## Whiteflat Pioneer Sees Many Changes

ENTERING BUSINESS in Whiteflat in 1904 did not require a large capital outlay. Jim Hendricks opened the first and only barbershop in the community for \$9. He paid \$3 for a mirror and other items included a teakettle, strap and razor. At that time Whiteflat had two general merchandise stores and a grocery store. Jim Hendricks left Whiteflat in 1911 and returned last week end and was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Willie Rattan here in Matador. He joined the Baptist Church in Whiteflat in 1909, and Sunday be returned with Mr. and Mrs. Rattan to attend the services. He taught the men's Sunday School class before the church services.

Jim Hendricks settled in Whiteflat in 1904 with his mother, Mrs. Bell Smith, a brother, Bill, two half-sisters, Jenny and Ida and half-brother, Jack. Robert E. Lee was postmaster at the time. Later Jim Hendricks' mother became postmistress. She died in 1907 and is buried here in East Mound Cemetery as is her sister, Mrs. Horace Thomas. The late Horace Thomas was once superintendent of Matador schools and later served as coun-

## Mobile County Unit Fights Grass Fires

TWO PRAIRIE FIRES in the past week have seen action from the county's big six-wheel fire truck, purchased through Civil Defense and kept in readiness for emergencies. Approximately two sections of grass were lost Monday on the east side of Hackberry Tank southeast of Matador. Call for the service of the county's prairie fire fighting equipment advised that the fire was in the vicinity of Russellville. Unable to cross the deep canyons east, the truck was forced to return and make a long drive through another approach.

Another prairie fire was reported on the Doc Burleson ranch early Tuesday, north of the river and in the area of the Jack Spray farm. It is believed that lightning may have previously ignited mesquite, which smoldered until fanned by wind, caused the grass to begin burning.

In this instance the county truck arrived after the fire had been brought under control by tractors and graders destroying mesquites in the area. Loss was confined to a small area.

## Rites Today For Mrs. Doug Meador

Mrs. Doug Meador, 72, widow of a pioneer Matador cowboy died about 9:20 a. m. Tuesday of a heart attack. She had suffered the heart ailment for several years and had been hospitalized during last month. She died at her home, where she had been recuperating for about 10 days.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. today (Thursday) at the First Methodist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Roy Patterson officiating. Assisting will be Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister, Matador, and Rev. W. R. Dale, Primitive Baptist minister from Lubbock.

Burial will be in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

Mrs. Meador was born Chloe Elizabeth Blair, October 14, 1888, in Springfield, Missouri, and died June 13, 1961 at the age of 72 years, 7 months, 29 days. She came to Texas as a child with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Sam Blair, who lived first in Iowa Park and later moved to Dickens County, where her father was employed on the 6666 ranch.

She was married at Dickens in 1910 to George Earl Briscoe, a cowboy on the neighboring Pitchfork Ranch, who died in 1920. To this union were born three children, all of whom survive.

She was married May 27, 1923 to Doug Meador, at Matador and had made her home here since 1947. He passed away in January, 1947. To this union were born two children, who survive. In addition to her own children, she mothered and reared three step-children.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. E. M. Lebow, Clovis, N. M., and Mrs. Betty Osborn, Matador; three sons, W. E. Briscoe, Plainview; John Briscoe, and James Meador, both of Matador; two step-daughters, Mrs. Wesley Hall and Mrs. Elvin Markham both of Matador; and one step-son, Charlie Meador, Matador; one sister, Mrs. Floy Dickinson, Pasadena, Calif.; one brother, David Blair, St. John, Arizona; 19 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren.

## Crop Outlook Aided By Additional Rain

ADDITIONAL RAINFALL that has measured slightly more than 2 inches here in Matador since Thursday afternoon, has greatly improved crop and range conditions in most parts of the county. The series of showers Thursday afternoon measured a total of 1.45 inches by Bob Stanley's rain gauge. Another "quickie" storm late Monday added .62-inch and was accompanied by high wind and started to bloom and late cotton is growing rapidly. All row crops show a promising outlook in most areas.

The general turbulent weather that kept West Texas "jittery" last week because of numerous tornado "alerts" and several funnels sighted, had brought rain to the northern part of the county and as far south as Whiteflat.

## County School Land Investments Pay Regular Dividends To Three Schools

THIS YEAR each student in Motley County's three schools will receive \$6.86 worth of dividends paid for out of investments from the county's school fund. At the present time Motley County owns \$118,971.46 in bonds and has a balance of \$27,333 in the permanent fund for the purchase of other bonds as present investments. The total interest for 1960-61 was \$4,290.61, according to figures released by County Judge Elbert Reeves.

Motley County has an excellent record in the handling of school lands (the county still has a labor in Bailey County).

