Texas Farmers To Get Almost Half Of Entire 1960 Cotton Acreage Ailment

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has proclaimed a national marketing quota of 13,133,000 bales and a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres for the 1960 upland cotton crop.

Texas' share will be 6,761,512 acres with an additional 55,965 acres for the national reserve. The Secretary also announced his determination that alternate Choice (B) — farm allotments

for the 1960 upland cotton crop will be 40 per cent larger than the "regular" choice (A) allotments for the same farms.

Vote December 15. December 15 was set as the date for a growers' referendum on marketing quotas for both upland and extra long staple cotton. At least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to remain in effect.

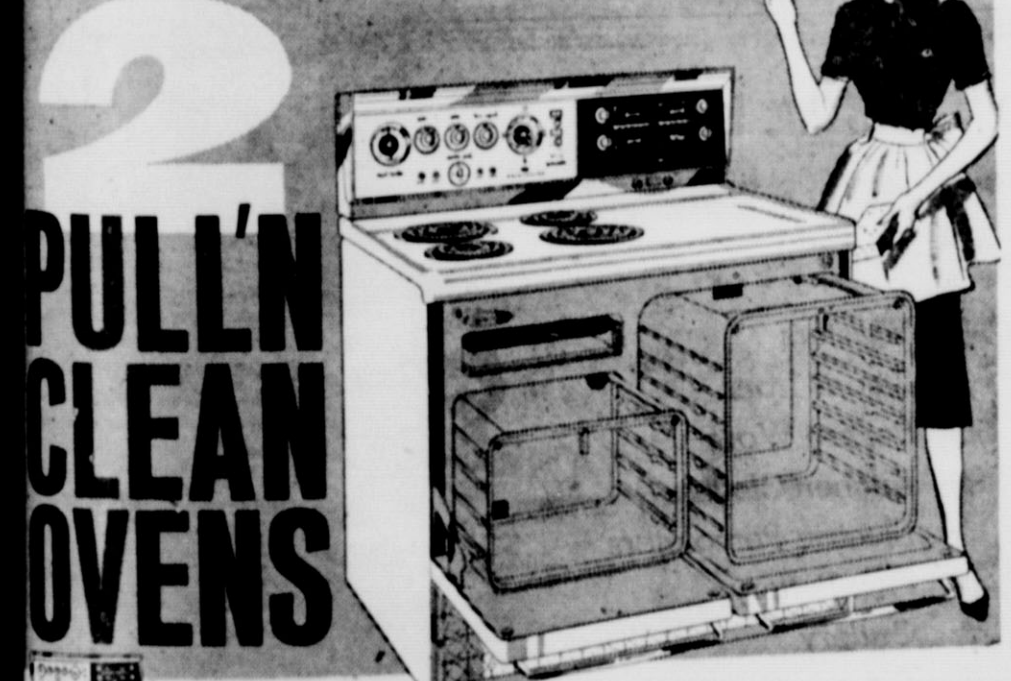
