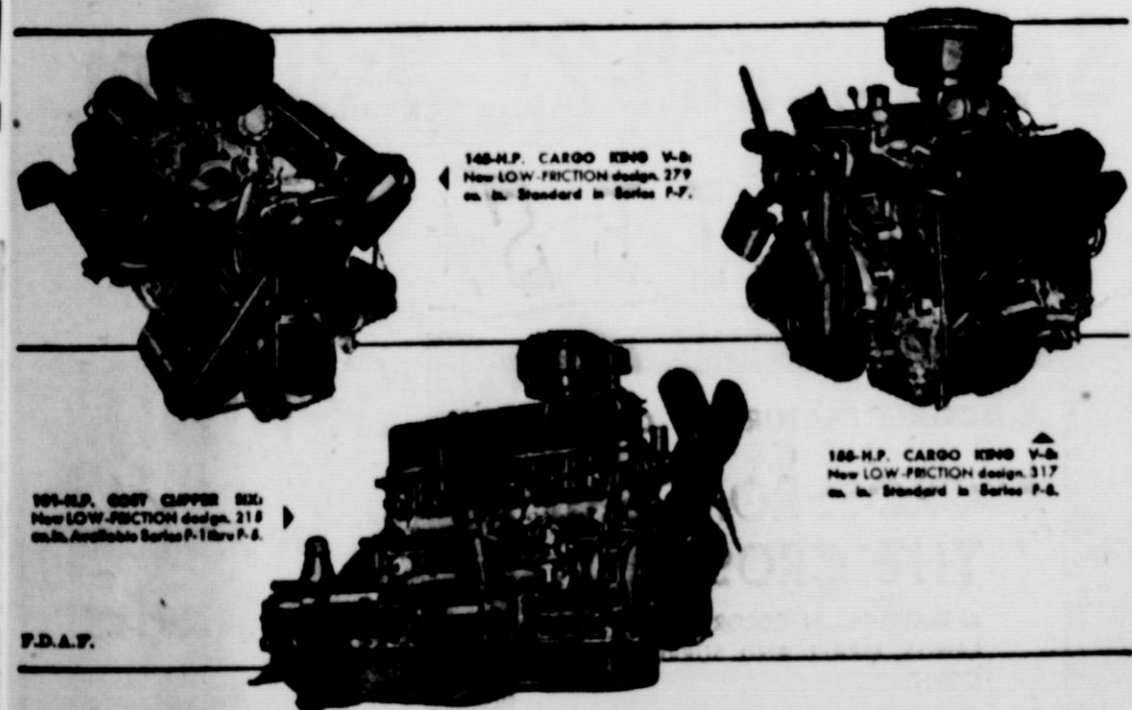

Motley Farmers Eligible For Disaster Loans

All Texas counties are now under designation as disaster areas by proclamation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The action qualifies farmers who have suffered crop losses and who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere for loans from the Farmers Home Administration to put in 1952 crops. Announcement of the designation was made at Dallas, headquarters of the Farmers Home Administration by L. J. Cappelman State Director.

Bad weather conditions in 1951 reduced crop yields materially and tightened up credit conditions, to the extent that many farmers were unable to finance crop plantings. Disaster loans are now available in each county. Farmers who have sustained production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs, and other expenses incident to the production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds needed to plant a crop this year. Before a loan is made a County Committee of three farmers must certify that the applicant suffered a substantial production loss. Farmers may apply for loans at the office of County Supervisor, S. W. Weatherall, located at the Courthouse in Matador, Texas.

Funds will be available to ranchmen whose herds have been depleted by the drought. They can borrow to restock their pastures.

Farmers who qualify under the disaster loan regulations may discuss their needs with the county supervisor.

Better farming practices are emphasized in the FHA loan program. These will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant.

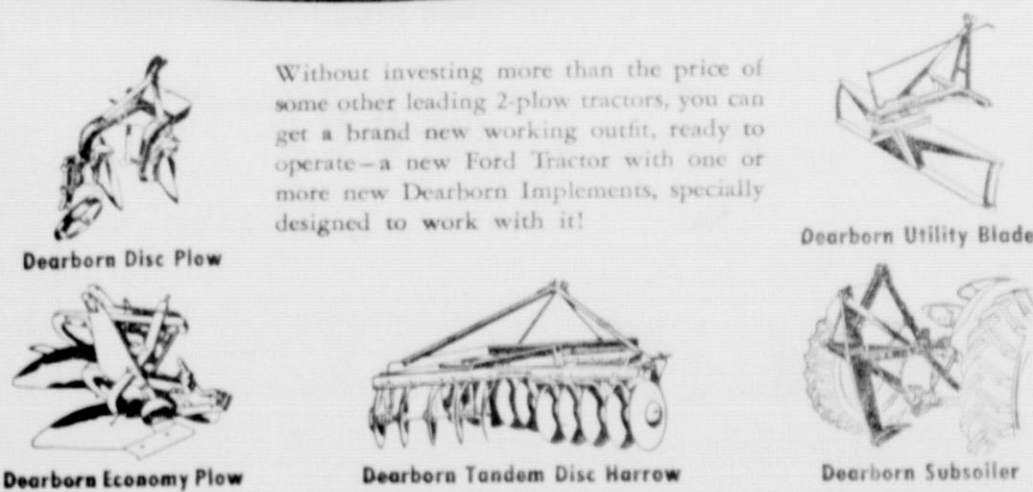

SODA ON THE RANGE



How many ranges get the care they deserve day to day, meal to meal? Yet a few minutes time when it is most needed will keep a range sparkling and efficient. Here are a few pointers to keep in mind.