For comparison Floyd County receives \$1.63 per pupil, Hall 39c, Dickens \$1.42 and Bexar County is the lowest

with Le and Terrell County is the highest with \$28.29. When the Texas Republic was admitted to the Union in 1845, the state was permitted to retain her vast domain of 49,468,934 acres. Acts of the Congress of the Republic and the Legislature of the state divided the land as follows:

University of Texas and A & M College, 2,329,168 acres, eleemosynary institutions 410,600 acres, Public Free Schools 42,500,000 acres and for county school purposes 4,229,166 acres. The General Education act and later amendment gave each county a total of 17,692 acres. Counties were slow in selecting their lands and owing to the abundance of land, little revenue was derived from the system of leases to which they were restricted. Sixteen counties were organized too late to receive any land. From more than 4,000,000 acres originally granted, the

various counties have retained ownership of about 172,000 acres.

## Frank Tolbert's "Texas History" Has Style That Makes Reading A Pleasure

AN INFORMAL HISTORY OF TEXAS BY FRANK X. TOLBERT HANCKER AND BROTHERS, INC. NEW YORK, 23.95

IT is hardly probable that Frank X. Tolbert's newest book, "An Informal History of Texas" will be recommended in school history courses, but it might well be, since students would enjoy it and at the same time learn some previously unwritten history of Texas. It is a zestful, adult book that makes reading a pleasure.

It is written in the style of the breezy far horizons of the Plains country of Texas, for Frank Tolbert is a West Texan, a former staff writer on the Lubbock Avalanche. His mother, Mrs. Frances Lee Tolbert and his brother, Hunter G. Tolbert are both Lubbock residents.

Tolbert writes a daily column in the Dallas Morning News and is well known for his books "The Staked Plain," "The Day of San Jacinto" and others. He did not write "An Informal History of Texas" on the spur of the moment. Accompanied by his young son he made a 4,137-mile jeep trip around the perimeter of Texas in gathering material.

Some of Texas heroes are not so heroic in Tolbert's history and some of the heroes and "heroines" who have been neglected in the past are projected to their proper places in history. Tolbert writes with the informality of interesting conversation.

In one instance he says: "The Quanah, Arme & Pacific Railway begins in the prosperous town of Quanah, near the Red River and roams up on the Staked Plains to Floydada. (This city got its unusual name from the combine intended to honor Mrs. Ada Price, wife of a turn-of-the-century real estate operator, and a hero slain in the Alamo, Dolphin Floyd.) It has 122 miles of track. There were plans for it to go to the Pacific."

Following are excerpts from Jack Sheridan's review of Tolbert's book, which appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche: "The idea for his book as he states in no less than 39 pages of 'author's explanation' — was to take a jeep journey around the state's borders to find out, as he says 'why does Texas begin and end on certain river shores? Why does Texas bulge in the midriff? Why does the Panhandle 'neck' stick nearly into the heartland of the nation? And why is the southern seashore almost in the tropics? These are the things history can tell."

"And so Tolbert sets off in his jeep and finds out the answers to these questions through conversations with old timers, through examination of archives and legal records, through the location of famous and little known and many times forgotten plots of prairie or mountain or river bottom where Texas history was forged.

Covers Vast Period "He covers the Texas background that runs 'from Cabeza de Vaca to Temple Houston' (youngest son of Sam Houston). "He covers the Indian troubles, the revolutionary days with Mexico, touching again on the Alamo, the rise of the Republic and the eventual annexation, the Civil War and dips into the days of the Reconstruction.

"Tolbert has written a truly informal account, as his title states, and he intersperses historical data with charming, touching and humorous little bits and pieces of character study."

## COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

### DAILY CARE OF HOGS PAYS OFF

Most everyone has heard the fable of the tortoise and the hare, but how many people have realized the truth in this tale? Livestock producers, especially hog raisers, can learn from the patient turtle.

The swine producer who leaps hare-like for the bottle of "wonder-drugs" when his hogs are ill will fall way behind the thorough, patient husbandman who has followed a program of disease and parasite prevention. True, day to day attention to details which insure the health of a swine herd is not very spectacular but it is far and away better than reliance on drugs. Treatment alone does not provide the complete answer to the problem of profitable swine production.

An effective health program for swine must provide a clean healthy environment, prevent exposure of animals to disease-producing agents, provide for early detection and identification of diseases and parasites, provide for early treatment selected and applied on the basis of diagnosis and include accurate and complete records.

Diseases and parasites cut \$15.50 from every \$100 net profit realized from hog production. Baby pig diseases cost producers \$426 million yearly and hog cholera and swine fever off \$75 million each year. These losses can be greatly reduced if proper herd health measures are followed.

It's up to you Mr. Hog Producer. Do you want to raise swine for the money in it, or for the enjoyment?

## About Your Health

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health.

Beginning September 1, 1961, Texans will begin paying a higher fee for certified birth and death certificates according to Senate Bill 69 passed by the 57th Legislature.

The law raises the fee for a certified copy from \$1.00 to \$1.50, to cover the increased cost for issuing such certificates.

The new law does not affect birth certificate copies requested before September 1.

The Records and Statistics Section of the State Health Department—the State agency responsible for Texas' birth and death record keeping—also made its annual summer plea for parents of children entering school for the first time to make application for certified birth copies as soon as possible to avoid the last minute rush.

There is an added incentive this year, explained State Health authorities, because of the expected extra rush of requests seeking to beat the September fee increase.

