Easement Rights Near Completion

OIL from the Motley County Roaring Springs Field will soon move to market through a pipeline which will intersect the Stanolind line at Whiteflat.

C. A. Prater, representative of the Scurlock Oil Company, Pacific Coast Building, Houston is securing easements for the pipeline right of way for the approximately 16 miles between the field and point of juncture.

An acre of land has been purchased from Jess Perkins for the erection of a pumping station at Whiteflat. The eight inch pipe line will have a capacity of about 8,000 barrels per day.

Construction has been made that construction of the line will start as soon as easements have been secured for the full length of the right of way.

The line will follow the old Matador Northern Railway right of way for part of the distance, according to reports, and pass Matador east of East Mound cemetery.

It has been estimated that construction of the line can be completed within approximately 30 days provided favorable weather is encountered and other factors affecting the work do not develop problems.

Winter Storm Sweeps Area

A bone-chilling winter storm that swept the nation over the weekend dropped the mercury here in the neighborhood of 30 degrees early Monday morning after the front passed. The great storm that left two dead in Texas and caused an estimated million dollars damage, hit with terrific force here.

Balmy southern winds through most of Sunday night, changed abruptly about 4 a. m. High winds out of the north brought 14-inch rainfall and resulted in some property damage.

Part of the roof was ripped from the Matador school gymnasium and pieces of roofing material were scattered about the campus when students arrived Monday morning.

A Flomot woman, Mrs. Joe Speer, will probably remember telephone operators kindly every time she hears a phone ring. She knows their services extend beyond the operation of switchboards.

At her home alone Tuesday, Mrs. Speer was stung on the shoulder by a wasp and became immediately ill. She reached her telephone and dialed the Matador operator, Mrs. Ruby Davis, explaining her plight, then Mrs. Speer lost consciousness with the receiver in her hand.

Another operator, Mrs. Inez Bailey took over the emergency and continued to call until Mrs. Speer recovered sufficiently to hang up the receiver so that another call could be made. Mrs. Bailey then called Mrs. Tom Spears at Spears Gin and she quickly went to her neighbor's aid.

Mrs. Speer was still in a semi-conscious condition. A doctor was summoned and medical aid was administered. Mrs. Speer is recovering satisfactorily.

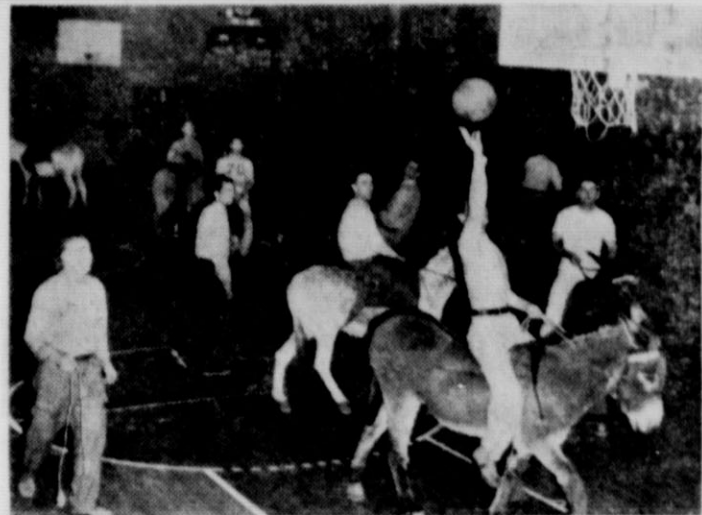

Dickens County is indebted to these two for their faithful and efficient services as members of the organization.

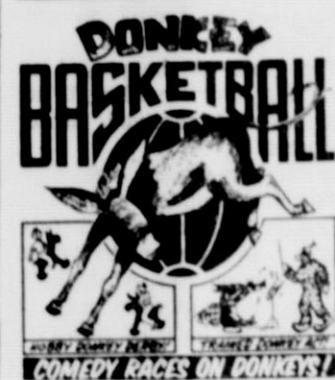
Afton Cotton Has Exceptional Yield

COTTON on the rich soil of Afton and Patton Springs areas, like most of West Texas, is producing unusual yields. Dempse Clifton, who operates the Jackson land south of Afton has gathered 70 bales from the "first time over" 90 acres of unirrigated land. He said he expects to harvest another 50 bales from the field.

Other unusual yields of "dry land" cotton are reported from throughout the Foot-hill Country. Ideal harvesting weather has made rapid gathering of the crop possible.
