### World War II Hero Lost In Air Force B-29 Crash

AN AIRCRAFT accident in the Okinawa area of the Pacific Ocean Thursday claimed the life of T. Sgt. Leroy Nelson, 32, native son of Matador who was decorated for his military service in World War II. Sgt. Nelson's death was reported with the loss of a B-29 bomber which crashed in the Pacific 250 miles from Okinawa Thursday night, and was later confirmed by official information.

The airman's wife and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Nelson received identical telegrams late Friday announcing that he was missing. Sunday they received identical telegrams from Washington confirming his death. The telegrams were signed by Major General R. J. Reeves, director of military personnel, Headquarters US Air Force. Thirteen men were reported lost in the bomber crash.

Excerpts from the telegrams are as follows: "It is with deep regret that I officially inform you of the death of Technical Sergeant Leroy Nelson. He died on 8 September 1955 in the Okinawa area of the Pacific Ocean as the result of an aircraft accident. A letter containing further details will follow. Please accept my sincere sympathy in this hour of grief."

Sgt. Nelson, a tail-gunner in World War II, was serving as a flight engineer since re-entering service January 8, 1948. His wife and three children, Michael, 9, Neal, 5, and Deborah Kay, 3, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Nelson live here. Three sisters live in Lubbock. They are, Mrs. John Harris, Mrs. Earl Vaughn and Mrs. Bob Brock.

#### Narrow Escape In 1944

Sgt. Nelson, holder of the Air Medal and Distinguished Flying Cross awarded in World War II, had a narrow escape in 1944 when on a mission over France in a B-17. Fifteen direct hits from enemy 20mm cannon and more than 600 holes in the fuselage failed to keep the plane from reaching its base in England.

Sgt. Nelson was born in Matador, Feb. 6, 1923. He was graduated from Matador High School with the class of 1941. He volunteered for service September 16, 1942. He returned from overseas in 1944 and was married at Matador, May 17, 1944, to Miss Bobbie Lee Amick of Flomot. He was discharged October 26, 1945 and attended Baylor University for 18 months.

He re-entered service 8 January, 1948 and went to Okinawa in August, 1948. He had been serving with the 581st Air Resupply Squadron.

### RAIL DUST Death Claims Ike Rushing

W. I. (Ike) Rushing, resident of the Matador area since 1914, died about noon Sunday at Stanley hospital where he had been a patient for several weeks. For the past eight years Mr. Rushing had operated Ike's Grocery here. Previously he was engaged in farming.

He was a member of the Church of Christ, and was active in the Farm Bureau and progressive farm movements before entering the grocery business. He was a native of Texas, born at Midlothian, Jan. 13, 1889.

Mr. Rushing was married to Miss Ida Thomas in Kaufman county on Sept. 6, 1906. She died in 1918.

He was married on June 8, 1920, to Mrs. Ruby Latham, in Matador.

Funeral services were held Monday at 3 p. m. in the Matador Church of Christ. Leonard Dennis of McAdoo officiated, assisted by Gordon Downing of Floydada. Burial was in Matador East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

Besides his wife he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. F. T. Staley and Mrs. A. M. Wagner, both of Abilene and Mrs. Chant Lee of Post; and five sons, Odell Latham of Estelline, Albert Rushing of Abilene, Elwood Rushing who lives in Venezuela, and Leonard Rushing who lives in the Philippines. With the exception of one son, Leonard, all members of his immediate family were here.

Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Walter Robinson of Arkansas and two brothers, John Rushing of Littlefield and Earl Rushing who lives in the state of Washington.

In poor health for an extended length of time, Mr. Rushing fell about four weeks ago, breaking his hip. His condition declined rapidly after the injury. Pallbearers were: Edgar Lee, Frank Montgomery, Charlie Parks, Bert Ezzell, Creed Jameson, all of Matador, and Alfred Dye of Roaring Springs.

Ray Sims, former Matador resident, had a close brush with death last week (Tuesday night) when his car crashed into a guard rail and turned over two and one-half times on a steep Colorado mountain side. Blinded by the lights of an approaching motorist on the mountain curve, Mr. Sims struck a guard rail, causing it to go out of control. After the car stopped rolling Mr. Sims found that his foot was caught and he was unable to free himself.

After a time he slipped his foot from his boot and climbed from the wrecked automobile which was being saturated with gasoline from the leaking tank. Back up on the mountain highway again, he was unable to stop a ride, as motorists could not see his wrecked automobile and believed him a night hitchhiker. Suffering from injuries and cold, he returned to his car, "wrapped" himself in what clothing he could find in the car.

