Trustee Vote Is Declared "Light"

Trustee vote in Motley County Saturday was declared "light" by officials. In Roaring Springs Jos M. "Buzz" Thacker was returned as school board secretary with 30 votes and W. H. Godfrey was returned as a board member with 22 votes. M. S. Patton received 36 votes as county trustee at large in the box.

In the Whitefall box Jesse Browning received 9 votes as county trustee. Patton received 8 votes as trustee at large; Courtney 8, Dixon 10 and Wason 8. At Northfield Patton received 12 votes, Courtney 9, Dixon 4 and Wason 5.

In the Flomot box Jesse Browning received 40 votes as county trustee, M. S. Patton 43 votes as trustee at large, and local trustees as follows: Ray Cruse 26, L. E. Shorter 27 and Herbert Martin 41. Write-ins were recorded in all boxes.

Rites Held For Former Resident

Final rites for Mrs. Ernest Herring, 75, of El Paso, former Matador resident were held at 2:30 p.m. Saturday at first Methodist Church here, and burial was in East Mound Cemetery.

Mrs. Herring, a resident of El Paso for the past 14 years, died there Thursday.

Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor, was in charge of the service and was assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, who delivered the memorial message.

Funeral arrangements were directed by Eudy-Seale Funeral Home, and pallbearers were nephews J. C. Criswell, Brownfield, J. H. Criswell, Denver City; J. M. Russell, Colorado City; Donald Davis, Lubbock; Raymond Davis, Alpine; and Ernest Fisher, Flomot.

Mrs. Herring, known familiarly as Lettie Criswell by her friends here, was born Mary Letitia Criswell, April 25, 1885 in McCullough County, Texas, and died March 30, 1961 at the age of 75 years, 11 months and 5 days.

She came to this area with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John H. Criswell, in 1896 settling in Childress. The family moved to Motley County in 1898, and she was married to Ernest Herring at Matador on December 25, 1912. They left here in about 1915.

Survivors include her husband, Ernest Herring, El Paso; three sisters Mrs. Lena Scott and Mrs. Ora McLane both of Childress, N. M. and Mrs. Myrtle Stubbs of El Paso, all of whom attended the funeral, and several nephews and nieces.

Campbell Elected To City Council

A "write-in" campaign elected Bundy Campbell as the third member of the Matador city council in Tuesday's municipal election held simultaneously with the Senatorial election in the court house lobby.

Only two names, Dr. J. S. Stanley (re-election) and Lewis Bostick were on the ballot to elect three councilmen. Stanley received 148 votes and Bostick 148 votes. Campbell received 34 "write-in" votes.

Election officials complained that the number of "write-in" votes for the council place almost equaled the Senatorial race candidates.

The vacant place on the ballot resulted after the resignation of councilman John Irwin, with not enough time remaining to place another name on the ticket.

Bundy Campbell is the son of pioneer rancher Harry Campbell, President of the First State Bank.

New Bus Schedule Now In Operation

A new afternoon bus schedule is now in operation out of Lubbock on Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma Coaches serving Matador.

The afternoon bus leaves Lubbock at 2:35 (instead of 12:20) and arrives here at 4:30 p.m. (instead of the former schedule of 2:30).

With the morning bus leaving Matador at 9:31 and arriving in Lubbock at 11:30, the new afternoon schedule allows 3 hours in Lubbock and same day return to Matador.

The new schedule provides direct connections from El Paso to Fort Worth and Dallas via Matador and Vernon.

Light Increase In Car Registration

Motley County showed a small increase in car registration Tuesday as compared with the same date a year ago. Total number of cars was 921 as compared with 900 on the same date in 1960.

Trucks and pickups also showed a small increase. The registration was 521 as compared with 505 in 1960.

Car registration also includes the county's two amateur operators who have their call letters as license plates. Douglas Pitts has the license number K5-LCR and Odie Killingsworth's license number is W5-ZUQ.

Knob Knockers Hit Store, Post Office

BURGLARS robbed the Northfield post office and Timmons store of between \$250 and \$300 last Wednesday night. The work was believed to be that of professional burglars by the manner in which the safe knob was knocked off to cause the pins to release the door.

The safe was wrecked. It is believed the amount taken from the post office department in the store was \$19.05. Between \$25 and \$35 was taken from a pop machine. The robbers found the keys to the pop machine and opened it without damage. No money orders or checks were taken in the loot.

In their haste the robbers dropped two \$10 bills, a \$1 bill and a dime. The two \$10 bills were found in a check.

