By 1910, when the area was beginning to develop, Gaines was one of 20 men who signed for the railroad to come to the district. He also helped erect the first church and school built by public subscription in Lamesa.

Arden Baseball Fan Throughout his life, Gaines has been an ardent baseball fan, and regularly attended Lamesa games until two years ago when he began to refrain from much outside activity.

Now Mrs. Gaines, who is 95, is bedfast. She had been an invalid for the last two years with a broken hip. Mr. Gaines, 91, is still able to get about, but stays rather close to their home at 306 S. Austin.

He also was very active in the Masonic Lodge and is the oldest deacon of the Lamesa First Baptist Church.

They can look back, however, over a lifespan which parallels the development of the South Plains.

Although the couple are "getting up in years", they still maintain their congeniality, a trait they have held throughout their lives.

The Gaines moved to Matador in 1891 where he operated a small ranch and worked for the Matador Ranch Co. In 1902, Gaines made the land rush from Big Spring and established a ranch 12 miles north of Lamesa.

Seven of their nine children are still living, including several in the South Plains. In addition to Mrs. Bailey, other children are, Mrs. Cloy Costin and Mrs.

**The World's Greatest Invention**

By James Sturdivant

The world's greatest invention is probably the lever. It is likely the first form of machine used by man. In fact our bodies consist of numerous intricate connections of levers that enable us to move or grasp objects.

Along with the lever are the other five basic machines, most of which work on the same principle as or are variations of the lever. These machines make many jobs easier and all our modern complicated machines are composed of them in such a way as to accomplish a certain piece of work which was originally done by hand.

The principle of the lever is that it takes less force in a long arm to move a greater weight through a shorter arm. To illustrate: If a lever is placed under the weight to be moved and over a stable object, then the force to be exerted at longer end is less than the force necessary to lift the weight directly the same distance as it is lifted by the short end of the lever.

The lever is said to have three parts: the load arm, the fulcrum, and the effort arm. The load arm is the end on which the object to be moved rests, the fulcrum is the stable point or axis of the lever, and the effort arm is the end upon which force is exerted.

There are also three classes of levers. In the first class lever the fulcrum is between the load and the effort, and in the second class lever the load is between the effort and the fulcrum. In the third class lever the effort is between the load and the fulcrum.

The wheel is a variation of the lever in which the center or axle is the fulcrum. When a single pulley wheel is used the weight of the lift is not changed because the distance from the center to the outside is the same at all points, making no difference in the distance from the load to the fulcrum. If two or more pulleys are used in series, the weight is less because the effort must travel more distance than the load.

The cog wheel is a lever in which the cog tooth is the load end and the axle is both the fulcrum and the effort end; thus a

smaller cog transmits more power than a large one.

These inventions constitute the working parts of most all modern machines, therefore, I think the lever is the most important invention of all.
