





reduced crop yields materially and tightened up credit condi ons, to the extent that many farmers were unable to finance crop plantings. Disaster loans are now available in each couny. Farmers who have sustained production losses on crops and ivestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and ma terials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs, and ther expenses incident to the production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under auhority of Public Law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources

Most ranges have a porcelain-enamel finish, therefore range care usually means porcelain enamel care. For example, there's the tomatoes, or fruits - left in spots on the surface. They may stain it sistant, but unless you are sure of your range it's best not to take chances. You'll be absolutely safe if you wipe them of immediately with a dry cloth or paper towel Then, when the range has cooled wipe with a damp cloth sprinkled with baking sods.

It's always wise to wait until the range has cooled before using a cold damp cloth because sudden emperature changes on some range enamels may cause "crazing Crazing shows up as a fine network of cracks that definitely and per-manently mar the appearance of the surface. Always be careful, too not to drop heavy objects on the surface or hit them against it this, too, can cause had chips or Crazing.

Never use harsh abrasives is, scratchy cleaners - on the top of a range. A safe product is baking it cleans without scratching. Soda emulsifies grease, le spots, quickly whisks away fruit and other acid stains. To clean the range surface with soda, just sprinkle the soda directly on the surface and then soil away with a d


