MATADOR football fans will barely have time to get home Friday from Ralls to see the Roaring Springs Yellowjackets in crucial combat with the Bula Bulldogs for the regional B six-man championship, here on Burleson Field. The game is scheduled to start at 7:30.

The Yellowjackets are going to have the support of Matador fans, the pep squad, the 30-piece Patton Springs band (directed by Mrs. Ralph Marshall) and the Lions Clubs of both communities. Matador Lions will man the gate and provide other help details for the game.

The Bula Bulldogs are coached by Claude Morrison, a former Yellowjacket, who graduated from Roaring Springs. He is the son of Mrs. W. C. King of Roaring Springs.

Bula is undefeated, winning their bi-district game from Follet 19-13. The Bulldogs were tied by Lazzbuddle.

Roaring Springs has lost only one game while winning nine. The teams were scheduled to play during the regular season but because of the Roaring Springs cotton harvest recess the game was eliminated. Bula played Flomot 18-0. Both teams are running teams and use almost the same type offense. Roaring Springs has a slight weight advantage.

Coach Ray Snyder, Superintendent Paul Sweett and members of the Roaring Springs Lions Club Monday morning met with the Matador Lions directors in a special meeting to decide on plans for the game.

J. C. Box, 31, of Plainview, is a patient in Stanley Hospital here as the result of a truck accident which occurred early Thanksgiving morning about 8 miles east of Matador on US Highway 70.

Box, who was driving a loaded gasoline transport from Burk Burnett to Plainview, suffered fractures of the pelvis, when his truck overturned. He is employed by the J. P. Bernard Oil Co., of Plainview.

Sheriff John Stotts who investigated the accident, said Box told him he had stopped his truck to sleep. He said the accident resulted when he attempted to pull back on the paving.

The injured man suffered some exposure to the near freezing weather before he was found by a passerby and brought here. Some apprehension was experienced Friday that Box might be developing pneumonia, but his condition is reported improved.

When the Matador Matadors plowed under a fine Quitaque club, 20-0, recently to cinch the 2-B title, it was Arvin Ellithorp who scored 19 of the 20 points, and was selected the Amarillo Daily News Class B Player of the Week.

The Matadors struck early in the first period when Ellithorp broke away for a 59-yard touchdown gallop to put the Matadors out front 6-0 at the half time.

In the third quarter Ellithorp put the Matadors on the victory trail for sure with a one-foot plunge for the second score of the night. He added the extra point and at the end of the third quarter the score was 13-0.

Applying the insurance marker, in the fourth quarter, Ellithorp went over from two yards for the final marker of the game and placed the district crown on the Matadors heads for the first time in 19 years.

Friday afternoon at 2 P.M. the Matadors will meet the Meadow Bronchos at Ralls stadium for the final game of the year and regional Class B championship.

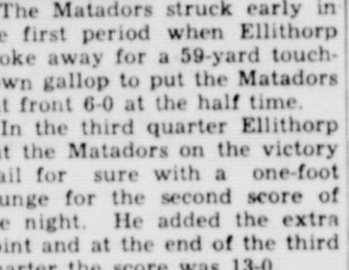
The Bronchos are defending regional champions—in fact they have won the last two years. They defeated Bovina after winning the 4-B crown.

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Flomot Girl Killed As Car Strikes Sand Bed

A Flomot high school girl, Nancy Wilmoth, 15, died almost instantly late Friday afternoon when the family automobile in which she was riding with two sisters, struck a sand bed and turned over.

The accident happened about 3 1/2 miles northeast of Flomot on a country road. The three sisters, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Wilmoth, had been sent on an errand by their father. Mr. Wilmoth is superintendent of Flomot schools.

The two younger sisters, Patsy 13, and Dorra Kay, 8, received treatment here in Stanley hospital but they were not seriously injured.

After the accident Patsy ran to the farm home of Mrs. Gordie Washington, about three-quarters of a mile from the scene of the wreck, seeking help for her injured sisters.

Dr. J. S. Stanley was summoned, but the Flomot high school sophomore was dead when he arrived. It was reported that the accident occurred about 15 minutes after the accident occurred.

Sheriff John Stotts investigating the accident said it appeared the automobile plowed through a bed of drifting sand on a freshly graded road, went out of control and rolled over at least two times.

Funeral services for the accident victim were held Sunday in the Flomot Baptist church at 10 a.m. with Rev. A. E. Eubanks officiating. The funeral was under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home. The body was taken to Poteau, Oklahoma for burial Monday. The Wilmoth family formerly lived in Poteau and moved to Flomot in July.

Nancy Ann Wilmoth was born Dec. 14, 1939 at Pittsburg, Okla., and died Nov. 26, 1954 at Flomot, Texas. She was converted at the age of 8 years.

Besides her parents and two sisters, she is survived by two grandmothers: Mrs. W. R. Wilmoth of Okmulgee, Okla., and Mrs. Cora Horn of Poteau.

Price Supports On Cotton To Remain 90 Percent Parity

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 22 (AP)—Crop loans and purchase agreements still be available for 1955 production, even under the new adjustable price support plan.

