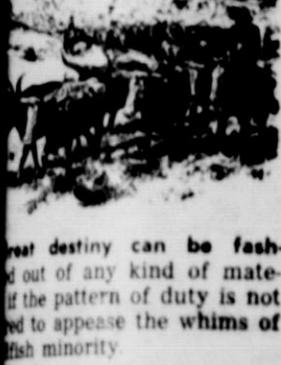

General Election At Teepee City Record Is Found

Pioneer citizens of Motley County took their voting seriously. Almost 40 votes were cast during the general election at Teepee City in 1886, according to some records found by Harry H. Campbell, whose father, Henry H. Campbell founded the Matador Land and Cattle Co.

Teepee City was then Precinct No. 3. The old records show that Pioneer A. B. Cooper received 5 votes for county judge, Bill Cloyd was elected sheriff, Jim Thompson was elected tax assessor, Walter A. Walton was elected county clerk and John Cammack was elected constable of Teepee City.

Mr. Campbell said it was the first election in which the settlers had been able to "out-vote" the "company" (Matador Ranch). It was the beginning of the turn of events in which the pioneers could control the county; they had settled for their homes. It is a record of the use of the ballot by free men.

New Ranch Lands Get Improvements

CHANGES are coming to Matley County as a result of the sale of the vast acreage of the former Matador Land & Cattle Co. and later the Red Lake Cattle Co. The expansion of land northeast of Matador that in the past was one ranch, is now many ranches.

Fences, windmills, tanks and other improvements are changing the entire area. Cattle are being returned to the ranges as the new ranch owners stock their acreages. Some areas are being put in cultivation but generally the land will be operated as ranches.

George Adams of Wichita Falls is currently building two houses on his 42,000-acre "slice" of what was once the Matador range. One house is being built on Highway 70 west of Teepee Creek. The other house is being built near "Lucky Knob" about 3 1/2 miles southeast of the old Turtle Hole line camp.

Barns, corrals and other improvements will also be built. The Adams Ranch is being managed by John Stevens of Matador, former manager of the Matador Land & Cattle Co., and later manager of the Red Lake Cattle Co. who now also operates his own holdings.

Other buyers of the Matador land are planning improvements to better operate the ranching property. It is believed that within a year or more most of the property will be improved to make it operate the smaller ranches efficiently.

Cemetery To End Sexton's Service

For the first time in a number of years Matador East Mound Cemetery will be without the regular service of a caretaker, effective the 1st of September. East Mound Cemetery Association is without funds.

At the regular meeting held Thursday afternoon in the Commissioners Court room, the total amount in the treasury was announced as \$193. The amount owed the caretaker for his month's salary is \$160.

President J. R. Whitworth said the association will accept donations and that the regular membership dues will be assessed in December. A committee has been appointed to take care of emergency work, he said.

Fatal Accidents Hit Farm People More Frequently

Farm people have a slightly higher percentage of fatal accidents than do other population groups, reports the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. The rate of accidental deaths from work and recreational activities on farms is increasing slightly each year, as is the death rates associated with machinery, drownings, firearms and electricity. Accidental deaths due to animals, falls, lightning and burns are decreasing, however.

According to a recent survey made by the National Safety Council, Texas ranks in the top ten states in the number of deaths caused from drownings, firearms, burns and electricity. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council points out that a little care and caution on the part of rural dwellers could help remove Texas from these unpopular lists.

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Old Settlers Rodeo Popularity Growing

MOTLEY COUNTY is the West and cattle country. It has been ranching country for three-quarters of a century and it is the true land of the cowboy. That is one of the reasons the three day rodeo at Roaring Springs has grown steadily in popularity until it is now classed as one of the top amateur rodeos in West Texas. The other reason is that its production has been under the direction of cattlemen and cowboys. Previously the late Curtis Graham had aided former sheriff John Stotts in managing the performances. Since Mr. Graham's death, John Stotts has been placed in the management position, aided by Jodie Graham as Parade Chairman and a staff of cowmen experienced in the work of arranging and conducting a rodeo.

Roaring Springs Arena has become a mecca for ropers and riders from everywhere. The best come to the rodeo to compete for the excellent prizes in some of the finest roping and riding performances to be found throughout the land of cattle and cowboys.

