## MORRIS BURKS NAMED TO GET HEROISM AWARD

Morris Burkes, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Skee Burkes of Matador is one of the three Texans named by the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council to receive a Rural Heroism Award for "bravery exhibited at a time of crisis" in 1960.

Recipients of the awards will receive plaques from the Texas Farm and Ranch Council.

Two Others Honored

The other two recipients are Lela Kay Hardeman, 14, Prairie Lea, and I. D. Rainey, 71, a retired oil field worker of Whitesboro, both of whom were credited with rescues that prevented drownings.

Burkes, who was active in sports, 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America before graduating from high school, was credited with saving the life of a fellow service station employee whose clothing caught fire.

He used his hands to extinguish the flaming clothes of Buddy Davis, 18, who suffered first, second and third degree burns. Burkes himself was severely burned.

Clothing Catches Fire

Davis accidentally splashed gasoline on his clothes and a few minutes later stepped too close to an open stove inside the station.

"As his clothes burst into flames, he rapidly dropped to the floor in an attempt to put out the flames," the Safety Council report cites. "But then in panic, he jumped up and rushed out of the station."

"Burkes raced after Davis, tackled him, and tore off his flaming coveralls, only to have Davis jump up and run off again. And again Burkes tackled the flaming youth, this time holding him down and beating out the flames with his hands."

## One Man Survives Truck-Train Wreck

ONE MAN, Gene Van Camp, 29, of Amarillo, erroneously reported by the Tribune as killed last week in the tragic truck-train accident at Roaring Springs, survives. He has not regained consciousness and is a patient in Stanley Hospital here. His condition is considered serious.

The Tribune erred in not confirming the report that Mr. Van Camp had succumbed after being brought here. The report was general both here and at Roaring Springs that both men had lost their lives when the loaded grain truck crashed into a Q. A. & P. freight train at a grade crossing just east of the Roaring Springs city limits.

Three of the four units diesel engine and about ten freight cars piled up in one of the worst train wrecks in this area. One unofficial estimate was that the loss to the railroad company might exceed half a million dollars.

Despite the pileup of cars, two deep in places, traffic was resumed on the line in 27 hours after the accident.

Brasleton Implement Co. of Roaring Springs and Jameson Machinery Company of Matador worked throughout Wednesday night in clearing up the wreckage and making it possible to begin laying track Thursday. Winch trucks and caterpillar tractors were used in moving the heavy materials, including the piled up box cars, rails and debris.

## RIG MOVED TO NEW OIL TEST

OIL activity in Motley County was resumed this week with the announcement that a new test is going down on the Kinery place east of the East Roaring Springs field.

It is being drilled as the No. 1 Kinery, by P-M Drilling Co. and Cosden Petroleum Corp., operating from Midland.

The Lubbock Avalanche Tuesday said the well will be drilled to 4,500 feet to test the Permian-Pennsylvanian reef.

Other information is that the well is on an 80-acre lease eight miles east of Roaring Springs and 1 1/2 miles east of the Roaring Springs field. Drillsite is 467 feet from south and 660 from east lines of Section 20, Block H, Abstract 1,514.

The Texas House of Representatives of the Fifty-seventh Legislature, February 15, passed a Resolution of Tribute to the late Sam Dewey Rattan who died at Hillsboro, February 4, 1961.

The Resolution H. S. R. No. 196 was introduced by Representative Roberts of Hill County and was unanimously adopted by a rising vote of the House.

The Resolution cited the outstanding Christian life of Mr. Rattan and his service in many fields that benefitted especially underprivileged children, his work as a teacher and his leadership in civic organization.

He was a brother of Virgil, Littleton and Ward Rattan, all of Matador, Carroll of Salinas, Calif., Wallace of Fort Worth, Fred of Amarillo and Mrs. Sallie Huey of Denton.

Born at Whiteflat, Sept. 29, 1896, he was the son of pioneers, Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Rattan.

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
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
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### Funeral Services Held At Afton For Two Resident Who Died The Same Day

A weekly newspaper started in Matador in 1894, or 67 years of publication of a newspaper in this community. The first newspaper was named "The Motley County News" but changed several times before it was again changed to the Motley County News, then to the Tribune.

The Linotype machine which set this type was shipped here by rail on the Motley County Railway, the 8-mile line built by the citizens of Matador after the Q. A. & P. missed this town. The railroad later acquired by the Q. was discontinued about 1935.

The Linotype was hauled by horse-drawn freight wagon from the depot at the east edge of town, to the Masonic building, where the Tribune was published for 19 years before moving to its own modern building at 1001 Main Street.
