

# Veterans To Hold Sunset Memorial Service

MEMBERS of two World Wars take part in the Memorial service to be held Saturday on the courthouse square. The American Legion and Motley County Post of Foreign Wars have joined in the joint program beginning at 7 p. m. and continuing about 30 minutes.

F. J. "Shorty" Gordon will be in charge of the brief retreat ceremonies in which members of Matador Boy Scout Troop 60 will lower the flag. A firing squad and color guard will be composed of Legion and VFW members. Taps will be sounded by Albert Rattan.

Tentative plans include an address by Rep. Elbert Reeves. Invocation and benediction will be by Minister J. B. Tidmore. Legionnaires will place American flags early Saturday morning on the graves of Motley county war dead in East Mound cemetery.

The public is extended a cordial invitation to attend the Memorial service which will pay tribute to those who have given their lives for freedom. "Response to Memorial services by the people of this area has always been heartening," Mr. Gordon declared, "and the veteran feels the community's sentiment of gratitude which is, indeed, inspiring."

"While World War II is not eight years behind us, the memories of many veterans are focused on their comrades who did not return to their homeland. Memorial Day becomes highly significant to the veteran because it is a day of tribute to men who gave their lives to preserve our American way of life."

First State Bank and the Matador postoffice will remain closed in observance of the holiday. The bank will also observe Wednesday, June 3, (Jefferson Davis birthday), as a legal holiday, officials announced.

Old loves are like white pines fluttering silently out of time and distance and the depth of years. Meekly they watch the growing machinery of time and circumstance through soft, pink petals, and peek at hard crumpled paper like the breaking of little branches, and causes the little pines to spread, leaving a trace of a bridge shadow. Farmers and ranchers over a wide area between Tullia and Spur will meet in Flomot school gymnasium Monday night (June 1), in effort to secure REA telephone service.

Purpose of the meeting is to request the Tullia REA telephone system to extend lines meeting the Spur REA telephone system providing service for the large rural area which is now without communication. The Spur system is already extended as far north as Roaring Springs and has made plans to build new lines and provide service for a rural area east into Cottle county.

James Wright, manager of the Spur REA system and O. K. Woodall, manager of the Tullia system, will attend the meeting. Sponsors of the plan urge all farmers and ranchers interested in securing rural telephone service in the area to attend. The meeting will start at 8 p. m.

Leaders in the movement from the Flomot, Whiteflat area, are Joe Bloodworth, Furman Vinson and J. C. (Doc) Burleson. Adequate telephone service has become essential to every progressive farming and stock-raising community, they declared, and the opportunity of extending modern communication lines into the territory warrants full cooperation of residents.

They remained there until 1906, when they moved to the Flomot community, which was just being settled, and located on the river, south of the townsite, where they lived for thirty-seven years. Seven of their nine children were born there. In 1944 they moved into Flomot, where they have lived since.

Assembly will be at 8 o'clock a. m. and continue until 11 a. m. Included in the daily program will be a film, which will depict a Biblical story.

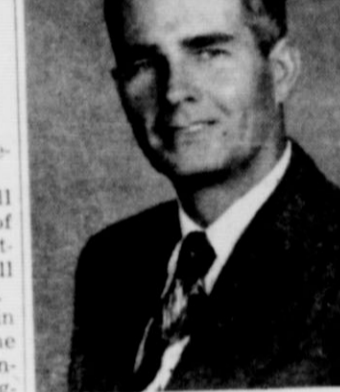

We will be in a position to operate the elevator by next year and to provide adequate elevator service for this area."

## "Phantom Harvest" Of Wheat Started

Harvest has started of Motley county's "phantom" wheat crop. Yesterday, Ben Keltz of the Whiteflat community harvested about 15 acres which produced only 8 bushels per acre.

Clarence Jenkins of the Fairview community told a Tribune reporter he might harvest 40 to 50 acres which he estimated might produce 6 to 8 bushels per acre. Mr. Jenkins said he was adjusting his self-propelled harvester to "go down and cut the low wheat."

No estimate has been made of the county's crop but it is probable the total yield will be the lowest in the past ten years.

