## Receives Doctor of Education Degree

Leo C. Purvis, superintendent of Petersburg schools was awarded a Doctor of Education degree Saturday at Texas Tech's 1961 Summer Commencement in Lubbock Municipal Auditorium. Mr. Purvis began his career as a superintendent of schools at Roaring Springs, where he served from 1948-52. He entered the teaching profession in 1940 as an elementary teacher at Bronco, where he taught for two years. He served as a principal at Vernon and Crowell before going to Roaring Springs. He has been superintendent for the Petersburg Independent School District since 1952.

The subject of Purvis' doctoral dissertation was development of standards and practices designed to contribute to effective school board - superintendent relationships.

He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Howard Payne College and a Master of Arts degree from North Texas State College.

## Week End Celebration Honors Couple On Sixty-Third Wedding Anniversary

Seven of the nine children of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Reed, with their families spent the week end with them and helped celebrate their 63rd Wedding Anniversary. Several of the families began arriving Monday, August 28 and remained through the week.

J. A. Reed, and the former Rebecca Gaines were married September 4, 1898, at Crosscut, Brown County, Texas. Both are natives of Texas, and came to West Texas in 1899. They settled near the J. A. Ranch headquarters and Palo Duro was their post office.

They moved into a two-room house and soon added a half-dugout that joined on to the house. They later dug an underground storm cellar that connected with the house.

The young bride would gladly have returned to Brown County twenty-four hours after reaching her new home, as neighbors and settlements were so far away, and the west seemed all that the weird tales had pictured it to be.

The couple moved to their present home eight miles north-east of Flocot, in February, 1932 from Canyon, and two years later started their fruit orchard. They are still a lively, hard-working couple and own their half-section farm. They have ten acres in the orchard plot and their policy has been to add approximately a hundred new trees each year, replacing old trees or those frozen out.

The Reeds no longer farm, but have devoted their full time to their orchard. Mrs. Reed said, "the cockle burs were here when we came, but the sand burs and goatheads came later." Mr. Reed says they thrive on cultivation. "The sand burs, I mean."

The Reeds have nine children, 36 grandchildren and 42 great-grandchildren. Mr. Reed is 85, and his wife, 81.

### Soil Conservation Supervisors Meet

The Board of Supervisors, Upper Pease Soil Conservation District, in a regular monthly meeting Friday, reviewed current business and discussed the forthcoming supervisors election in Zone 3, the land between Paducah and Matador lying south of the highway.

Landowners engaged in farming or ranching in this sub-division are eligible to vote on October 6, in Paducah, said Eddie Simms, Soil Conservationist of Matador, who attended the meeting.

Other Matador supervisors at the meeting were D. I. W. Birnie and W. D. Lipscomb. Also present were George Cullin, district bookkeeper, Matador; L. M. Carroll, Cottle County Agent; L. D. Booker, Soil Conservationist, Paducah; and Chairman Lloyd Mayes, Paducah farmer.

The District Supervisors are elected by the people to administer a program for sound soil, water, and plant use within the Upper Pease SCD. Assistance is available from the district in developing and applying a conservation program on individual farms and ranches.
