Rev. Bob Jameson Was Circuit Rider

Death Claims Pioneer Motley County Pastor

A PIONEER circuit-rider pastor, Rev. R. L. (Uncle Bob) Jameson is dead. A man who saw this lusty country change from buffalo trails on the prairie to vapor trails in the sky, has closed his Bible and the book of his influential and beneficial life. The Methodist pastor who ministered to the spiritual needs of cowboys, freighters and the early settlers of this area was among the last of the pioneer circuit-riders.

He died early Sunday in Malone-Hogan Hospital in Big Spring where he had been hospitalized since Dec. 7. He had suffered a stroke about two months ago at his home here and had been hospitalized in Stanley Hospital for several weeks before being transferred to Big Springs for special therapeutic treatment.

He had been a resident of this West Texas area for 75 years, and had served as pastor of practically every Methodist church in the area. He had been preaching since 1900.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday, at the First Methodist Church. Officiating were Rev. L. W. Tucker, pastor; Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired and former pastor of the church, who delivered the memorial sermon; and Rev. W. R. Beard, pastor of the Roaring Springs Methodist Church.

Grandsons served as pallbearers. They were Bill Jameson, Bob Jameson, Horace (Skeet) Jameson, Joe Jameson, Leslie Kingery and Clyde Williams.

Born in Missouri

Born Robert Lee Jameson near Joplin, Missouri, Oct. 4, 1874, he came with his parents as a small boy, to the small community of West, Texas in McLennan County.

Record Set for December Rain

A CHRISTMAS PRESENT of unusual magnitude was delivered to West Texas Monday night when rain gauges registered up to four inches of precipitation. It was the heaviest December rainfall in a third of a century, and in many instances pioneers declared they did not remember as much rainfall in this month in the history of the country.

The slow, intermittent showers continued throughout the night and a few flashes of lightning were visible.

Bob Stanley registered 3.10 inches here to bring the year's total to 27.94 inches as compared with 19.54 inches for the entire 12 months of 1958. The most rainfall registered in a previous December by Mr. Stanley was 64-inch in 1954.

The storm that began with a cold front and drizzle early Monday, brought severe weather to a wide area of the nation. Highway 66 west of Amarillo was closed yesterday because of snow and several hundred motorists were stranded.

DEATH brought a pall of gloom to Matador Tuesday night when Dayton Graham, 20, died suddenly of a heart attack after officiating at a girls basketball game in the Matador school gymnasium. 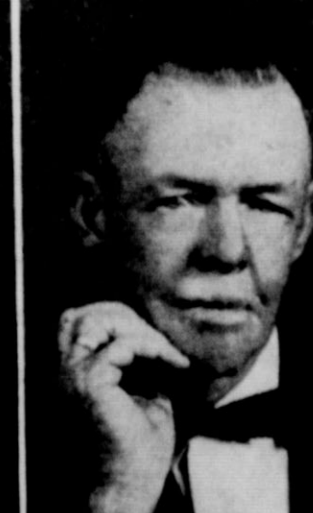

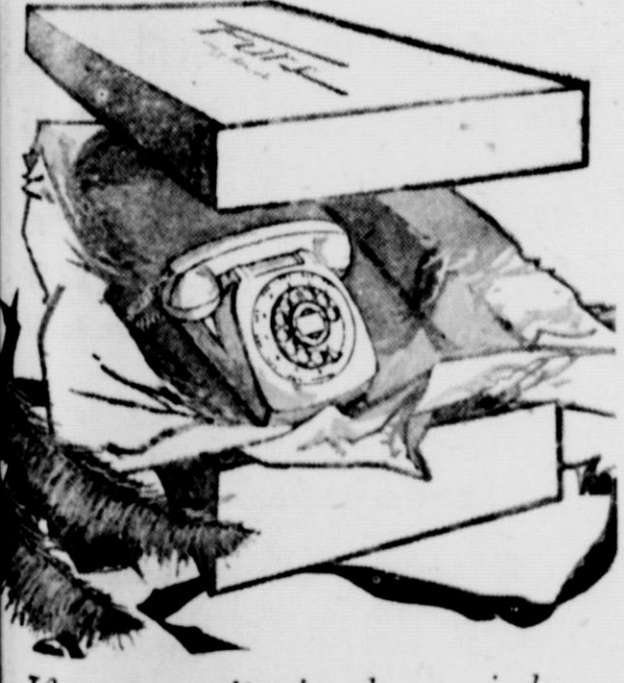

Flomot Baptists Plan for Future

The Flomot First Baptist Church, which holds a unique record for a rural church in this part of the state, has announced some plans for 1960, according to the pastor, Rev. Eddie L. Spivey.