Merchandise taken from the store included several cartons of cigarettes, Mrs. Leland Timmons is Northfield postmistress.

The break-in was investigated by Sheriff Jinks Wilson, and deputies S. A. Conway and Ed D. Smith, aided by a postal inspector out of Amarillo.

No report of the Northfield break-in was made to daily newspapers since the Tribune did not receive information of the incident until Monday night.

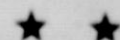

Sorghums Pegged At \$1.93 In Bill

The feed grain legislation, signed into law on March 22 by President Kennedy, has four purposes. They are to increase farm income; prevent further build-up of the feed grain surplus and reduce it if possible; help assure the consumer of fair and stable prices for meat, poultry and dairy products and reduce the ultimate feed grain program costs to taxpayers.

The program is voluntary and applies only to 1961. All field corn and grain sorghum whether for grain, fodder or silage are covered and cooperators are being asked to reduce their 1961 plantings of these crops by at least 20 percent below the 1959-60 average acreage. Voluntary reductions up to 40 percent are encouraged for growers with bases of 100 acres or more. Growers with bases of 25 acres or less may retire the total under the program.

Cooperating farmers will be eligible for support prices of \$1.93 on grain sorghums, \$1.20 on corn, 92¢ per bushel on barley, 62¢ for oats and \$1.02 per bushel for rye. The non-cooperator will not be eligible for price support on any of these crops. His production would have to move at market prices. He cannot depend upon government price support or his neighbor's production adjustment to hold up the market price.

Cooperators, if they choose, may receive payment in the form of negotiable certificates which represent grain from CCC stocks. The Secretary of Agriculture will determine the flow of this grain into market channels.

A cooperator, agrees to reduce by at least 20 percent his grain sorghum or corn acreage for 1961 below his 1959-60 average. The diverted acres must be put to some conservation use. It cannot be harvested or pastured. Weeds, insects and rodents must be controlled on the diverted acreage.

In turn he will receive, in addition to his eligibility for price supports on his grain crops, a payment for each acre diverted to conservation use. The rate of payment for the first 20 percent diverted will be 50 percent of the normal production of the acreage diverted times the county support price. (This price will be announced shortly by county ABC officials). As an additional

incentive, a grower may divert an additional 20 percent and receive a payment rate of 60 percent times the county price per acre diverted.

A grower becomes eligible for advance payment—50 percent of the total—when he signifies his intention of cooperating. This advance payment will help the producer meet his production expenses and is expected to be an important incentive for cooperation.

The program is effective protection in case of crop failure. The payment on diverted acres will be made regardless of weather and is a measure of income insurance as are the higher price supports.

The non-cooperator, will not be eligible for price support on any grain crop and cannot expect to build up his acreage base for future program. It has been emphasized that the U. S. Department of Agriculture will strongly recommend to Congress that any legislation involving establishment of base acreages for production adjustment give no advantage to producers who fail to cooperate in the 1961 feed grain program.

Children Warned In Flying Kites

the construction of a kite. He said it was equally as dangerous to fly model planes in the vicinity of electric wires.

In discussing electrical safety, the power company manager urged parents to use care when they are moving outside television or radio antennas without expert help. He pointed out that WTU servicemen would be glad to advise concerning high voltage lines near homes.

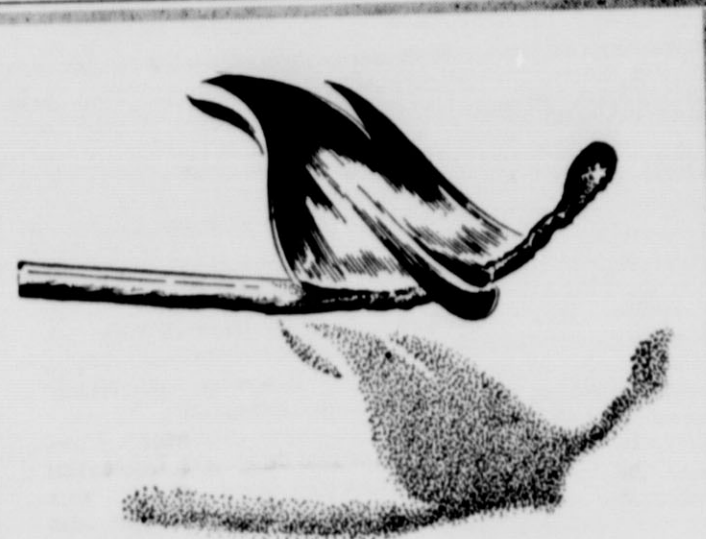
