The action followed advice through the League of Texas Municipalities. Mr. Cox, who is a disabled veteran of World War II, signed the prepared ordinance form with mayor Douglas Meador, which placed his position on an appointive basis, and abolished the elective method of naming a city secretary.

Light Cases Of Polio Reported

Three light cases of polio have been reported during the past week out of Motley county. Dr. J. S. Stanley declared Tuesday that two patients, Mrs. P. B. Barham of Flomot and Truman Dobbins (about 10) son of Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Tooke of Roaring Springs, are receiving treatment in Stanley clinic for polio symptoms. The small son of Mr. and Mrs. Carol Pierce of Roaring Springs is receiving treatment in a Lubbock hospital for what is believed to be a light form of polio.

Dr. Albert C. Traweck, Jr., said Tuesday that he had treated the small daughter (about two) of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Henley of Odessa, former Motley county residents, for symptoms which might be described as polio. The little girl was here last week with her mother visiting relatives.

Altho doctors were reluctant to describe the outbreak of cases as an epidemic condition, they said that polio, even in a light form, warranted strict precautions, especially with regard to sanitary measures.

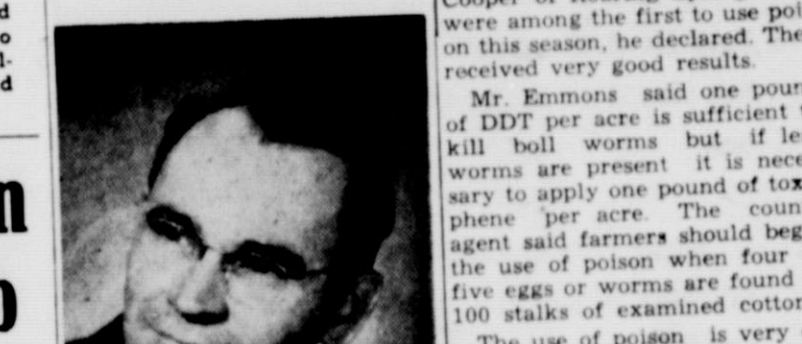
Cotton Menaced by Boll Worm Invasion

PLANS STARTED TO SECURE 150 PINTS BLOOD FOR KOREA

Water Users Are Quick To Respond
Matador water-users are cooperative and they read the Tribune. Last week the newspaper asked water customers to "break the peak load" by watering lawns and gardens on even calendar days when homes face the south and west, and to use water for irrigation on uneven days when homes face the north and east.

The response was immediate as soon as the Tribune was circulated by Friday noon, according to Water Superintendent Leo Burns. Despite the excessive heat and continued drought, users divided the peak load and he was able to store a surplus.

If you are worried about the water being off for about 45 minutes Tuesday evening, here is your answer. It was an accident Mr. Burns had all storage facilities full about noon Tuesday. About two P. M. a thunder storm caused the pump switches to break. Mr. Burns was busy at the time and did not notice the pumps were stopped until the "heavy load" was upon him. It was necessary to stop the big pump for about 45 minutes until a reserve could be collected from the wells.

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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:
 "Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be sub-

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

providing an amendment to Ar-ticle III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addi-tion of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medi-cine; providing that such stu-dents shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; provid-ing certain restrictions and lim-itations; providing for an elec-tion and the issuance of a pro-clamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) mem-bers whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be pre-scribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medi-cal Education Fund and make adequate appropriations there-for to be used by the State Medi-cal Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medi-cine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. This term "rural areas" as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitu-tional Amendment shall be sub-mitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an elec-tion to be held on the first Tues-day after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following: "FOR the Constitutional A-mendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desir-ing to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot.

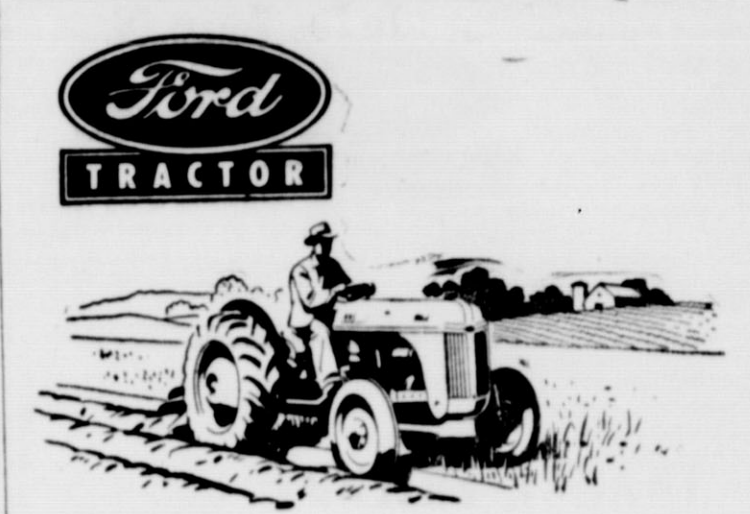
leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amend-ment; and if it shall appear from a majority of said election that in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Tex-as.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall is-

sue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publica-tion and election for such amend-ment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.
