## William Fowler Is New Head Of Indian Cattle Association

Ashland, Kan.—Wm. Y. Fowler, III has been named manager of the Mesquero Indian Cattle Growers' Association, Mesquero New Mexico. He will be in charge of livestock and business offices. Fowler becomes the first manager under the new plan of management whereby the Indians have complete charge of operations.

The ranch embraces 472,320 acres in Otero County, N. M. It is heavily covered with Pine Cedar and Mesquite. Only about 70,000 acres is open country. The Indians run 9,909 commercial Hereford cows under 165 different brands. There is a registered herd numbering 400 head. Also on the ranch is a horse breeding program consisting of 2 stallions and 50 brood mares. The only farm land on the ranch is 200 acres of irrigated alfalfa.

There are five summer camps and ten winter camps scattered over the ranch. The ranch also operates a wagon. The camp men and wagon boss are white men. There are 2 Mexicans employed on the outfit, but the rest of the force are Indians.

Fowler attended Texas A & M College and is a graduate in Agricultural Economics from Kansas State College, Manhattan. For several months in 1949 he worked on the Matador Ranch at Matador, Texas. Since that time he has been a veterans instructor at Ford and Ashland, Kansas.

He is married to the former Mary Helen Green, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mervin Green of Roaring Springs, Texas. The Fowlers have one daughter, Jane Ann.

## GAS WASTE COSTING TEXAS MOTORISTS

Impatience, negligence and incompetence—the three cardinal sins of the gasoline wastrel—are costing Texas motorists more than \$222,500,000 annually or about \$87 for each vehicle owner, according to a recently published study by one of America's topflight automotive engineers.

After a series of controlled mileage tests lasting more than a year, Delmar G. Roos, former president of the society of Automotive Engineers, has concluded that the average motorists gets less than half the motoring miles he should out of a gallon of gasoline.

The primary causes of gasoline wastage says Mr. Roos, who is also vice-president of Willys-Overland Motors, are speed, mechanical negligence and sloppy driving habits.

"Speed alone cuts mileage almost in half," Mr. Roos says. "In rigidly controlled tests over a measured mile, a Willys station wagon consistently averaged 31 miles per gallon at 30 miles an hour. However, at 60 miles an hour, mileage was cut considerably."

Heading a list of mechanical sins lumped in Mr. Roos' study under "negligence" are faulty spark settings, cylinder compression and tire pressures. Each of these factors cuts gasoline efficiency between three and six per cent—and costs the motorist between one and two cents extra for each mile he drives.

"Tire pressure is a good example of the high price of carelessness," Mr. Roos says. "When tire pressures were four pounds lower than they should be, the station wagon averaged one mile less per gallon of gas. At average gasoline prices this bit of carelessness alone would cost the motorist more than a penny a mile."

Other common mechanical

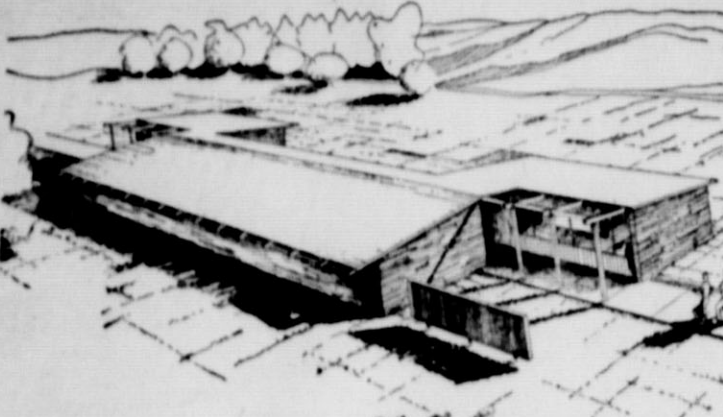

This drawing of Boys' Ranch's first permanent unit in the new expansion program was chosen from a group of 20 plans submitted by members of the Fifth Year Architectural Class at Texas A.M.

The unit will house 24 boys, 4 to a room, and has a large living and recreation room. Also, there are quarters for a man and his wife, who will supervise the group of boys living in the building, thus providing closer contact and opportunity for better guidance and individual attention.

