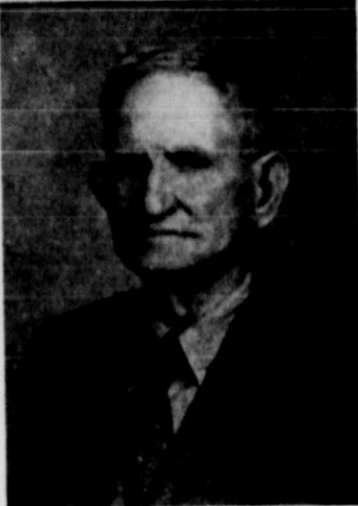

Rites Held For Pioneer

L. A. (Gus) Stearns, 85, a resident of Motley county for 56 years, died early Sunday in a Vernon hospital, following more than a year of failing health. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 p. m. at the First Baptist church, of which Mr. Stearns had been a deacon since 1912.

Rev. Bruce Oliver, pastor of the church, assisted by Methodist pastor Rev. W. V. O'Kelly and Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister, officiated. Following Masonic graveside rites, interment was made in Matador East Mound cemetery under the direction of Eudy Seale Funeral Home. Pallbearers were H. K. Ford, D. E. Pitts, R. E. Campbell, Sr., Bill McCaghen, Bill Pipkin, Rufus Emmons, Randall Whitworth and J. L. Woodruff.

Lawson Augustus Stearns was born in Georgia, July 22, 1868 and moved with his family to Texas in 1869.

City May Seal Doom For Dogs

Packs of stray dogs roaming Matador have become an emergency problem with the outbreak of rabies (hydrophobia) reported in Amarillo. Parents of young children are alarmed at the danger and have requested the city council to take some kind of effective action.

The council will meet in special session today in an effort to reach a satisfactory plan. In the meantime owners of pets are requested to have them vaccinated (information regarding veterinary service may be obtained from County Agent Bill Pailmeyer) and in the event of a rabies outbreak to save serious complications and dangers.

Matador is not going to the dogs. The dogs have come to Matador in unprecedented numbers. The problem of destroying stray dogs is not as simple as it may appear. The possibility of destroying some child's pet or some valuable dog must be considered. The city has an ordinance which makes it mandatory that all dogs be vaccinated.

The city solicits the cooperation of the citizens in the problem, especially during the wave of rabies epidemic which is reported in several Texas cities.

Farm Bureau President Will Speak In Matador

J. Walter Hammond of Tye, Texas, President of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation is coming to Matador. He will speak here March 8 at a membership "kickoff" meeting. It was announced this week by officials of the county organization.

A meeting of the county organization directors was held Friday evening in the Commissioners' Court room where plans were started for the annual membership drive. The meeting was preceded by a supper at Waybourn's Cafe. President Varner McWilliams served as chairman and the group named John Ray Hunter as vice-president, and Melvin Thacker of Roaring Springs director.

Definite plans for the membership "kickoff" have not been made and place of the meeting will be announced next week. Officials here Monday said they would ask State Representative Elbert Reeves to introduce President Hammond.

The dynamic president of Texas Farm Bureau Federation has been instrumental in attaining a membership of 53,000 farmers in Texas, with organizations in 183 counties. Eighty six counties have full-time Farm Bureau offices.

The Farm Bureau has supported and secured passage of over 200 pieces of legislation since 1920 that have been beneficial to farmers and ranchers. In the last legislature the Farm Bureau supported 30 measures that passed, opposed 7 measures that failed, supported 6 measures that failed. No bills passed over Farm Bureau opposition. Over 1,500,000 farm families in the United States and Puerto Rico make up the American Farm Bureau Federation. It is the largest and most powerful farm organization in the world.

Meeting In Lubbock An important meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau will be held in the Lubbock Hotel, February 27, beginning at 10 a. m. Announcement made this week said the meeting would include a discussion of the Farm Bureau policy execution. Members are urged to attend.

Patton Springs (Afton) FFA livestock judging team won third place last week in the Houston fat stock show. Taking part in the contests were 180 other teams and 543 individual contestants.

The Afton team included Red Dunlap, Doc Edwards and Jimmy Legg, coached by Odie Holly, vocational agriculture teacher.

In addition to the team placing Dunlap and Legg were third and fourth respectively high individuals in the entire contest. Each boy received a registered beef heifer, sponsored by the business men of Houston. The animals are to be shown in Houston in 1955 in the Junior show division.

The team received an attractive plaque and individuals received a silver medal. Coach Holly was on the Texas Tech dairy judging team in 1933. He was high individual on the winning dairy team and 2nd high individual on the livestock team winning at Ft. Worth that year.

ANDY HURST BUYS STORE IN SUDAN; TO LEAVE MATADOR

Andy Hurst, manager of Gabriel's Department store here since June 1950, last week purchased Salem's Department store in Sudan, in a partnership with Frankie Gabriel, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Gabriel of Spur.

Mr. Hurst will manage the Sudan store while his young partner completes his education at Baylor University. In the transaction Mr. Gabriel sold his interest in the Matador store to his son.

The present stock of merchandise here will go on sale today with the sale continuing through Monday. Tuesday the store will be closed and all the unsold merchandise will be moved to Sudan to augment the stock in the new store.

In the meantime Mr. Gabriel will move a new stock of merchandise here and continue to operate Gabriel's Department store in Matador. Mr. Hurst said he did not know who would manage the store here.

The Sudan store which had been operated by Joe Salem for 20 years will be operated under the new name of the G&H Department store. Mr. Salem will retire from business.