Booking of contestants is started in advance to provide entrance for as many as possible, but each year a larger number finds all available time has been assigned.

This year the performances again promise to be outstanding. When the rodeo opens the first evening of Old Settlers reunion, it is probable that the seating capacity of the arena will be exhausted as it has several times in recent years. And the ticket purchasers will receive full value for their money - the best in rodeo performance.

Deadline is Near For 4-H Records

Deadline is near for submitting 4-H records for competition in the 4-H awards program, members are reminded.

Any boy or girl who is a 4-H member may submit a record this year to compete in the awards program. These are due in County Agent Bill Palmeyer's office by Aug. 29.

A record should consist of the Standard Report Form; 4-H records of different projects and demonstrations carried out by the member; news clippings relating to the member's 4-H work; pictures showing 4-H work completed by the member; and a narrative relative to the awards program entered.

Two individual black and white glossy prints, 3 1/2 x 5 should be included, as well as 4-H correspondence.

Different award programs may call for additional information, and all 4-H members are urged to contact County Agent Palmeyer relative to entering an awards program this year.

Senior records eligible for State and National honors are for those who were 14 years old and older by Jan. 1, 1960, and other records will be entered in the junior contests for district honors. Top awards for state winners are expense paid trips to National 4-H Club Congress, and National winners receive college scholarships.

Hog Price Outlook Declared Brighter

College Station, August 18.—The price outlook for hogs for the next few months is considerably brighter, John McHoney, extension economist, says that prices received by farmers in the last half of 1960 will be higher than those received in the last half of 1959, and the usual fall price decline can be expected.

McHoney explains this forecasted price rise by pointing out that 1960 spring pig crop was down 16 percent from the 1959 spring crop. This decrease was brought about mainly because fewer sows fattened and fewer pigs were produced per sow.

The specialist says there are indications that this downturn in production may be the shortest on record, and just because prices may be better in the last half of 1960 and in the first few months of 1961 is no reason to believe that prices will bring satisfactory returns to all producers in the last half of 1961.

Plans Received For Cattle Head Gates

Plans for making cattle head gates have been received, and are available to Motley County cow owners for the asking.

There is no charge for these plans that were recommended by Dr. Henderson of the Texas Animal Health Commission at the meeting held in Matador to explain how the brucellosis (Bangs) test would operate in the county.

Henderson explained that the gate would enable the operators to handle the animals easier and faster when samples were drawn for the test. They also come in handy when a stockman has some animals to work, and is short on help.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

MOORE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Section 1 to be known as Section 1, and 2, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County and County Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain restrictions; providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication of the same.

SECTION 1. THAT ARTICLE IX OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BE, AND THE SAME IS HEREBY, AMENDED BY ADDING THE FOLLOWING SECTIONS WHICH SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

"Section 1. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County and County Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 2(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Wichita County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Lamar County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (\$0.75) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation."

SECTION 2. THE FOREGOING CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THIS STATE AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE 29th DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1960, AT WHICH ELECTION ALL BALLOTS SHALL HAVE PRINTED THEREON THE FOLLOWING:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ALLOWING AN ANNUAL SALARY OF NOT TO EXCEED FOUR THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,800) PER YEAR AND A PER DIEM ALLOWANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED TWELVE DOLLARS (\$12) PER DAY FOR THE FIRST ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY (120) DAYS OF EACH SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE AS THE MAXIMUM COMPENSATION FOR MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND LIMITING THE REGULAR SESSION TO ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY (140) DAYS."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT ALLOWING AN ANNUAL SALARY OF NOT TO EXCEED FOUR THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$4,800) PER YEAR AND A PER DIEM ALLOWANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED TWELVE DOLLARS (\$12) PER DAY FOR THE FIRST ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY (120) DAYS OF EACH SESSION OF THE LEGISLATURE AS THE MAXIMUM COMPENSATION FOR MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND LIMITING THE REGULAR SESSION TO ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY (140) DAYS."

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days of each session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars (\$2) per day for each day of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat and hereafter to be established, no Member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

"Section 25. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

"Section 26. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Hidalgo County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 2(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidalgo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District subject to district taxation."

"Section 27. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers voting who have daily rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be authorized to levy shall be ten cents (10c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

"Section 28. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

MOORE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days of each session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication of the same.