Texas schools usually require proof-of-age for children entering school for the first time. A certified copy of a birth certificate is the best and most accurate proof, accepted by all Texas schools.

Certified copies may be obtained from county clerks and local registrars.

If not procured locally, a copy may be obtained for \$1.00 from the Records and Statistics Section of the Texas State Department of Health in Austin until September 1, 1961 — \$1.50 after that date. The fee must accompany the certificate request.

Needed for a quick and positive search of records are the name of the child, both parents' names, place of birth and date of birth. This information should be included with the request.

Past experience proves the earlier requests get quicker response.

Another hint for parents with children beginning school, is to provide each child with a thorough physical check-up from a physician.

Also, it is wise to check school regulations concerning vaccinations.

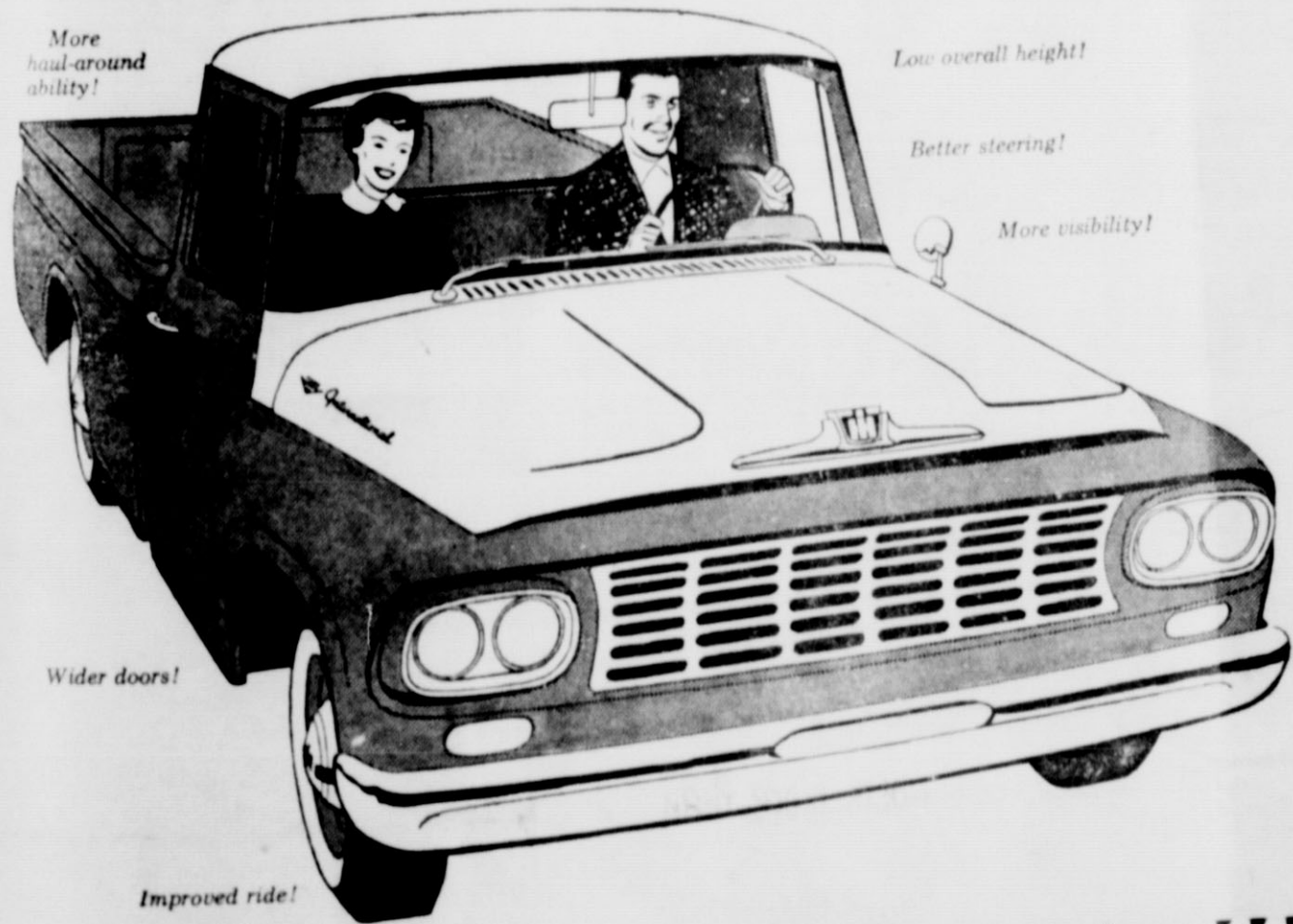

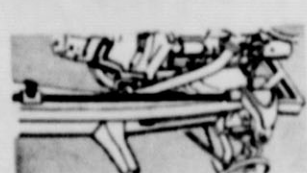

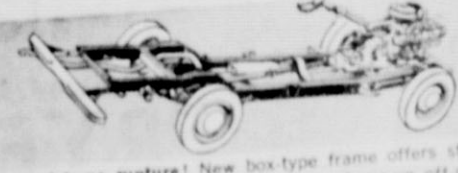
