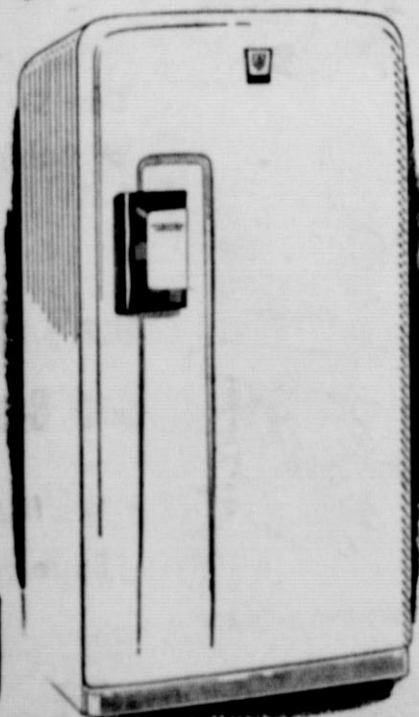

Herald Publisher Is Canadian Guest on Annual Ontario Tour

Van W. Stewart of Perryton, publisher of the Ochiltree County Herald, left Tuesday of last week for Windsor, Ontario, to join a group of 25 American newspaper men in the eighth annual Ontario Tour, sponsored by the Canadian government.

Each year the Ontario government plays hosts to a group of American newspaper editors and publishers and the participants are selected by various state press associations, from weekly or daily newspapers.

The 1951 invitation was extended to one representative from each of the 25 states selected. The tour starts on June 14 and ends on June 24.

The western group assembles at Windsor and the eastern group will meet at Buffalo, New York. Both groups will be flown to Toronto, arriving at the Malton airport together and then on down town for the official welcome.

The major part of the tour will be made in chartered motor coach, with rail, water and air transportation utilized when necessary. Overnight stops will be made in Toronto, Bigwin Inn, Kirkland Lake, Ottawa, Brockville, Lindsay and Niagara Falls. The tour will cover about 2,000 miles of the Ontario Province from the fruit belt in the south to the great gold producing areas of the north. Opportunities for various sports and fishing will be given.

All expenses of the tour are handled by the Ontario government.

A complete photographic record will be presented each member of the tour and in addition a color motion picture of the entire tour will be provided on a loan basis. Stewart said that he would secure the film as quickly as possible and have it available for civic clubs, if they desire.

The Herald publisher is the first Texas publisher to attend the tour, according to the Minister of Department and Travel of Ontario. He was president of the Texas Press Association last year, and is now chairman of the executive committee of the TPA.



Soldier Survives Six Years Entombment In Food Bunker

WARSAW, June 17—A German soldier buried alive six years ago in an abandoned food bunker has lived through his long entombment and now is in a hospital, reliable sources reported today.

from his subterranean prison 20 miles from Gdynia with a beard reaching his knees and his hair hanging almost to his ankles. Frightened Polish workers fled when he made his way into the daylight.

Second Man Dies

Another man staggered out behind him, informants said, but dropped and died of a heart attack at the moment of his deliverance.

This all happened in the last week of May. How they finally made their way out of the bunker was not explained by authorities who became concerned with the case. The survivor came from Berlin. He was 32 years old.

Officials in Gdynia were reluctant to discuss the case, but other sources who said they had knowledge of the man's experience said:

The German, hospitalized at Gdansk and being treated for blindness after spending the last two years of his imprisonment in total darkness, was the only survivor of six soldiers trapped in the bunker.

Blasted Bunker Closed
The Germans, retreating from the Russians, blasted the bunker entrance closed, unaware that six soldiers had entered the storeroom bent on stealing from the stocks of food, wine, tobacco and other stores.

There was plenty of food, cigarettes and matches for the imprisoned men.

Shortly after their entombment one man committed suicide. Another took his own life a few weeks later. Two others died of illness.

Dr. Jeff D. Ray, 90, writer, Christian philosopher and former teacher at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth for 37 years, died at 6 a. m. Monday in a Fort Worth hospital.

Dr. Ray became ill while on a train returning from Pelham, N. Y., where he and his wife had been visiting his daughter, Mrs. Edward M. Freeman.

Dr. Ray's column, "Your Problems and Mine" had appeared in the Star-Telegram since 1935. In addition Dr. Ray prepared a weekly Sunday School lesson for the paper.

In addition to the widow, he is survived by 1 son and 1 daughter, a daughter-in-law, 7 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren. Mrs. M. B. Carroll, Jr., of Henderson, wife of former Matador Baptist pastor, Rev. M. B. Carrolle Jr., is a granddaughter and Dr. Ray visited them during their residence here.
