He found that by taking this Aloe Vera jelly, adding a small amount of water and bringing it to a near-boil, it could be cooled and refrigerated without losing its qualities. It is efective in

this form or fresh, he says." According to Brunneman, who recently retired as former Cameron County Agricultural Agent, the plant is easily grown. New plants can be started from pieces of roots or from small new leaves on the old plant.
