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Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-B, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) the maximum income tax interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board, providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-B, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all factors shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-B of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section at a rate of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-B of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section at a rate of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters had voted in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date on which the said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

nationally at the end of last December; to a retired couple, both of whom were receiving benefits, the average payment was \$121. The average for a widow with two young children was \$169.

Average Start was \$22
By contrast, Mr Hutton recalled that when benefits first became payable in 1940, the average monthly payment to retired worker with no dependents receiving benefits was \$22, and to a retired couple the average payment was \$36.

As social security celebrates its Silver Anniversary (the original Act was signed into law on August 14, 1935) about 74 million working people are in covered employment or self-employment in the course of a year. They are building old-age, survivors, and disability protection for themselves, their dependents, and their survivors under the social security law.

For the entire State of Texas, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance payments at the end of December, 1959, were being paid to 540,833 beneficiaries at the rate of more than \$350,000,000 per year.

"Bob Johnson (now of Lubbock) was driving the tractor. He set the plows deep and let the tractor go. It plowed with all the ease in the world. Within a few minutes I saw that the power was not being used to pull the tractor and heavy iron wheels; but to pull the plows. I sent a man to town to get another set.

"That was the beginning of the end of the mules. We were soon farming better, with less help and with more profit. We lost a lot of population in the farming country, but the tenant farmers and hired hands found better jobs and were able to give their families a better standard of living than they could ever expect on the poorly-paid farm job.

"The farmer was able to make money because he could work his crop (several times as much) with less cost and quickly after rains when planting and cultivation were most needed. The tractor has revolutionized farming in the whole nation. It has

given us a super abundance of food and fibre, but until it was put on rubber tires, the tractor was not practical."