The answer is "Yes" says Claude K. McCan, chairman of the state ASC committee, who said this and other questions about price supports under new farm legislation are being asked by farmers.

One common question, says McCan, is: "Do all basic crop price supports drop to 82 and one-half percent of parity for 1955?"

In answer to that, he said U. S. Department of Agriculture spokesmen have emphasized that "There is no basis in fact to the charge that price supports would 'drop out from under' basic agricultural commodities" in 1955.

Department spokesmen have said that "necessary moderate adjustments will be made gradually, and in line with realities of the supply situation," he explains. Under existing law, supports on basic commodities can be set at or anywhere between 82 and one-half and 90 percent of parity. Supports will depend on supplies of the commodities involved, but now the picture for 1955 looks like this:

Wheat—Supports have been set at 82 and one-half percent of parity, or a national average of \$2.06 per bushel.

Cotton—Supports will remain at 90 percent of parity.

Another recurring question, McCan says, has to do with price supports for 1955 small feed grains such as oats, barley and grain sorghums. He points out that Secretary of Agriculture Benson recently said no decision had yet been made in connection with small grains. Such a decision, he said, would be made only when final crop reports are in, and after further study of the current drought.

Postmaster Urges Use Of First-Class Postage For Cards

Postmaster E. F. Springer believes that with a three-cent stamp your Christmas cards will win more friends and influence more people than if they are mailed with a two-cent stamp.

"First-class postage," he explained today, "is the best Yuletide insurance you can get. With it your greetings will be processed and delivered quicker. And they'll be forwarded, or returned, if it becomes necessary."

"This eliminates any worry about whether or not your season's greetings were received. Your own return address on the envelope will help others keep their address books up to date. Then, too, Christmas cards sent with three-cent stamps may carry written messages, a custom everyone enjoys."

None of these postal privileges are authorized at the third-class rates. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 1/4 x 4 or larger than 9 x 12 require cancellation by hand, and must carry first-class postage.

Postmaster Springer urges everyone to tie their Christmas cards in two separate bundles, with each address facing the same way. Then attach the postal labels marked "All for local delivery" and "All for out-of-town delivery." These helpful tags are available at the Post Office, without cost, and will shorten delivery time greatly.

Parcel post, of course, should be mailed even earlier. The Postmaster recommends December 5 for out-of-state gifts, and December 10 for those with local addresses. But the sooner the better.

Size and weight limitations for parcel post vary according to place of mailing and destination. In some cases, packages cannot exceed 72 inches in length and girth combined, nor 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limits are up to 100 inches, combined length and girth, and 70 pounds in weight.

Roaring Springs Asks Sanitary Sewer Bids

Municipality of Roaring Springs may soon have a sewer system. The needed public service facility is being advertised by the Lubbock engineering firm of Hasie and Green in this issue of the Tribune.

The Tribune was advised two weeks ago that sale of bonds sufficient for the construction of the sewer system seemed highly probable.

Excerpts from contractors notice are as follows: "Sealed proposals for the construction of a sanitary sewer system consisting of a treatment plant and approximately 16,000 feet of sewer lines, appurtenances and incidentals, will be received at the office of the city secretary, Roaring Springs, Texas, until 3 p. m., December 14, 1954, and then publicly opened and read... the minimum wages which shall apply on this work are the established rates for this area set forth in the specification."

When Roaring Springs purchased its water system from the Q&P Railway about five years ago, an effort was made to install the sewer system at that time but financing problems arose which prevented the work being contracted.

Civic leaders, however, have continued to keep interest active in the improvement and seek a solution for the financing problem.

With the installation of the sewer system, Roaring Springs will eliminate a health menace and enhance the community's attractiveness and property values.

Murphy plunged a yard for the touchdown and fullback Arvin Ellithorp plunged across the tying point.

It was Ellithorp who scored the game-winning point on a plunge, too, writing his name into Matador history with the feat.

Rattlers Score First
The Rattlers scored first when halfback Richard Rash broke loose for 63 yards to put six points on the scoreboard and Glen Smith completed a pass to the same Rash in the end zone for a 7-0 lead.

Fullback George Bodsey sent the Rattlers into a 13-7 lead in the second quarter when he pranced six yards to climax a 55 yard touchdown drive for Stinnett. This time Smith's attempted pass for the extra point failed.

Stinnett held a slight edge in the total offense statistics, gaining 216 yards to Matador's 200, but it wasn't enough. The Rattlers rolled up 189 yards rushing to 142 for the Matadors, with the winners posting 58 yards passing to 27 for the losers.

Penetrations were tied at three apiece, with the Matadors leading in first downs, 15-8. The Matadors had the better passing attack, completing four of 12 passes with one intercepted, while Stinnett completed only two of seven attempts and also lost one on an interception.

Matador lost one touchdown on a clipping penalty, while the Rattlers had two touchdowns called back, both on penalties.

Matador had one other threat in the second quarter when they drove to the 15-yard line, where a fumble broke up the drive.

Stinnett reached the Matador 7 in the third quarter on a pass interference penalty, but the winners drove the Rattlers back to the 15 where they took over on downs.