### "Blood Economy" Is Opposed By Legion

The Texas Department of the American Legion with Legionnaires from every other state in the union squared off today for a knock down and drag out battle against a 285 million dollar Veterans Administration slash proposed by the Federal Bureau of the Budget.

In a chain reaction starting with National Commander Lewis K. Gough and extending down to 18,000 American Legion posts 794 in Texas, Legionnaires girded for what Gough termed "the most critical period in American Legion history since the economy act of 1933".

Today State Commander Albert D. Brown, Jr., wired Texas' 22 congressmen and two United States senators urging they go before the subcommittee of the House Appropriations and fight against the proposed slash when the committee opens hearings May 25.

Department Adjutant G. Ward Moody alerted every post commander and every post adjutant in Texas urging that they in turn contact their congressmen and prevent the proposed slash. **Cut To Affect Veterans**

"It will simply mean if this proposed economy is affected that thousands of Texas veterans now in Veterans Administration hospitals will be thrown into our already crowded state and local hospitals," Brown said. "With Texans being wounded all the time in Korean conflict, the proposed cut will simply mean that these service men will also have to be taken care of by the state and their own communities," the state commander declared.

The American Legion from the post to national level, according to National Commander Gough will ask that the Veterans Administration budget

should not be less than \$921,000,000 for administrative, medical, hospital and domiciliary services alone.

"We can't believe that the administration is for a blood economy such as outlined. Surely economics can be affected somewhere without taking away facilities for caring for our sick and wounded who already need it and the additional ones that will need attention as long as the Korean conflict goes on," he declared.

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## Highlights and Sidelights FROM your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Texas—Is Governor Allan Shivers going to run for a third term?

That question came up at the tail end of a legislative session which has failed to accomplish major parts of the governor's program.

Governor Shivers has said that he wants to see his program completed.

Questioned by reporters, the governor replied that he "might some day" make another political race.

Asked directly whether he planned to run for another term as governor, Shivers responded: "I don't know. But there have been lots of people nice enough to suggest it. I have always said that I want to do whatever the majority of the people want."

One part of Governor Shivers' program that failed in the Legislature was a pay raise for teachers.

The solons were ready to give the pedagogues an additional \$300 per year, but the teacher lobby held out for \$600 or nothing.

Thus the teachers got nothing. Their hope now is that a tax on natural gas, passed by the Legislature two years ago and now being tested in the courts, will be finally approved.

Should that happen, it is expected that the governor will call a special session of the Legislature to appropriate the money that the state has been collecting under the terms of the tax.

The money has been piling up unspent pending the final outcome of the court action.

The state now has \$15 million of this money, and collections are continuing at the rate of about \$1 million per month.

Last week, attorneys for some of the gas companies involved asked the state supreme court to reconsider its opinion upholding the tax.

If the court stands by its original decision, the gas companies may either drop their suit or take it to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Governor Shivers has predicted that the state can begin spending the money later this year.

He wants to use it for teacher pay increases, salary boosts for state employees, and construction of needed state buildings.

Three Texas officials returned from Washington, where they testified before a Senate committee in regard to the states' claims to the continental shelf.

The Texas representatives were Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, Attorney General John Ben Shepperd and Railroad Commissioner William J. Murray.

They all expressed gratification that President Eisenhower had signed a bill returning title to the tidelands to the states.

As he signed the bill, the president said, "I will always resist federal encroachment upon rights and affairs of the states."

As a result of the bill, Texas keeps its "historic boundary", which extends 10 1/2 miles into the Gulf of Mexico. Oil wells have already been drilled in this submerged land.

Austin, teeming with lawmakers and lobbyists for three months, took on a quieter aspect this week, not only because of the legislature's adjournment, but also because University of

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Texas and other students left for summer vacations.

### TWO-MILE PARADE IS SCHEDULED FOR CROSBYTON RODEO

A two-mile long parade will open the Sixth Annual Crosbyton Rodeo for a three-day run Thursday, June 4. Three performances will be given beginning at 8 p. m. each night, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 4, 5 and 6.

Two new events have been added to the Crosbyton Rodeo this year, and prize money has been increased to \$1,800. The cutting horse contest, an open event in which Motley county cowboys are invited to enter, carries an entrance fee of \$25 to which a \$150 purse will be added. Elimination contest for this feature will be held Wednesday night, June 3. The second new event will be a wild horse race.

