Talent Tops List For 4-H Contests

Talent or "Share-the-Fun" contests will top the list of county 4-H elimination contests scheduled for Tuesday evening (April 26th) at the high school auditorium (7:30 p.m.) it has been announced by County Agent Bill Palmeyer. Winners will be selected to represent Motley County in district contests scheduled at Wichita Falls, May 7th.

The Share-the-Fun contests have scheduled 12 different acts. Two entries have been made in safety demonstration, three in dairy team demonstration, four in vegetable preparation and four girls will enter the public speaking contests.

Out of county judges have been secured, Palmeyer said. The public is invited to see the type of training and demonstrations in which 4-H members are receiving instructions. Ribbons will be awarded according to placings, with the top entry eligible for district competition.

Other demonstrations will be presented on electricity, soil conservation, poultry production, vegetable production and farmer-coop activities.

Livestock, grass entomology and shrub identification, and rifle team members are currently being selected, Palmeyer said.

The tractor operator contest is scheduled at Roaring Springs for April 27. The program is under the supervision of Palmeyer, assisted by 4-H club leaders.

Cattle-King Show Slated At Paducah

One of the season's first western shows, the Cattle-King Horse and Colt Show and Rodeo, will be held in Paducah Friday and Saturday.

The registered quarter horse show will begin at 1 p.m. Friday, with the showing of halter classes. The show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association.

Registered junior and senior cutting contests will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday afternoon. Following the approved cutting contests, horsemen will compete in open cutting, open reining and a cutting contest restricted to ranch horses only.

Rodeo performances are slated for 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Stock will be furnished by Morris Stephens of Quitaque.

Rodeo events include bare back bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping and girls barrel race. Entries close at 6 p.m. Thursday.

Old settlers of Cottle and King counties will register at 9 a.m. Friday. Old timers may register if they have lived in either Cottle or King counties continuously for 40 years, or if they are 55 years of age and settled in either county prior to 1935.

The annual parade, with awards going to winning floats and riding clubs, will begin at 5 p.m. Friday. Following the parade, a chuck wagon dinner will be served at the rodeo grounds just east of Paducah on U.S. Highway 70.

Two dances, one in the Veterans Building and the other in Barn No. 3 at the fairgrounds, will be held on both Friday and Saturday nights.

Nose Count In Motley County Was 24 in 1880

Uncle Sam is counting noses in Motley County, in Texas and all of United States in the 18th decennial census. It is a big job because there are a lot of us now.

But back in 1880 when Uncle Sam first counted the people in the area that is now Motley County (before the county was organized) the census taker could find only 24 (some of them may have been transient buffalo hunters).

Ten years later in 1890 a total of 139 people were registered as residents according to records of Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census. In the next ten years, however, the boom in Motley County had a total population of 1,257 (an increase of nearly ten times that of 1890).

The population almost doubled in the next ten years, with the population registered at 2,396 in 1910. The census in 1920 showed the population of Motley County at 4,107. The year 1930 was the peak with a population of 6,812.

About that time the tractor began to change the country and shift the population. The tenant farmer and his large family were going elsewhere. The census of 1940 showed 4,994 residents in the county.

Ten years later the population had continued to drop and Motley County registered only 3,963 residents in 1950, which was slightly less than 1920.

It is interesting (and comforting) to note that the county's economic value is perhaps four times as great now as it was in 1930, altho the population has dropped more than a third. What will 1960 show?

Newest Oil Well Prolific Producer

BEST PRODUCING oil well in the West Roaring Springs Field has been completed by Perkins-Prothro Co. of Wichita Falls, according to a news item printed in the Tuesday edition of the Lubbock Avalanche. The well, a Promo-Penn project, is known as No. 1 Hamilton Brooks.

"It is the field's most prolific flowing well," the news article declared.

"On a 14-hour potential test it made 240 barrels of oil through perforations 4,128-40 feet after treating with 2,000 gallons of acid, plus 5 barrels of water.

"Tubing pressure was 25 pounds and casing pressure was 20 pounds. No choke size or gravity was reported.

"Calculated 24-hour flowing potential is 411.4 barrels of oil. "It is located 562 feet from north and 467 feet from east lines of Section 47, IRR survey, 3 miles east of Roaring Springs on 80-acre lease. Elevation is 2,411 feet, estimated."

