**Flu Spreads Here, Schools Dismissed**

AN EPIDEMIC of influenza is spreading in the Matador area and schools here closed at 2:35 yesterday because of absenteeism as result of the disease. Students absent Monday totaled 32 in both grade and high school. The number increased to 38 Tuesday with 22 from grade school and 16 from high school.

School officials called a special assembly Tuesday afternoon and announced that the Christmas holidays would start earlier than planned, because of the flu.

Superintendent Charlie Johnson said school would resume on December 30, with Wednesday, January 1, being observed as a holiday but classes starting again on Thursday.

Several programs that had been planned for late this week, were stepped up to yesterday or cancelled.

These included the program by the High School Choral group, which was presented at 11 a.m. Wednesday (it was originally scheduled for Thursday morning) and the senior's Christmas program, which was presented Wednesday at 2:00 p.m. and which had been announced for Friday.

**Other Schools Close**

West Texas State University at Canyon closed Monday on account of the flu and students were advised to go home, according to the Amarillo Daily News. The Paducah school system was also closed because of severe absenteeism caused by the flu. Richards Memorial Hospital in Paducah was declared crowded to capacity.

Doctors here are working overtime to see patients affected by the epidemic.

**Referee's Problems Told at Lions Meet**

A REFEREE has more problems than meet the eye, according to Curdley Hays, famous athlete, coach and referee of the Southwestern Conference, who was guest speaker Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club.

The meeting was held in the basement of the First Baptist Church for the first time in about 25 years. Basement of the First Methodist Church, usual meeting place for the service club, was being used to serve luncheon to the Jameson family and relatives. Mr. Hays, who was introduced by Lion Bill Pallmeyer, had an averted audience in the 26 members of the 1968 Matadors, who were guests of the club for turkey and trimmings, and the record attendance of Lions members.

Hays, who is with the public service department of West Texas Utilities Company, has been employed by the firm since 1938, and has been here and at Roaring Springs many times.

In explaining the problems of a referee during big football games, Hays said he had little trouble with the press and radio men. "It is the television," he declared, "that complicates everything. They usually bring 50 to 60 people on the field to broadcast a game, everything has to be timed to the second, even to the commercials, which are timed and must fit into the football playing." He said a big game will have 20 commercials and that each of the 90 seconds brings the broadcasting companies \$38,000. Hays said referees play by the rules and that the game has been simplified by the addition of rules.

**Clovis Man Named Regent at Eastern New Mexico Univ.**

A prominent Clovis banker, Howard Martin, graduate of Matador High School and brother of local resident, Mrs. B. H. Hobbs, has been appointed to the Board of Regents at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, replacing M. C. Hunt.

The banker said of the appointment that he was "very pleased," adding that he had watched the growth of ENMU with great interest over the years and had "contributed what I could to that growth."

"I look forward to my tenure on the Board of Regents with real pleasure and with great enthusiasm for the continued expansion of the school," he said.

Martin, whose wife, Gertrude, was one of the students in the first four-year graduating class at Eastern, is vice-president of Clovis National Bank. He and his wife reside at 1515 E. 21st and are members of Central Baptist Church.

In an "off-the-record" letter to Randall Whitworth, C. O. Greene of the Clovis Chamber of Commerce, wrote:

"Our friend, Howard Martin, is too modest to send you the attached clipping. . . Howard informs me that he received his P.H.D. degree from the Matador High School and therefore is eminently qualified to be a Regent for a University. . . I have applied to him for a job on the faculty but to date have not received much encouragement!"

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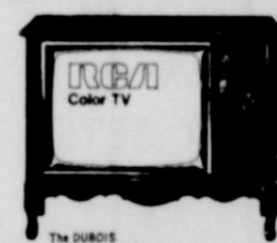

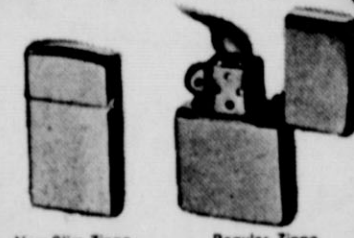

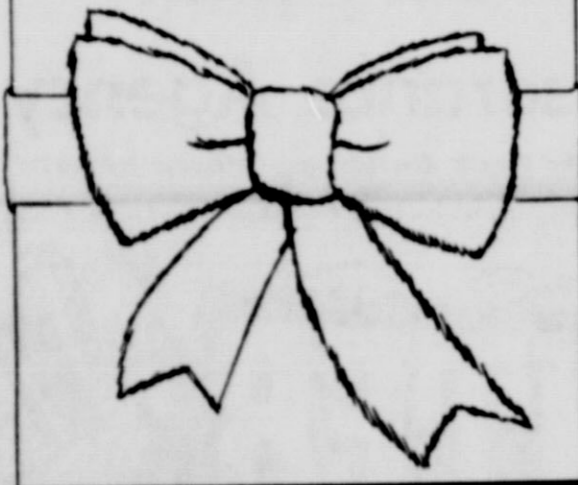