Crosbyton's RCA approved rodeo is fast becoming known as one of the fastest and best conducted small rodeos in West Texas. Stock for the rodeo events is furnished by Bob Estes of Baird, a former world champion cowboy. There will be special numbers, such as the rodeo clown and special riding and roping acts.

### Reveals Sponsors New Economic Index Law To Take 18% Bite Out Of School Burden

ARLINGTON (Special)—The state has a new economic index which designates the amount each county will have to contribute toward \$45,000,000 of local school property of the state's public school program.

The new law provides a method of distributing the local educational fund more equitably according to Representative Elmer Reeves, sponsor of the new law in the House. This is due to the fact that the new set-up is more sensitive to economic changes and makes it possible to have a more up-to-date check on these changes.

The Commissioner of Education will refigure the index annually using three-year average data as measured by manufacturer's prices, agriculture and minerals, agriculture and minerals, Reeves said. He added that the index was refigured only once in the four years, under the old law, using data for the latest year available.

Index Inadequate  
Experience with the old index system of figuring school taxes was inadequate for keeping up with economic changes, Reeves said. Droughts and failures, droughts and failures, the new one is believed to be adequate. "As a matter of fact, tabulations already made by the Texas Education Agency show that under the new law less than half of the counties will have been suffering from severe droughts and other financial set-backs in recent years," Reeves said.

As figured by the Commissioner of Education in 1951, the present economic index would have had two more years to run. Already the local fund assignment by the old method has gotten out of adjustment in a number of counties.

**To Control Assignments**  
According to the Economic Index formula, it is not possible to be accurate in using the statistical data available at the time in setting up the local fund assignments. Therefore, the new law provides that during the next two years no county's local fund assignment will be increased more than 10% over its previous assignment. At the end of the two-year period, however, each county's assignment will be whatever it comes out according to the formula.

Factors by which the index was determined, and importance placed on each, are assessed valuation of property, 29 per cent; scholastic population of county, 8 per cent; and income of county as measured by manufacture, minerals, agriculture, and retail wholesale and service establishment payrolls, 72 per cent.

**Four Counties Lower**  
The local funds assigned to each county under the 3-year average index adjusted so that no county is given an assignment that exceeds the assignment under the present index by more than 10% and the per cent of decrease of the adjusted assignment under the new law would affect Childress county by decreasing their local fund assignment by 16.80%, Donley county 19.31%, Motley county 18.52% and Hall county an increase of 6.98%.

The new law was sponsored by Senator A. J. Rogers of Childress in the Senate, as S. B. 163.

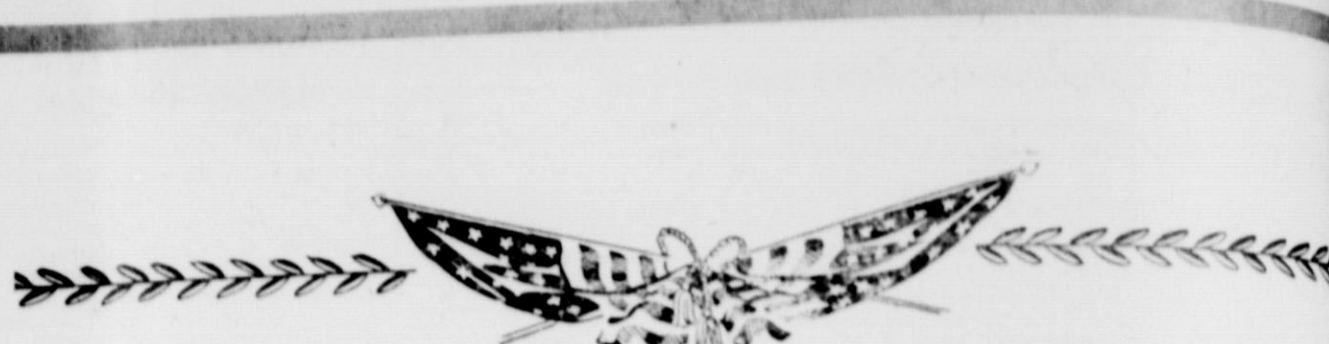
