Matadors Lose by One-Point Margin

Chest Drive Drops Short

Hopes for a quick drive to achieve the Matador Community Chest quota of \$3000, were dashed to earth after accounting the returns of volunteer workers. The total collected Tuesday afternoon was \$1,338.

Drive Chairman Elbert Reeves said, however, that several large contributors in past years had not been contacted.

The Community Chest in past years has set aside almost as much as the total collection this year, as a local emergency fund. From this fund aid is given to stricken people who need emergency medical attention, aid after fire has destroyed a home or anything for which a collection is usually taken.

Also the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the local Boy Scout troop and several other worthwhile agencies derive their entire resources for a year from the fund.

The drive will be continued until sufficient funds have been acquired, it was declared.

Contributions may be made on the installment plan, if more convenient to the donor.

It was a game of breaks, and the Knox City Greyhounds had more as they defeated the Matador Matadors 19-18 Friday night at Paducah. The game was for the bi-district championship.

Three lucky passes, one extra point, and an inability to score extra points by the Matadors spelled the difference. The Matadors' steady defense held Knox City to short gains throughout most of the game, but the Greyhounds moved the ball on their three touchdown drives.

Matadors scoring was evenly divided with quarterback Dink Wilson, fullback Guy Campbell, and halfback Jimmie Green each crossing the goal line once.

Halfback Joe Glover took care of most of Knox City's scoring with two touchdown runs. He also kicked the game winning extra point, which was the only one scored in the game.

Both teams traded punts after the opening kickoff, the Matadors winding up with the ball on the Greyhound 45 yard line. From that point the Matadors moved for a score. Campbell broke into the end zone from 8 yards out for the touchdown. A quarterback sneak failed on the extra points try, but the Matadors led 6-0.

Knox City launched a scoring drive from their 30 yard line after they received the kickoff. A running play moved them to the 35. Then quarterback Joe Elledge rolled out and tossed a 27 yard pass to left end Donald Johnson, who made a diving catch. The Greyhounds moved to the two, and Glover went over right tackle for the score.

The Greyhounds moved to the Matador 25 early in the second quarter, and punted out of bounds on the 16. From there the Matadors cranked up an 84-yard scoring march. Wilson went 2 feet up the middle for the score. A jump-pass failed on the extra points try, and the score was 12-6 with 1:07 left in the half.

The Matadors picked off a Knox City pass just before the half, but couldn't capitalize on it. There, the halftime score stood 12-6.

Knox City wasted no time in scoring their first touchdown of the last half. Only 55 seconds had elapsed when Glover took a pitchout, raced around right end, cut back into the open, and raced 37 yards for a tally.

Last Score of Season

The Matadors took the kickoff and moved to take the lead. Jimmie Green scored on a reverse run around left end, the play covering 16 yards. Campbell slammed to the 1 foot line on the extra points try. The score now stood 18-12 with 6:04 left in the third quarter.

Knox City quickly came back. They moved to the 16 on an exceptionally lucky pass and several short yardage runs. Elledge rolled to the left, and threw a pass just as he was dropped by several Matador defenders. Johnson grabbed it in the end zone, and the score was tied. Glover kicked the extra point and the scoring was over.

But the ball game was not. Both teams had other chances, with the Matadors most. The Matadors got the ball with 6:45 left in the game, and drove to the Knox City 25 before losing the ball on downs. The Matadors regained the ball with a little over two minutes remaining, but four passes fell incomplete and the ball went over. The Matadors got another break when they recovered a Greyhound fumble, with 35 seconds left. Three passes went incomplete, and a fourth running play gained the first down with only two seconds remaining. A pass was incomplete, and the game ended.

Kadane Drilling Company has moved a rig to the Humble Oil and Refining Co.'s perennial test five miles southwest of the town of Roaring Springs. It will be a 9000 foot granite test, the 6-B Matador Land and Cattle Co.

The location is 6000 feet from north and 5000 feet from west lines of section 1, Blanco County School Land survey. It is about 7 miles west of the West Roaring Springs field. There are no nearby dry holes.

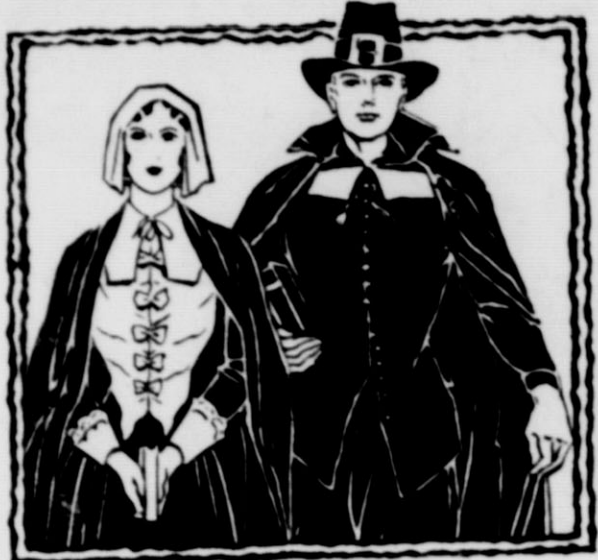