The well is the third producer to be completed in the Roaring Springs West Field this year.

Study Scheduled To Measure Needs In Aging Problem

Plans are now underway to study the resources and needs of senior citizens in Motley County, Judge Elbert Reeves, county chairman of the Governor's Committee, White House Conference on Aging, has announced.

He urged persons interested in participating in the project and becoming a part of the county organization which will make the study to contact him at the court house, Matador.

A meeting will be called soon at which a county committee will be perfected and assignments will be made, the county chairman said.

Judge Reeves said that plans are to make a comprehensive investigation of every facet of the aged problem in this county.

The study will be divided into six parts: 1) Population Trends, and Research and Training; 2) Income and Employment; 3) Welfare; 4) Health; 5) Education and Recreation; and 6) Housing.

Committees will be appointed at the forthcoming meeting to cover each of these subjects.

"We especially need the assistance of professional people who deal with problems of the aged, as well as lay people who are interested in the aging problem, and the elderly people themselves to serve on these committees and help us with this work," Reeves said.

He said one of the primary purposes of the survey, not only on the State level but also on the local level, is to help middle-aged and older persons attain equal opportunity with others in engaging in gainful employment which they are capable of performing, thereby enjoying the benefits of their skills, experience and productive capacities.

"Gift of Added Years"

"We also hope the survey will result in assisting middle-aged and older persons to make preparations, develop skills and interests and find social contacts which will make the gift of added years of life a period of reward and satisfaction and avoid unnecessary social costs of premature deterioration and disability," he said.

"The study also will take a look at the incomes of elderly persons to determine if it is sufficient to maintain health and to participate in family and community life.

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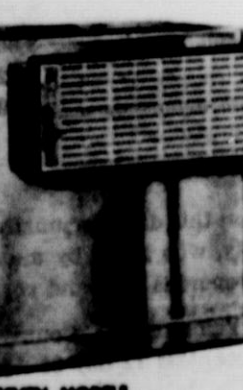
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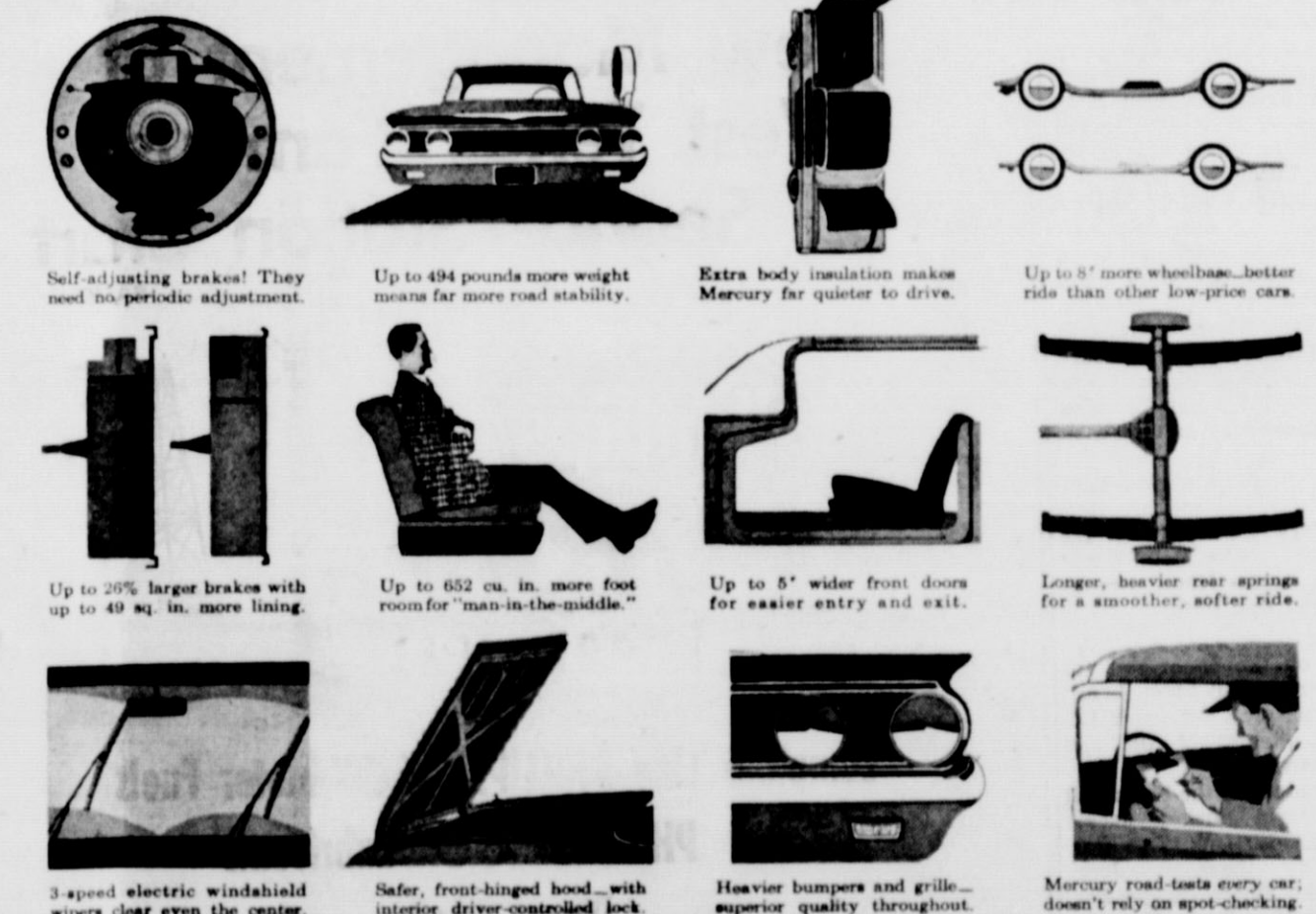