Dr. Franklin Swanner, District Missions Secretary for this district, recently cited the church's progressive program as outstanding in this 20 county District.

He noted especially that the church has retired nearly \$4,000 of its building debt within the last twelve months, while paying cash for a new parsonage and the drilling of a well. Also, he noted that the church's annual Lottie Moon Missions offering is currently about double the amount received last year.

Program Is Explained
Rev. Spivey, in explaining the church's program stated that they have sought to achieve an equitable balance in their activities between local projects and missions endeavor.

He pointed out that in its 1960 budget, adopted on Wednesday, Dec. 9, the church proposes to channel ten percent of its undesignated receipts into missions causes.

The new budget, which will call for a weekly offering averaging \$116 can be easily met, the pastor stated, if each family contributes its equitable share of \$135 in 1960. Records indicate that many will exceed that amount, and provision has been made to revise the budget accordingly.

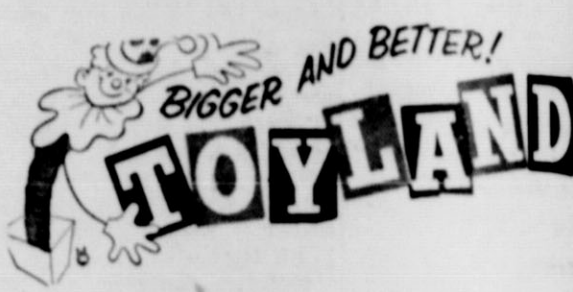
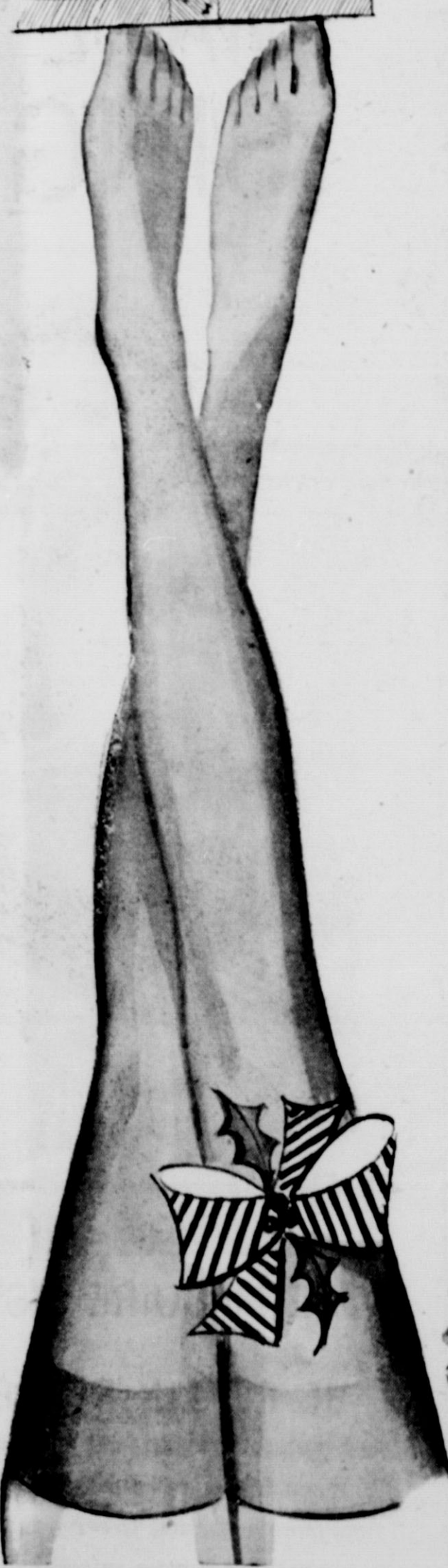
