County Again Deluged by Heavy Rains

FROGS ARE CROAKING and Motley County is wet. This is the same area in West Texas where a few weeks ago farmers were shaking their heads and saying the drought had returned. Now many feel that too much rain has fallen. The change in the moisture content was further augmented over the weekend. In a series of rains here Saturday afternoon and Saturday night, Bob Stanley registered 2.70 inches. Another shower fell Sunday night.

The entire county has had soaking rains, some as much as four and five inches according to reports.

While farm work is stymied during the critical planting season, ranchers are well satisfied with the situation, with stock tanks full of water and the prairie soaked.

County Agent Bill Palmeyer said early this week that young crops have been damaged, in many instances where cotton has been planted three to five times, but that time still remains for late planting if the fair weather continues.

Terraces and lister furrows are soaked, but some areas have April planted cotton which was large enough to survive the washing rains.

Severe electrical storms accompanied most of the waves of rains. A horse was struck and killed by lightning early Wednesday on the Earl Whitaker place in the Flomot community. The horse was only about 100 yards from the Whitaker home, when struck Mr. Whitaker said he felt the sting of lightning twice during the thunder storm.

Power service was interrupted several times during the past week by lightning and wind. No hail has been reported. Street lights in Matador were out for a short period Sunday night, probably caused by the high wind which accompanied the rain out of the north. Service crews soon repaired the damage.

Heavy rains have been reported from about every sector of the county, varying widely according to the course of the storms.

Heavy rains have been reported across the entire Panhandle, with a series of tornadoes in and near Amarillo, which caused panic among residents, but did not result in any injuries.

County Wheat Tops Previous Estimates

WHEAT in Motley County is better than previous estimates of the 1960 crop. County Agent Bill Palmeyer said this week that the approximately 8,000 acres of wheat in the county was producing from 20 to 35 bushels per acre.

He estimates that the harvest is 75% complete, delayed during the past week because of heavy rains. Mr. Palmeyer said the current price of wheat is about \$1.70 per bushel.

Hail damaged some wheat in the Flomot and Barton communities and also in the Teepee Flat community, but county-wide, the hail damage was fairly light this season.

Dry weather was the principal factor that brought the yield down. However, the wheat-growers themselves were surprised at harvesting more than they expected.

First wheat in the county was harvested by Tommy Edwards in the Whiteflat Community, May 25th. He averaged 20 bushels per acre on 100 acres. He said the turnout was much better than he had expected. The variety was early Wichita, which he accounts for the drought-resistant qualities. Harvesting of his crop was done by James (Doc) Taylor and son. The wheat tested 61 lbs. to the bushel.

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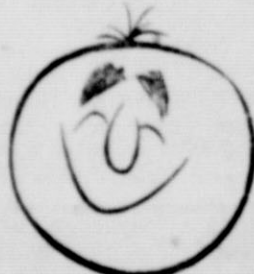

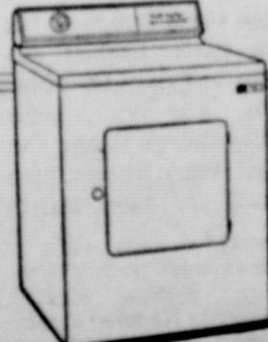
