## First 1961 Bale is Ginned at Flomot

MOTLEY COUNTY'S FIRST 1961 BALE was ginned Tuesday (August 29) at the Flomot Gin. It was grown by Sam Ross from cotton planted about the last of April. From 1805 lbs. of seed cotton he received a 423 lb. bale, with 820 lbs. of seed. Joe Degan, manager of the Flomot Gin, brought the bale here where it was exhibited at the corner of Main and Dundee streets in front of the First State Bank.

## Girls Top Boys in School Enrollment

For the first time in the history of Matador High School, girls outnumbered boys, it was revealed following final count in enrollment Monday morning. Supt. Bert Ezzell announced a registration of 87, with 45 girls and 42 boys. In grade school, 218 students registered, which is 20% less than was expected.

## Reserve Seats to Buy Scoreboard

THE DUST has started to settle again on the pavilion and the rodeo arena at Roaring Springs Pioneer Park. It was stirred up aptly by the 38th Annual Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Reunion which closed three days and nights Saturday night. The dust was stirred by more pairs of feet than ever assembled on the grounds in a previous comparable time. There were more calf ropers at the rodeo (68) than ever before, and the "Heading and Heeling" contests registered 87 pairs. More people attended the three nights of rodeos than ever before. There were fewer Old Settlers. Many long-familiar faces were absent. The memorial service for deceased from the two counties was exceedingly high.

Tribute was paid to C. C. Haile of Spur, unable to attend, who was president of the association for 19 years. James Meador, 94, of Matador registered Thursday morning, but returned home immediately. Peace officers, who always sigh in relief when the reunion is over, said there was only a minimum of disorderly conduct cases. No serious accidents were reported.

**Top Time on Four** Kenneth Mauldin of Silverton, Texas won the young man's saddle for the fastest time (72.05 sec.) on four head in the rodeo contests. The old man's roping contest (and 1st prize Carl Darr saddle) was won by L. D. Thompson of New Castle, Texas with one tie down of 19.9 seconds. In the bareback and saddle bronc riding, Ed Workham of Lubbock won first place silver belt buckles. Butch Hadley, also of Lubbock won a belt buckle for first place in the bull riding.

In the Junior Boys breakaway (15 and under) Arnold Deal Felts of Jayton won the prize spurs with the remarkable time of 4.3 seconds. In the junior flag race (boys and girls 11 and under) Natha Meers of Plainview took the first place spurs with a time of 11.07 seconds.

Fred C. Bourland, of Matador, Motley County pioneer and active vice-president, Thursday afternoon was elected to the Presidency of the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association for 1962. Joe Rose of Duncan Flat was named 1st vice president, Maurice Goodwin of Afton was named 2nd vice president and John Meason was re-elected to the office of secretary-treasurer.

Re-elected directors are Alvin Stearns and John Stevens of Matador, Buck Marshall of Roaring Springs, Johnny Koonsman of Dickens and Cliff Bird of Spur. Election was by acclamation.

## Representative Speaks

Principal address was made by State Representative Bill Heatly of Paducah, who was introduced by County Judge Elbert Reeves. Rep. Heatly is serving his fourth term in the Legislature.

His brief talk outlined the expenditures of Texas which will require \$2 1/2 billion in the next two years, making the sales tax a necessity. He said, however, that he tried very hard to raise the beer tax from its present 3%, and received no cooperation from Governor Price Daniel. He said beer is not carrying its share with gas at 18%, whiskey 18% and cigarettes 27%.

Rep. Heatly told the old people that they would receive \$3 more per month, beginning the first of September. He said the state has 223,000 on old age pension. He said \$167 million is needed for public welfare, in addition the money needed for the blind, dependent children and (Continued on back page)

the totally and permanently disabled.

He said Texas has 2 million boys and girls in school and that it costs the state \$290 per student per nine months. Texas has 19 senior colleges with 92,000 boys and girls enrolled. It costs an average of \$600 per student per nine months (cheapest is Sam Houston \$459 and most expensive is U of Texas \$924). These figures are the operation costs and do not include the vast capital outlay.

Rep. Healy said Texas has 33 Junior Colleges with 24,000 students that cost \$200 per student per nine months.

Texas costs lots of money. Farm to market roads cost \$505 per mile per year to maintain. State highways cost \$1020 per mile per year to maintain. Four lane highways (in rural areas)

cost \$2,700 per mile per year to maintain and in the cities they cost \$7,250 per mile per year to maintain.

The tax dollar is broken down this way: Public schools and higher education 42%; highways and roads 30%; public welfare 16%; all other 5%. State administration costs 1 1/2%.
