

Cox Elected Secretary by 18-Vote Margin

VOTING RECORD SET IN MUNICIPAL ELECTION

DISABLED WAR VETERAN L. M. Cox was elected city secretary over incumbent Mrs. Gertrude Bloodworth by the narrow margin of 18 votes in the largest municipal election in Matador's history. A total of 380 votes were polled. Cox, who was a "write-in" candidate, received 198 votes and Mrs. Bloodworth received 180 votes.

Back in office for a third term was salaryless Mayor Douglas Meador who received 370 votes. He did not have an opponent. Bud Lowe (colored) received 1 vote for Mayor. Geo. Edwards 1 vote and Algie Groves 4 votes (all write-ins).

Two new city councilmen were elected. Jack Norman, manager of West Texas Utilities office here received 365 votes and Andy Hurst, manager of Gabriel's Department store received 367 votes. They were without opponents and replaced retiring councilmen O. V. Johnson and Albert Rattan.

Write-in votes for councilmen were as follows: J. L. Woodruff 1, Jack Green 2, Jack Lancaster 2, Charlie Meador 1, Howard Edmondson 2 and Mack Marshall 3.

Cox and the two new members of the city council were immediately sworn into office following a canvass of the election by the council. The entire city administrative government with the exception of Mayor Meador, is composed of veterans of World War II. The election was held in the Motley county courthouse.

Moss Re-Elected

Ennis Moss was re-elected Mayor of Roaring Springs with 26 of the 28 votes cast. M. S. Thacker and W. C. King were re-elected members of the Roaring Springs city council.

Former resident Lewis Eudy, was elected Mayor of Turkey in Tuesday election against three opponents.

STUBBORN BLAZE SWEEPS PRAIRIE

A stubborn prairie fire of unknown origin which started near the river Tuesday morning destroyed an estimated three or four sections of grass on the former Matador ranch before it was finally brought under control.

Matador Volunteer Fire Department struggled with the fire for several hours as it burned the dry grass and shinnery motts in the Caprock foothill area. Because of the rough terrain and heavy mesquite, it was impossible to use the old city fire truck to any decisive advantage. Fire Chief Freddie Welling declared.

"Challenge Is To Make People Think" Declares Famous Agricultural Expert

"Greatest challenge to America today is to think of world affairs in broad terms, and cause the people of the world to think for themselves," said K. J. Edwards, famous agricultural expert who was the principal speaker Tuesday at the regular meeting of the Matador Lions club held in the Methodist church basement.

Mr. Edwards, who was introduced by program sponsor, Lion Elbert Reeves, is one of the world's outstanding agricultural experts. He has received wide acclaim for his articles of agricultural conditions in Saudi Arabia where he spent three years in the employ of King Ibn Saud. His writings have appeared in Readers Digest, Saturday Evening Post and other national publications. Mr. Edwards is now retired from his former career and is associated with the Plainsman Supply Company in Plainview and operates a Ford tractor agency in Hillsboro.

"King Saud is a great man," Mr. Edwards declared in describing his experiences in the oil-rich country of Saudi Arabia, where the annual rainfall is two inches per year, and where the temperature frequently reaches 125 degrees to stand 60 days at a time. "Although the King is not an educated man, he was destined to become great. The Arabs are good people and the King has welded the tribes into a new but progressive nation. The great riches of oil which are hidden under the burning desert have made many things possible and King Saud is most interested in improving the standard of living for his people. That, of course, can best be accomplished by producing more food and from the country's limited irrigation source that was the purpose of the group of American agricultural men who spent three years there. The Arabs thought of us as

Citizens Interested In 'Rain-Making' Plan

Approximately 90 landowners and businessmen meeting Tuesday night in the District Court room here were enthusiastic over the "rain-making" plan presented by Ford Hubbard of Houston, representing the Water Resources Development Corporation of Denver.

Rancher D. I. W. Birnie was named president of a county organization to raise the estimated \$6,700 cost of applying silver iodide through generators to rain-bearing clouds. Ralph Stapleton was named vice-president of the county organization.

Elbert Reeves, secretary-treasurer, Mr. Reeves served as temporary chairman during the Tuesday night meeting.

A meeting of officers and Community chairmen is scheduled tonight in the office of County Agent Rufus Emmons, for the purpose of establishing the cost per acre to the landowner. Community chairmen named in the Tuesday night meeting were Charles Long of Roaring Springs; Sam Ross of Flomot; A. C. Nimmo of Northfield, and Mr. Birnie, Matador-Whiteflat communities. Principal effort of the county organization now is consideration of plans to raise the required money.

"We are rain increasers, not rain-makers", Mr. Hubbard told the group Tuesday night. He said the contract would continue from April 1 through March 31, 1953. He pointed out the success of the modern plan in other states and answered questions.

He said five counties in Oklahoma would take part and that the following Texas counties have already organized to raise the money: Hall, Donley, Collingsworth, Childress and Armstrong. Counties in the process of being organized are Cottle, Motley, Briscoe and King.