Most ranges have a porcelain-enamel finish, therefore range care usually means porcelain-enamel care. For example, there's the problem of food acids—milk, tomatoes, or fruit—left in spots on the surface. They may stain it. Some range enamels are acid-resistant, but unless you are sure of your range it's best not to take chances. You'll be absolutely sure if you wipe them off immediately with a dry cloth or paper towel. Then, when the range has cooled, wipe with a damp cloth sprinkled with baking soda.

It's always wise to wait until the range has cooled before using a cold damp cloth because sudden temperature changes on some range enamels may cause "cracking". Cracking shows up as a fine network of cracks that definitely and permanently mar the appearance of the surface. Always be careful, too, not to drop heavy objects on the surface or hit them against it—this, too, can cause bad chips or cracking.

Never use harsh abrasives—that is, scratchy cleaners—on the top of a range. A safe product is baking soda. It is non-abrasive which means it cleans without scratching. Soda emulsifies grease, loosens burnt-on spots, quickly whisks away fruit and other acid stains. To clean the range surface with soda, just sprinkle the soda directly on the surface and then wipe it and the soil away with a damp cloth.

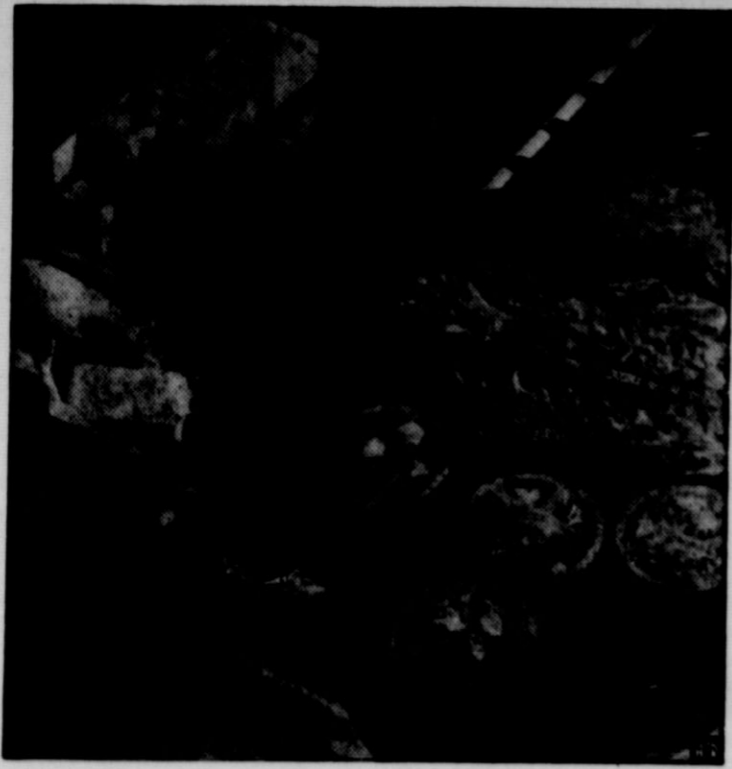

 clared, "and I believe it can be solved through a tax on natural gas produced from Texas wells. The recent gas tax law which was designed to collect 9/20 of 1 per cent per 1,000 cubic feet of gas, has resulted in the big gas companies paying the tax under protest which means that monies needed by the Texas education system is being held up."
 "I propose to raise the tax on the big pipeline distributing companies from 9/20 of 1 per cent to one per cent per 1,000-cubic feet of natural gas and place a floor on the price at the

well so that the tax will be paid by the eastern consumer and the distributing companies. It is the one certain and fair solution of the school finance problem. Natural resources will bear the burden."
 "I highly approve the Gilmer-Aiken law which makes each school district directly responsible for the failure or success of its program. Before attending this meeting I felt the GA law was dictatorial but this is not true. It is a new, modern streamlined educational plan and it was designed by honest, experienced and sincere men."
 Lion Reeves said the guaranteed program assures one teacher for each room of 24 to 26

children and assures school bus transportation for each child living two miles or more from the school.

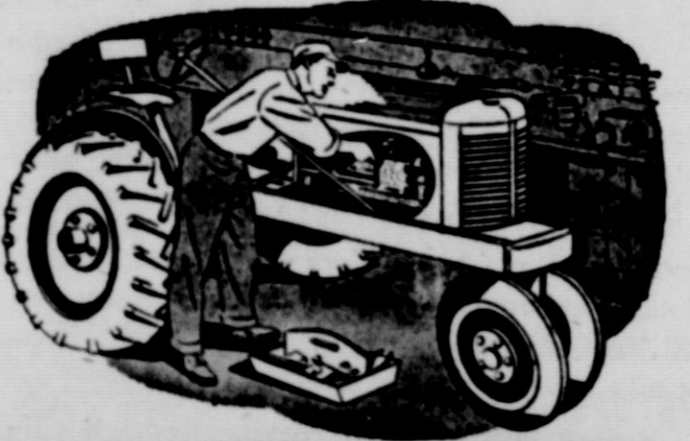