Members of the A.M. class spent three days, last December at the Ranch, and went back to A.M. to compete for the best unit design. Then the best portions of each design were consolidated to make the final plan, which is tailored to the type of boys living at the Ranch, and the life they lead, together on all the other proposed buildings and a 25-year sit plan as a class project.

Boys' Ranch expansion has been made necessary by an increasing number of requests to help homeless and unwanted boys and boys who are in trouble. Beside housing, a vocational school, large grade and high school, and increased recreational facilities are planned.

The Ranch boys will do much of the work under qualified supervision and various labor unions have volunteered their help. Construction blueprints for the new unit were drawn by O. L. Johnson, architectural engineer of Amarillo. Part of the funds for building have been allocated, and it is hoped that additional funds can be obtained to complete the first unit by September.

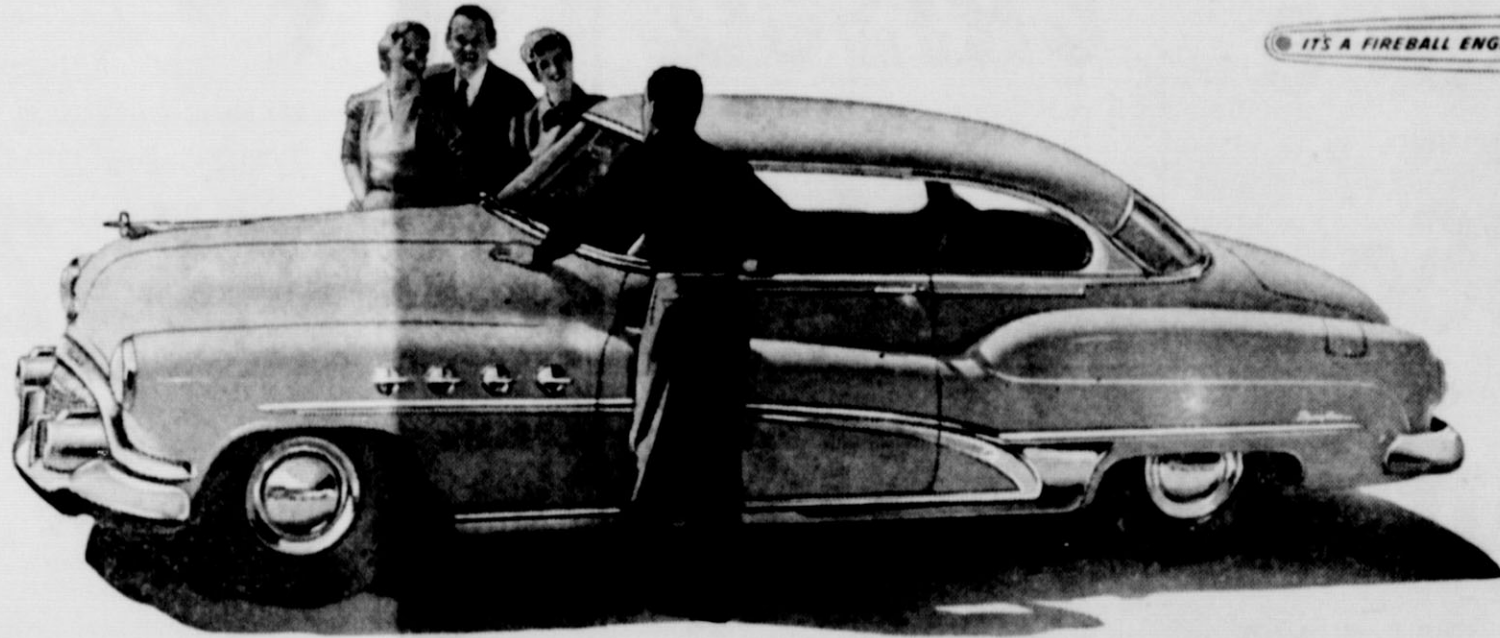

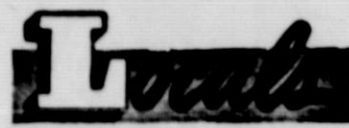
