Funeral services for M. J. Pyron, 78, were held Wednesday at the Methodist Church in Flomot, with the pastor, Rev. Ruth Cooper officiating, assisted by Rev. Ed Spivey, pastor of the Flomot Baptist Church. Mr. Pyron, a long-time resident of Flomot died late Monday night in Veterans Hospital in Amarillo, after being hospitalized for several weeks, in Lockney General Hospital. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Methodist Church.

The body was taken to Edom, Texas for burial in a family plot there. Roberts Funeral Home of Quitaque was in charge of funeral arrangements.

A native of Georgia, Mr. Pyron had resided in the Flomot community from 1923 until 1941, and at intervals since that time, until the fall of 1959 when he again returned to make his permanent home, following his marriage to Mrs. Lizzie Crowell. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lizzie Pyron of Flomot; four daughters, Mrs. Thekla Loving Quitaque, Mrs. Keith Griffin, Silverton, Mrs. J. W. Austin and Mrs. Irma Oakley, both of Dallas; two sons, I. F. Pyron of Corpus Christi and Edolph of Brownsville; one step-daughter, Mrs. W. L. Nall of Iran, Texas, and two stepsons, Eds Crowell of Amarillo and L. C. Crowell of Flomot.

Open Cesspools To Draw Penalty

City and state health laws require that septic tanks, or cesspools be covered and that all drainage be covered, to meet state specifications. City officials are receiving complaints that a number of uncovered septic tanks and drainage ditches are being used in the city limits.

The Tribune has been requested to publish a warning to offenders that the unsanitary conditions must be corrected in order to avoid possible penalties, under laws designed to protect the health and welfare of communities.

Amarillo Paper Pulitzer Winner

A vigorous civic housecleaning in Amarillo last year led Monday to a distinguished award for the Amarillo Globe-Times — a Pulitzer prize for meritorious public service. The afternoon newspaper received the cherished journalistic award—a gold medal—for a crusade against vice and corruption which drove a county judge from office and contributed to a turnover in law enforcement personnel.

It was the first Pulitzer prize for public service ever won by a Texas newspaper. The awards were announced in New York. In Amarillo, on receiving notification of the award, Publisher S. B. Whittenburg said:

"The Pulitzer Gold Medal for meritorious service to the Amarillo Globe-Times will be a continual challenge to us to be more constantly alert for those individuals or combination of individuals which destroy the fabric of good community life."

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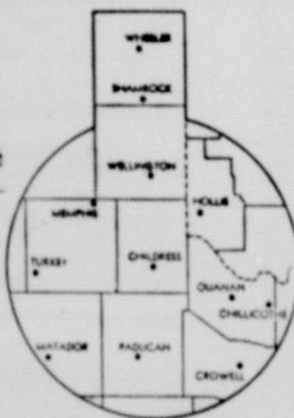
