## Gordon Russell Assumes Management of Hi-Plains Hospital at Hale Center

Gordon Russell, native of Matador, has accepted a position as manager of the Hi-Plains Hospital at Hale Center and he and his family have moved there to assume their duties. Russell, who has been in Matador for about two years, is a feature article in the Hale Center American. The Russells, who were here last week end with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Russell.

Gordon Howard Russell, an able young man with a good natured sparkle in his personality, has assumed responsibility as manager of the Hi-Plains Hospital at Hale Center. He and his family moved to Hale Center last week from Matador, Texas, where they resided about two years.

Revealed behind Russell's pleasant disposition is a profound appreciation for strict discipline and rigid business policies demanded in successful hospital operation. His connections with hospitals the past ten years left him with a mature outlook on good business management.

As noted in his conversation at the present success and popularity of the Hi-Plains Hospital at Hale Center is due to things good business management and highly respected managers who are happy to practice their profession in Hale Center.

Russell, manager of the High Plains Clinic at Dimmitt for two years, is the sixth manager to manage the Hi-Plains Hospital at Hale Center since the institution was organized in 1936.

His impressive record as the new manager has an impressive reputation and comes to the center highly recommended. He has been connected with the administrative end of hospital operations most of the time the past ten years. His career includes valuable experience he had during three years he spent in the armed services as administrative officer.

Russell entered the Air Force as a buck private in 1950, but was commissioned as a second lieutenant after completing basic training and assigned to the medical service. Few commissions of this type were issued during the Korean war.

He was transferred from Lackland AFB at San Antonio to the 41st Air Force Base in New Mexico and assigned to the laboratory department. Six months later he was named registrar.

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an administrative position — at the U. S. Air Force Hospital at Mitchell Field. Later he was named commanding officer of the Headquarters Section of the hospital unit. He was CO for nine months preceding his release from active duty.

His experience in the armed forces gave him valuable insight into the problems of personnel supervision and administration. Following his release from armed services, he was employed as administrator and lab and x-ray technician at the Crain Memorial Hospital. He was connected with the hospital at Crain for four years, before moving to Dimmitt in March of 1958. His connections with the clinic at Dimmitt also included lab and x-ray work.

Russell was born and reared at Matador and is a graduate of Matador High School. He graduated from Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene in 1949 with a BA degree. He majored in chemistry and minored in business administration.

He also completed a 14-month course at the University of Oklahoma School of Medical technology.

That background was responsible for his commission in the medical service.

His wife is the former Joyce Elaine Geister of Oklahoma City. She was medical secretary at the tumor clinic at the University Hospital in Oklahoma City when he met her.

They now have two children, a son, Howie, 7, and a daughter, Elaine, 3 years old.

Russell's career is set off by community service in several positions of leadership. He is a Jaycee, Lion, Mason and member of the Baptist Church.

He is past president of the Permian Hospital Council.

## Steel Strike Hits Drilling of Wells

Nation wide steel strike which has paralyzed so many industries, has suddenly hit the activities of the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District.

Application of practices under the Great Plains Conservation Program has been going at a rapid pace locally until a situation directly blamed on the steel strike suddenly developed.

Grady Lane, head of the local Soil Conservation Service office which administers the GPCP, said most of the facilities are usually cylindrical, made of 20 to 30 ft rings of boiler plate steel with a concrete floor. Depth varies from 2 to 4 ft. With seventeen of these facilities already scheduled to be installed in the Matador SCS work unit area this year, the steel shortage could materially hamper operations.

One local contractor has telephoned all over the state in an effort to locate steel for the 25 ft diameter rings and reportedly received a reply from one of the largest stock tank manufacturers to wit: "We haven't even got enough steel on hand to make you a No. 2 wash tub!"

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

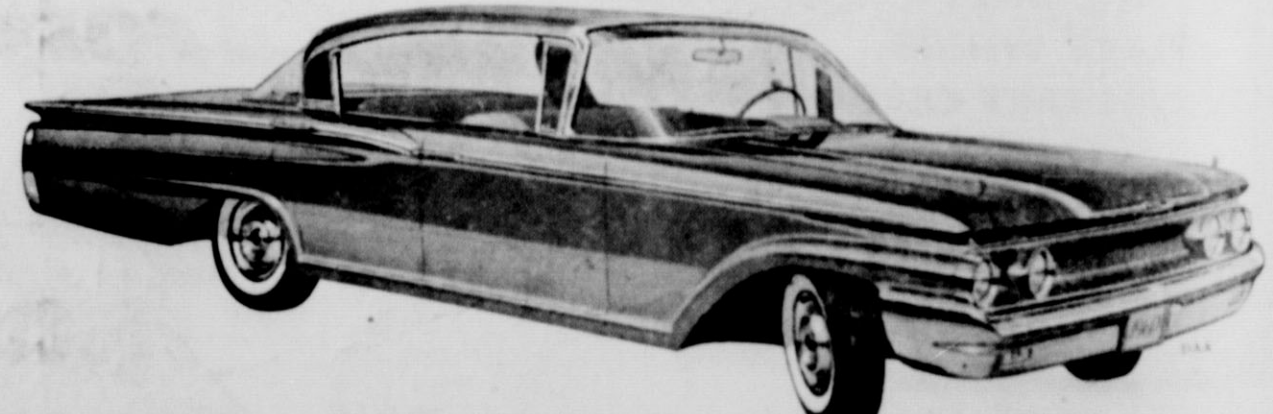

### Geologist Arrives For Water Survey

Paul Rettman of the U. S. Geological Survey, Ground Water Branch, arrived here last week to begin a two-year water survey program in five West Texas counties.

Rettman said he had been assigned to Motley, Dickens, Kent, Garza and Crosby Counties, as part of the state-wide program.

He said his work would include an inventory of all irrigation wells, chemical analysis of water and a study of the geology on formation. He will also survey the water level in wells and the rate of recharge and discharge.

Rettman, whose address is 201 Plains Drug Building, Plainview, said that it is probable that most of his time will be required in surveying the counties having the largest number of irrigation wells. The nature of his work is more of a reconnaissance of the surface water situation in the five counties, he said.
