He said it leaked as if smoke was coming from under the saddle house. He attempted to save his saddle and was met by a wall of flame. Eleven saddles hanging in the shed were destroyed at least five of them were made by the late H. H. Schweitzer famed craftsman, whose work is classed among the finest by riding men everywhere. Ranch manager Seth Sager lost two Schweitzer saddles in the fire, one being new and among the last ever made by Mr. Schweitzer.