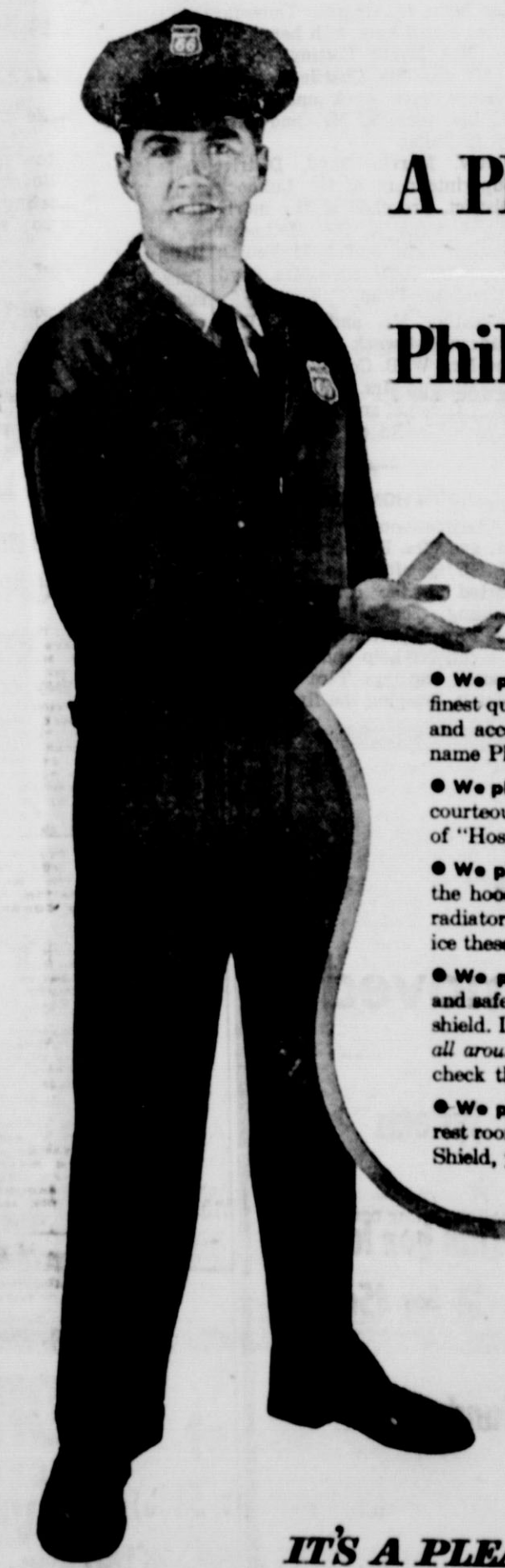
