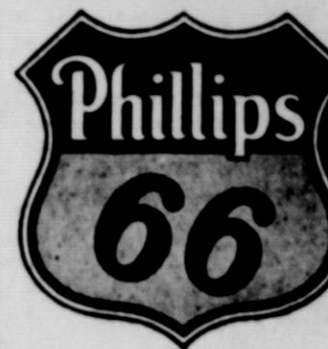
ON OR IN COUNTIES USING VOTING MACHINES. THE SAID MACHINES SHALL PROVIDE THE FOLLOWING: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY OF AN AD VALOREM TAX NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY (50) CENTS ON THE ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLAR VALUATION FOR THE CREATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF RURAL FIRE PREVENTION DISTRICTS" AND "AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE LEVY OF AN AD VALOREM TAX NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY (50) CENTS ON THE ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLAR VALUATION FOR THE CREATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF RURAL FIRE PREVENTION DISTRICTS."

PREVENTION DISTRICTS. EACH VOTER SHALL MARK OUT ONE OF SAID CLAUSES ON THE BALLOT LEAVING THE ONE EXPRESSING HIS VOTE ON THE IT SHALL APPEAR FROM THE RETURNS OF SAID ELECTION THAT A MAJORITY OF THE VOTES CAST ARE IN FAVOR OF SAID AMENDMENT, THE SAME SHALL BECOME A PART OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.
SEC. 2. THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF TEXAS SHALL ISSUE THE NECESSARY PROCLAMATION FOR SAID ELECTION AND HAVE THE SAME PUBLISHED AS REQUIRED BY THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS OF THE STATE.

STITUTION FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENTS THEREOF.

SEC. 4. IF AT SAID ELECTION, A MAJORITY OF THE VOTES ARE "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATEWIDE SYSTEM FOR RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY PENSIONS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES," THE FOREGOING PROPOSED AMENDMENT SHALL BECOME SECTION 63 OF ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS, AND PROCLAMATION SHALL BE MADE BY THE GOVERNOR THEREOF.

13 Flying Ladies of Texas are Building International Goodwill

Eyes Of Texas And World On Delegation As End Of Tour Nears For Good Neighbors

As the end of an extensive tour of Europe and the Middle East nears for thirteen representatives of the Texas State Federation of Women's Clubs, the eyes of Texas and some of the outside world are no doubt centering on the Lone Star State.

A little bit of Texas was left behind them in each country that the women visited. In the group is Mrs. U. L. Willie of Matador, who is state treasurer of T. F. W. C.

Following report of the tour appeared in a recent issue of The Dallas Morning News:

"The countries of Europe are learning a lot about Texas this summer. Thirteen forward-looking women from the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs who are touring Europe as the Texas Good Neighbor delegation see to that.

"They have literally captivated the official representatives of foreign countries they have visited by leaving behind them thirty-two scholarships to the University of Texas.

"This writer met the delegation by chance at a diplomatic party in the Italian gardens of the Villa Taverna, where our ambassador to Italy and Mrs. Dunn were at home to a group of Americans that included artists and archeologists from the American Academy in Rome.

"The animated conversation of the Texas women describing their mission took the spotlight away from the political notables and gave the party as rich a Texas flavor as a barbecue on the grounds of the Governor's Mansion in Austin.

"The Texas women, led by the chairman of their delegation, Mrs. Preston H. Dial of San Antonio were in Italy to present a Friendship Scroll and two University of Texas scholarships to President Gaspari's representative, Sen. Carlo Vischia, undersecretary for public instructions. (Others in the group include Mrs. Frank S. Springer, Mrs. Lloyd Berry, Mrs. C. D. Berry, Mrs. Mills King, Miss Martha Nan King and Miss Pat Rudley, all of San Antonio; Mrs. W. P. Brightwell, Baird; Mrs. Rennie Wright, New Braunfels; Mrs.

Harry Griffiths, Austin; Mrs. A. J. House, Yoakum; Mrs. Rubin Frels, Victoria, and Mrs. Willie.)

"The Good Neighbor delegation assembled in San Antonio in June and flew first to Washington, D. C., for State Department briefing then enplaned from New York's La Guardia Field for London's Northolt Airport. Mills King, prominent San Antonio businessman whose wife and daughter were in the group, had an enormous bon voyage cake delivered aboard the plane just before its transatlantic take-off. The cake was decorated with cowboys and lariats, mustangs and saddles, and sent the delegates into a frenzy of Texas spirit which is unbridled enough when Texans are group-traveling a broad.

They sang cowboy ballads and state songs all the way to Gooseberry, Labrador.

"The next day the Texas women were entertained at the American embassy in London. As they were about to be presented to our ambassador to Britain, he surprised them by saying: "But I've met the ladies and heard them sing—though I missed getting a piece of their extraordinary cake." The ambassador had been a fellow passenger the night before on the TWA plane flying them to England.

"They told another story about some European officials who welcomed them to the Netherlands and the Scandinavian countries. Last February a group of leading European businessmen interested in foreign trade came to America to visit United States cities with free trade zones. In Texas they went to San Antonio where Mrs. Dial, as a member of their entertainment committee, gave each man a miniature Texas flag. Other more expansive Texans at more expansive parties—men to be sure—sat down and exchanged footwear with them, trading Texas boots for Dutch and Danish shoes.