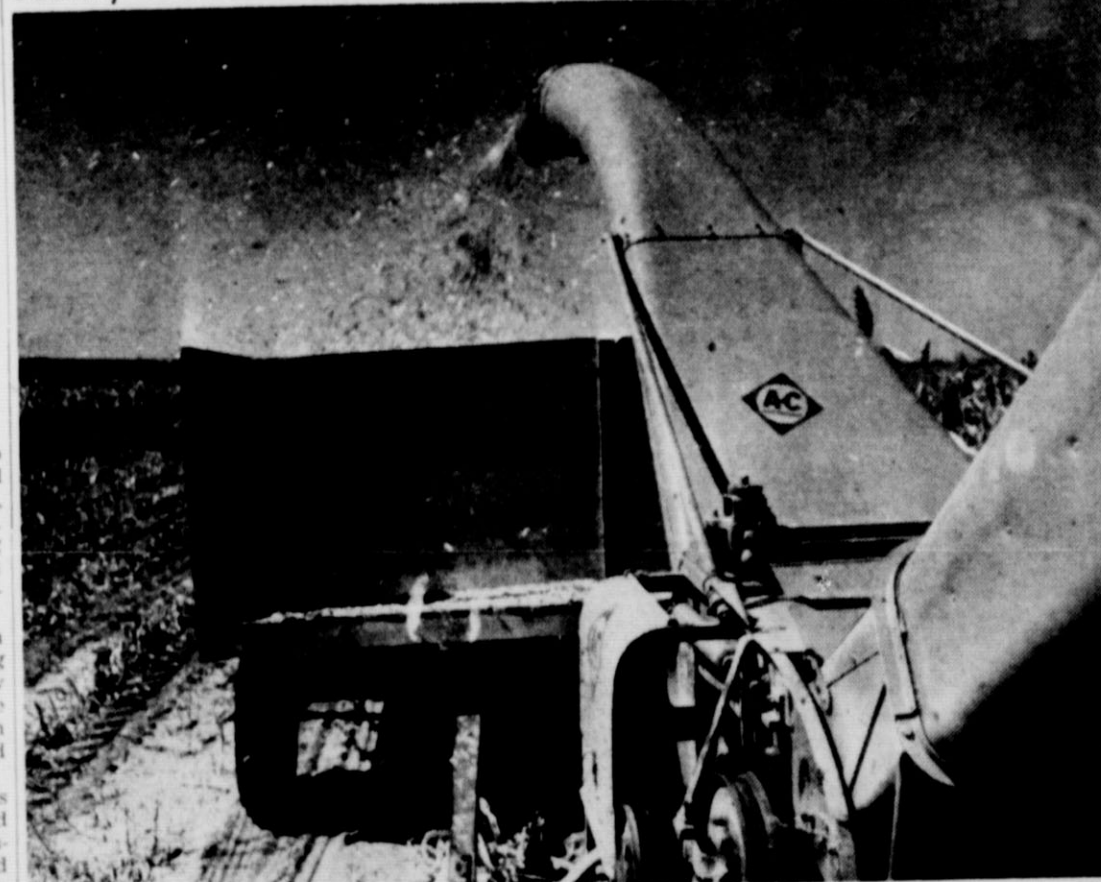

### County Rancher Finds Silage Is Cheap Way To Produce Beef



STRATEGY is important in the production and sale of beef according to Eldred Seigler, successful Motley county rancher, who operates the 10,000-acre Seigler ranch about 25 miles ago Mr. Seigler built his first trench silo and he is convinced that no cheaper or more efficient method will produce beef in West Texas. He has used trench silos every year he has been able to grow a feed crop.

Currently he is filling a 450-ton trench silo with green grain sorghums. He has 325 acres of feed in the process of harvest. The sandy loam land on a flat overlooking Pease River is producing about two tons of feed

"The trench silo cost \$60, (125 feet long, 12 feet wide and eight feet deep) and will hold about 450 tons of silage," Mr. Seigler declared. "I think it is the cheapest 'barn' I can buy."

"I feed 15 to 20 pounds of silage mixed with cottonseed meal as a daily ration for calves. Calves usually weigh 275 to 325 pounds when we start feeding. It is the cheapest method I have found to produce beef."

"Another advantage of the trench silo," he said, "is that we have feed on hand to carry the cattle through almost any kind of an emergency. This has been profitable through the years in making it possible for us to sell when the market is good and not dump our livestock on a glutted market."

"We save a lot of lost effort," the rancher declared, "in harvesting the feed. A new lightweight silage harvester is highly efficient. It cleans the ground in one operation, saving three processes of cutting, shocking, hauling and stacking. The feed is clean and will keep five years or much longer without loss. We use one extra boy with trailer to guide the blower pipe on contour rows. On straight rows one man can operate the machine."
