

Kifer Holdup Pair Sentenced 7 Years

Courtroom Crowded For 2-Day Trial; Girls Get Freedom

The two New Mexico men who robbed the Kifer filling station here of \$100.00 and stranded Clarence Kifer, the operator, in the Matador pasture west of town, each have seven years in which to think over their crime.

Their girl friends got probation sentences.

The seven-year penitentiary terms were recommended by a 110th District Jury which deliberated from 1:45 to 4:30 p. m. Wednesday after the men, Clarence William Helmer, 21, Roswell and Kenneth Earl Owens, 21, Portales, pleaded guilty before the jury.

Jury foreman was Frank Montgomery.

Immediately after the jury returned the sentence, Judge Alton B. Chapman pronounced five-year probation terms for Mrs. Betty Christine Trout, 18, and Mrs. Linda Brody, 19, both of Roswell.

No testimony or witnesses was heard in the case. Dist. Atty. John Stapleton previously had planned to call Kifer and four other persons to the stand.

The women had pleaded guilty on Tuesday to being accomplices in the Feb. 6 robbery. The four were brought here on that day and from Lubbock County jail where they had been held since their arrest in Missouri.

Both Admit Marriages

In pleading guilty to complicity charges, Mrs. Brody told the court her name was not Mrs. Della Mae Helmer and that she was not married to Helmer, although she had previously stated that she was her husband. In questioning it was brought out that she had been married to another person and was now divorced, and that Helmer was a wife and two or three children in California.

Mrs. Trout told the court that she also was married and was separated from her husband in California. She said she met Owens, the day of the holdup.

Crowded Courtroom

One of the largest audiences to attend court here in recent years crowded the courtroom to capacity to hear the case, with many spectators finding seats along window sills, or standing in the rear of the room.

Although the public was not in sympathy with the culprits, the milk of human kindness flowed at the conclusion of the trial when the women received their sentence and a purse was made up to send them back to their New Mexico homes.

Judge Chapman started the movement with a contribution of \$5.00.

COX TO HEAD VFW FOR THIRD TIME

Other officers elected were: Senior vice-commander, Joe B. Meador; Junior vice-commander, F. J. Gordon; Quartermaster, Frank Price; Post surgeon, Richard Turner; Sergeant-at-Arms, Raby Webb; Judge Advocate, Fred G. Simpson, Jr.; Chaplain, Ted Elliott and Post trustee, David Campbell. All of the officers were from Matador, with the exception of Campbell, who resides at Roaring Springs.

New Chevrolet Car Loaned For Course

Campbell Chevrolet company had notice from General Motors Corporation that another car would be allotted to its regular shipment. The car will be loaned for one year to Matador High school to be used as a dual controlled safety car.

Bert Ezzell, superintendent of the schools, is the instructor of a new American Automobile Association safety program. Students who come from families who do not own a car, and who have never had a chance to drive will be given an opportunity to learn to drive the "sportsman like" way Ezzell has met the requirements of the State Department of Public Instruction, and is prepared to teach the students. Any instructor who teaches the safety course must meet the requirements and devote a number of periods per week to behind-the-wheel and classroom instruction.

It is no easy matter to obtain an AAA approved car. First the company must be willing to absolutely lend the car for one year. Next, the school must have an approved driver and prove that the institution is willing to cooperate wholeheartedly with the program outlined by the American Automobile Association. The car actually comes through the association, after both parties have agreed to promote the project.

"Our new car should be here any day," Forrest Campbell, manager of the local Chevrolet company said. "And we are very proud that Matador High school is cooperating with AAA in its 'Sportsman's Like Driving' course. We are even prouder of the fact that our company can assist the school by lending a new car."

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Pipkin and is a junior in the Division of Home Economics at Tech.

Tech pauses one day a year to give recognition to students who are outstanding in academics, scholarship, athletics and leadership. Those being recognized include the upper three percent of each of the freshmen, sophomore, junior and senior classes; recipients of scholarships and awards; campus leaders; athletic lettermen; and student organizations of which two-thirds the membership maintains a "B" average or better.

In the 1952 Recognition Service, Tech will recognize 141 students for scholastic attainment; 70 scholarship holders, 11 clubs, 53 lettermen, and 59 campus leaders. Those being recognized scholastically for the first time will receive Individual Honors; for the second time, Divisional Honors; and for the fourth time, College Honors.

There will be 6 College Honors awarded March 19; 10 Divisional Honors; 27 Class Honors; and 98 Individual Honors.

Outstanding Banquet Held Recently At Roaring Springs For Mothers-Daughters

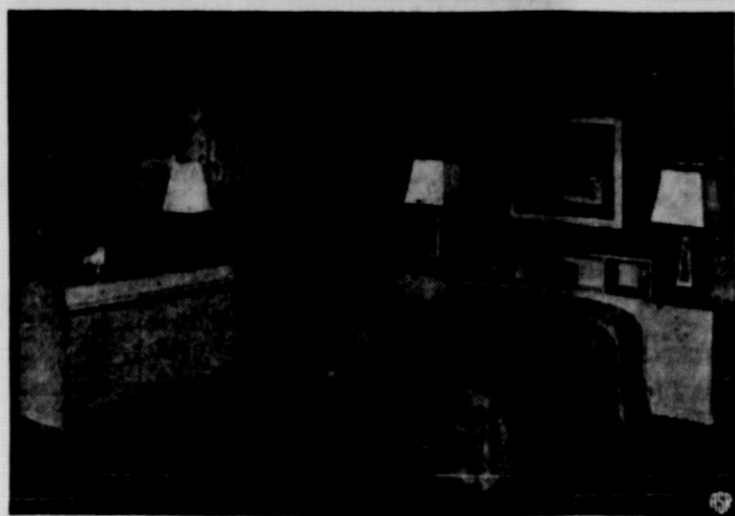

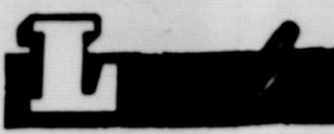

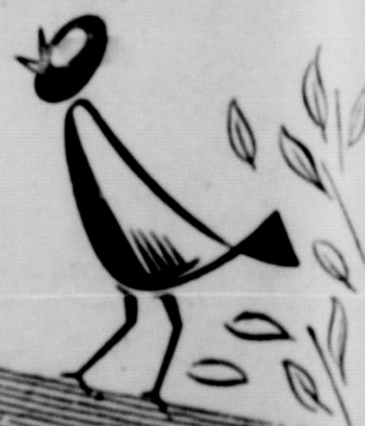