"Arriving in Sweden, the Texas delegation was met at the Stockholm airport by one of these Swedish businessmen, waving a Texas flag wildly and

wearing his Texas boots as proudly as any weather-stained rancher who ever made a dollar off a drought-starved cow.

"In Copenhagen, in Amsterdam, at The Hague—wherever the ladies went where these businessmen lived—they were greeted at the airport by the men waving little Lone Star Texas flags.

Discuss Trainee Programs

"In Denmark, the delegation were guests of Mrs. Eugenie Anderson, United States ambassador, and had a round-table discussion on industrial education. Ideas on "trainee programs" were exchanged, and besides making the customary gift of two Texas University scholarships, plans were made for the job training of Danish students in Texas industry. Miss Anne Faulk, South Texas delegate, offered to take a trainee in her large dairy and ice cream plant in San Antonio, and Mrs. Brightwell from Baird, volunteered to take a trainee on her West Texas ranch to learn scientific cattle raising.

"In Holland, Dutch officials showed the women an exhibit set up to illustrate the long friendly relations existing between Holland and the United States.

"Most of the Texas delegates agreed that the high point of their trip for gracious hospitality and entertainment was in Luxembourg where Madam Minister Mesta, their constant attendant and hostess, gave them a sparkling party in the American legation.

"As wives and mothers their common hope was to strengthen ties of friendship with the European people and to build a world in which international understanding shall prevail. Leader of the tour, Mrs. Dial, last year was named "Texas' Mother of the Year" for her work in befriending foreign students visiting in San Antonio.

"As Louis Foxe, France's top man in the field of cultural relations, pointed out in Paris: "These Texas women have the unique distinction of being the first delegation from the United States to come to Europe bringing university scholarships. The long-range contribution which this action makes for better European-American relations is not lost on the realistic Continental mind."

To Middle East

In Cairo, Egypt, the women presented Egypt's King Farouk, in absentia, with honorary membership in the Council of Pan-American Relations. They also left behind a scroll of friendship a Texas state flag and the two scholarships for deserving Egyptian students.

These were delivered to Princess Khadidja Hassan, a member of the royal family, in a ceremony at the American embassy in Cairo.

The scholarships are being financed by the Texas State Legislature, which previously has awarded scholarships to students from Latin-American countries. This program is being broadened this year to include countries of Europe and of the Middle East.

The women are paying their own travel expenses but are acting as representatives of the General Federation of Women's Clubs of the United States.

Their next stop after leaving Cairo was the Holy Land, where they visited both Old and New Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, Israel. Returning to the continent, they are spending several days this week in Barcelona and Madrid, Spain, and Lisbon, Portugal.

They will leave Lisbon Sunday (the 19th) and arrive in New York at 8:45 a. m. Monday. Their arrival in San Antonio will be sometime Monday evening.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION, NO. 37

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BY ADDING A NEW SECTION AFTER SECTION II THEREOF TO BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 11A, PROVIDING FOR THE INVESTMENT OF THE PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND IN ADDITIONAL SECURITIES TO THOSE NOW ENUMERATED IN SECTION II OF ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE NECESSARY PROMulgATION AND PUBLICATION, AND CALLING FOR AN ELECTION THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SEC. 1. THAT ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS SHALL BE AMENDED BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 11A, WHICH SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

"SECTION 11A. IN ADDITION TO THE BONDS NOW ENUMERATED IN SECTION II OF ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, THE PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND MAY BE INVESTED IN SUCH OTHER SECURITIES, INCLUDING BONDS, PREFERRED STOCKS AND COMMON STOCKS, AS THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS MAY DEEM TO BE PROPER INVESTMENT FOR SAID FUND; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT NOT MORE THAN FIFTY PER CENT (50%) OF THE SAID FUND SHALL BE INVESTED AT ANY TIME IN STOCKS, NOR SHALL MORE THAN ONE PER CENT (1%) OF THE

SAID FUND BE INVESTED IN SECURITIES ISSUED BY ANY ONE CORPORATION, NOR SHALL MORE THAN FIVE PER CENT (5%) OF THE SAID FUND BE OWNED BY ANY ONE CORPORATION. FURTHER, THAT STOCKS PURCHASED FOR THE SAID FUND SHALL BE REGISTERED WITH THE SECURITIES DIVISION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS WHICH HAVE PAID THE FEE THEREON FOR TEN (10) YEARS OR LONGER, UNLESS OTHERWISE PROVIDED BY THE DATE OF PURCHASE AND WHICH, EXCEPT FOR STOCKS AND INSURANCE STOCKS ARE LISTED UPON AN EXCHANGE REGISTERED WITH THE SECURITIES DIVISION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS. THE SAID FUND SHALL BE SELF-LIQUIDATING AND SHALL HAVE PRIORITY OVER ALL OTHER CLAIMS AGAINST THE PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND IN ADDITIONAL SECURITIES TO THOSE NOW ENUMERATED IN SECTION II OF ARTICLE VII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS. THE NECESSARY PROMulgATION AND PUBLICATION AND CALLING FOR AN ELECTION FOR SAID FUND PROVIDED BY THIS SECTION SHALL BE PAID OUT OF THE PROPER APPROPRIATION MADE BY LAW.