SECTION 1. THAT SECTION 24 OF ARTICLE IX OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BE, AND THE SAME IS HEREBY, AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days of each session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars (\$2) per day for each day of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat and hereafter to be established, no Member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

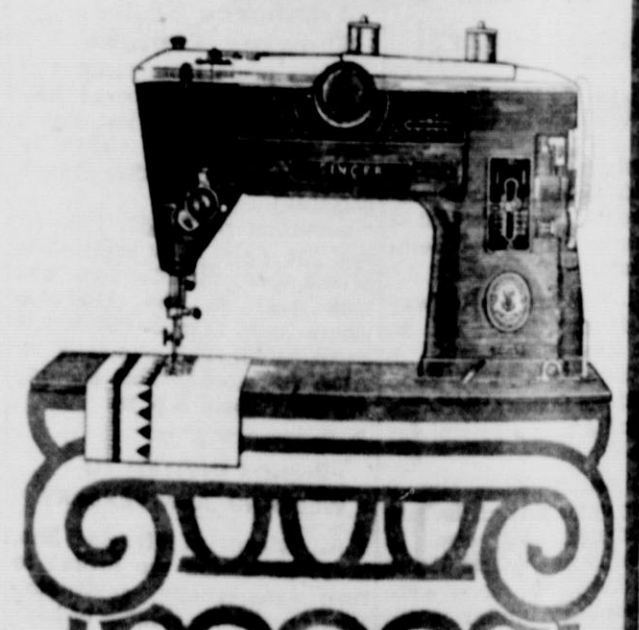

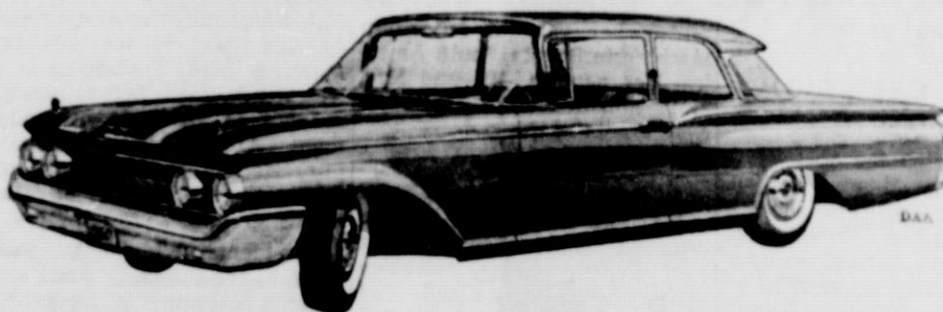

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

HOW TO MAINTAIN GOOD FISHING TANK

Would a farmer sow a field of wheat and then deliberately sow crabgrass in the same field? Of course not—this would be very poor management. Many farmers do, however, have their farm pond properly stocked and then add fish from another pond, a river, or a minnow bucket. This is also poor management, and is one reason why tanks are poor fishing.

Fish obtained from sources other than hatcheries usually contain undesirable species such as shad, catfish, suckers, gar and mud-cat. These undesirable species will compete with the game fish for food, they eat the young game species, some will muddy the pond, and all will be a general nuisance to the fisherman.

Another erroneous practice is to add grown fish to a freshly stocked pond. This usually is done so the owner can "catch some big fish while the small ones are growing up". The owner must remember that the grown fish have to eat, and in all probability they will eat the hatchery fingerlings. With this situation, it wouldn't be very long until the farmer had no fish large or small in his pond.

Pond owners are usually worried by the fact that the hatchery fish are very small when they arrive, and there doesn't seem to be enough of them. If the pond is managed properly, these fingerlings will be reproducing the following year, and then the problem will be too many fish rather than not enough.

Hatcheries provide the right kinds of fish to the pond owner, and any other fish which are added will usually have a detrimental effect. Once a pond is properly stocked, there is no good reason to add more fish. For bulletins on Pond Management, contact County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1948.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) the maximum percentage interest rate on bonds authorized by the Veterans' Land Board, providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereinafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of the Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3 1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first

Monday after the first Monday in November, 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1948.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate interest and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rate of interest, providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon, providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate interest and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rate of interest."

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and have the same published in full in the Constitution and laws of the State.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and have the same published in full in the Constitution and laws of the State.
