DEATH WAITED at a grade crossing in Roaring Springs yesterday afternoon for two Amarillo men until their loaded grain truck crashed into the first of a four diesel engine unit of a Quanah, Acme & Pacific freight train.

Walter L. Robinson, 33, and Gene Vancamp, about 25, died in the grotesque pattern of destruction that followed the impact. Derailment of three units of the engine and eight freight cars immediately following in the 34car train, left a wake of property damage probably without parallel in this county's history.

Freight cars piled up on top of each other and the three units of the diesels turned on their sides, plowed into the earth and became motionless like stricken giants.

Lead Engine Remains Upright

The lead engine miraculously remained upright, altho it had received the impact that resulted in the derailment. None of the five-men train crew was injured. Veteran engineer Elton Marsalis was at the throttle and shared the cab with Fireman R. L. Choat. Three other members of the crew, Conductor Guy Adams, Rearend Brakeman Fred Pierce and Head Brakeman B. J. Nance were in the caboose, which came to a stop a short time after it had passed over the Dutchman River Bridge.


