

A storm cloud which formed over this immediate area Saturday afternoon drove the opening wedge into the drouth when rain began falling here about 6:30 p. m. The cloud traveled in a northwesterly direction after leaving over half an inch in long-dusty rain gauges. During the same storm the rainfall was almost two inches on the Paul Patton farm about four miles east of Matador and in fhe Teepee Creek area water gaps were swept out with a three-inch deluge.



He said Blue Panic is better adapted to mixed and tight soils and that it has not proven successful on sandy soils. The county now has between 200 and 300 acres of Blue Panic, introduced here about 1949 by L. C. Harp.
