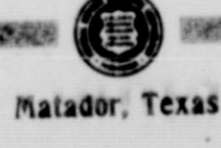

New Bill Would Allow Cities More Authority

AUSTIN—(Special)—Texas cities should have the right to levy taxes without intervention from the State, according to State Representative Elbert Reeves of Matador.

Reeves made the statement shortly after tossing House Bill 758 into the committee "hopper", which was one of the representative's last bills during the first 60 days of "Free time". Since March 13, all bills must have a four-fifths majority of the House to be introduced.

"My House Bill 758 is not to raise city taxes, but to allow cities to work out their own financial problems," he said.

Reeves said that the bill during the first 60 days of "Free time" would allow cities to raise their own taxes to pay for their own problems, and other obligations have been forced upon them without the State offering any means of financing such actions, the legislator pointed out.

At present, even without the additional obligations forced upon them by the State, cities are having serious financial troubles. This does not only pertain to the metropolitan cities, but to towns and villages as well.

In a report to the 53rd Legislature, the Texas Legislative

Council, composed of lawmakers from both the House and Senate, recommends that more taxing power be given to cities. At present the State is forcing a centralized control upon cities by assumption of more and more responsibility for raising taxes to support the local units of government and control of their programs, according to the report.

Reeves is sincerely interested in returning the power of local taxation back to local people," Reeves added. "And my bill simply offers this power to municipalities."

The state of Pennsylvania has had similar legislation for some time, and has found that it greatly aided in local problems and their finance.