Cafe Open Under New Management

Bob's Oil Well and Bob's Cook Shack cafe is opening this week under new management. Clyde Warren of Tulsa, Oklahoma, brother of Melvin (Wildhorse) Warren of Matador, has leased the cafe and filling station and will operate both on a 24-hour basis.

Mr. and Mrs. Warren and their three children have moved to Matador to make their future home. Previous to coming here Mr. Warren operated the Silver Castle cafe in Tulsa, located on Highway 66. He has been in the cafe business for approximately 10 years.

Approach Planned Through Shivers

A PETITION for aid in the drought-stricken area of West Texas, declared to be the worst in the nation, will be made to President Eisenhower. The request was formulated Friday in Childress at a meeting of county judges from seven counties in the area. The counties represented were Motley, Cottle, Childress, Collingsworth, Crosby, King and Dickens.

Motley County Judge Vance Gilbreath organized the meeting last week and made arrangements with Childress county judge Richard D. Bird for it to be held in Childress.

A report of the meeting in the Sunday issue of the Childress Index, is as follows: "Possibly seven more counties in the area, considered the worst drought-stricken section in the United States, will be asked to join the seven meeting here (Childress) Friday.

"They will be asked but must endorse the projects we have worked out for immediate relief or they will not be invited to go," said Motley County Judge Vance Gilbreath who called the Friday meeting.

"The seven in session here Friday, along with Commissioner Boone Simpson of Northfield in Motley county, will go to Austin to confer with Gov. Allan Shivers and ask him to make the appointment for them with Eisenhower.

"The projects discussed by the judges and commissioners were classified into two groups: One to give immediate relief and the second to bring prosperity to the area in the future.

"The projects to be taken to Eisenhower are as follows: "1. The use of surplus commodities to feed needy families who are now asking direct relief from the counties that are now in most instances over their budget limit for charity.

"2. Immediate funds for the building of roads, bridges and fences in the county which will give work to many who do not now have money for groceries.

State Highway Department last December to Dean Skinner, Austin contractor, for a bid of \$386,634.

New Northern Outlet

When the strip is completed the livestock and agriculture area below the Cap Rock will have a shorter and more direct outlet to the north, including Amarillo, Pampa, Borger, Perryton and other points. Estimates have been made that the new road will shorten the route to Amarillo 15 to 20 miles. The route is across rugged country affording some of the best scenery in the Panhandle. Highway 70 crosses US Highway 287 at Clarendon and US Highway 66 at Jerico 18 miles north.

Scenic Route Open

One of the most scenic roads in Texas is the new paving east of Silvertown, down the Cap Rock and connecting with Highway 70 at Red River. It is reached from here by driving Highway 86 through Quitaque to the top of the Cap and taking first lane dirt road north or driving to Y on 86 east of Silvertown, then following the new paving off the Cap Rock. At this point the view is breath-taking and the road some of the finest in the state. The route is only about 10 miles farther to Amarillo (via Brice, Clarendon and Gulf, Colorado (237) into Amarillo) but has nine miles of unpaved road southwest of Red River.

"The immediate distribution of federal gasoline taxes of one and a half cent a gallon back to the counties in the drought area to give additional monies to be expended for public works on community roads to give additional work to those in need.

"4. Public funds be made available at one and a half cent interest such as are now made to REAs for water districts to build dams for water for municipal and irrigation purposes.

"5. Immediate re-activation of the Childress Army Air Field which provided employment for citizens throughout this area during World War II. In addition the project the group disagreed with the recent action of the Air Force in which it was announced that the government would buy or lease land to open new air fields without taking advantage of land and property owned already.

"6. Liberalize credit to landowners who now owe money on their lands and homes at a high rate of interest.

"Gilbreath explained how the Childress meeting came about: "We (the Commissioners Court) were in session Monday and we were discussing how to help our citizens who were broke or going broke and wanted work to buy groceries.

Drought Blamed
"We realized that the condition in our area was not caused by either the Democrats or the Republicans but was caused by the extended drought. We knew that most of the residents of our county had borrowed, possibly the limit, and that at least 80 per cent of those people would gladly take jobs if work were offered.

"While we were still in session I called some other judges and learned conditions in their counties were about the same—that their budgets would not take care of the direct relief.

"We checked the long-range weather forecast and learned that crop prospects were not good for months to come and that even a crop this year would help little because of allotments, so I called Childress County Judge Richard D. Bird and asked if a meeting could be held here.

Templeton Talks
"Daily I am being called upon to provide either work or groceries and to people who have been set back by the drought," said County Judge R. L. Templeton of Wellington.

"I feel that the condition is to a great extent confined to the drought area but that it will spread unless stopped and stopped by projects that employ our people."

Templeton recommended the return of the gasoline tax to drought stricken counties for relief projects and water damming projects for municipal purposes, financed by the government at a low rate of interest.

"Eisenhower has the setup for public works projects to help such areas as ours and I feel that we should go to the man who can start those projects," Templeton added.

"We have been cutting down our road and bridge projects in order to take care of charity," Bird told the group.

"I am in favor of public works projects assistance in this drought stricken area before we send money overseas."

"We have people—good people to see us every day, asking for help. They are not people asking for charity. They are asking for work and they need work to buy groceries," he added.

Bird suggested the completion of the Northfield Road to Matador as a public works project.

Crosby County Judge J. M. Rankin brought out the unusual situation in his county which produced 91,000 bales of cotton last year yet has farmers going broke daily.

"Part of our county is irrigated and those farmers are doing all right while our dryland farmers, about two-thirds of the county, are going broke and abandoning their farms," Rankin said.

"And our county is not in shape to help."

Dickens County Judge W. H. Hindman said that his county was not in too bad a shape financially yet but that it would be before long.

Cottle County Judge A. A. Payne said that his county is "up against it now and had to have help."
