Snow Makes Deposit In Moisture Bank

FIRST SNOW of the winter Tuesday made an impressive deposit in Motley County's already flush moisture bank. The white blanket followed a slow rain which began at 2 a.m. Tuesday morning, and continued most of the day. Total fall here was approximately five inches and total moisture registered in the 24-hour period was about 1 inch

according to Bob Stanley, who patiently thawed the snow and measured it.

Roads in the county were kept open by John Reynolds and his crew, but icing over late in the day made driving somewhat of a hazard. No accidents were reported in this area.

Heavier snow fell to the north and some roads out of Amarillo were blocked. It was a "gentle" snowstorm, however, and its multimillion dollar value has been acclaimed by press and radio.

The snow was accompanied by light winds. The mercury dipped to around 20 degrees Tuesday night but warmth in the earth resulted in some thawing in Matador gutters after midnight.

FIRE DESTROYS QUITAQUE POST

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the 36-year-old Quitaque Post newspaper plant during the first few hours of the new year. The Turkey Enterprise was also published in the plant.

Editor and Publisher John Pope, (who is also an excellent printer) had been aiding the Tribune for the past four weeks. New Year's Eve (which was his 30th birthday) he set the reading matter for the Turkey Enterprise on the Tribune Linotype. He left here about 11 o'clock, arriving at the Quitaque plant during the last few minutes of 1959. He went to work immediately and by 3 a.m. he had printed and folded the Enterprise. He left the papers in the plant.

He then went home and to bed. He was barely asleep when he was awakened and informed that his newspaper was burning. He turned in the fire alarm. A time lapse in getting the fire truck started and proper hose connections made allowed the fire to gain headway.

The Quitaque Post was located on the ground floor of the two story Masonic building. The newspaper plant was burning from front to back by the time water finally filled the hose. Turkey fire department was summoned and aided the Quitaque department.

Fog Was Fortunate

The newspaper plant was a complete loss. The lodge hall was badly damaged. It is believed that except for a heavy fog which prevailed at the time and the absence of wind, the entire block in the Quitaque business section might have been destroyed.

In addition to the newspaper plant, Pope lost office supplies, cameras and photo supplies, and his dark room equipment.

Pope called editor Douglas Meador of the Tribune New Year's morning and explained the dismal details of the fire, but added before he hung up the receiver, "Happy New Year."

Presents were distributed from a beautifully decorated tree, with each guest receiving a useful gift.

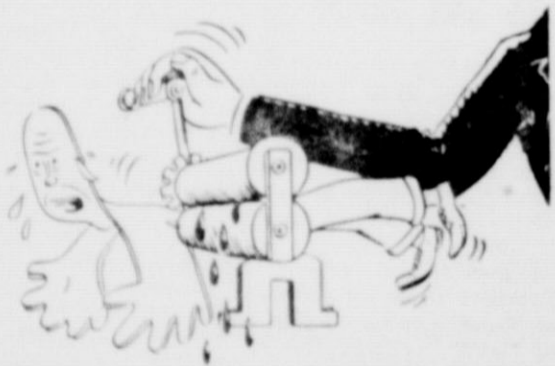
