Tornado Funds Still Available For "Over 60" Victims

As reported in April, a contract between South Plains Association of Government (SPAG) and the city of Matador for \$29,249 was made.

According to Mayor Gary Lancaster, there is still approximately \$18,000 of this fund available to those who qualify.

The purpose of this contract was/is to provide funds to pay for renovation and repair to

homes that were damaged by the May 1, 1984 tornado. The repairs are to be made to homes in which the homeowner is sixty (60) years of age or older, a moderate or low income person and is a resident in that home. The authority of this contract derives from the Older Americans Act of 1965.

Anyone who feels they may qualify is encouraged to apply by August 15th at the City Hall.

Interlibrary Loan Available At Motley County Library

Last year Texas library users requested 225,985 items through Interlibrary Loan, a computerized procedure for borrowing and lending books. This library service utilizes improved computer technology to locate books, magazines, newspaper articles, or answers to factual questions that cannot be supplied by local libraries. By following a pattern of searching first at the closest large library, then in Texas and finally throughout the country, Interlibrary Loan staff can supply almost any informational item.

Funded by the Texas State Library, Interlibrary Loan service absorbs all user fees except those for magazine articles that may need to be photocopied by out-of-state libraries and the postage to return the books. Use Interlibrary Loan. It's fast and it's efficient. Anyone needing more information about this service may call the Motley County Library at 347-2717.

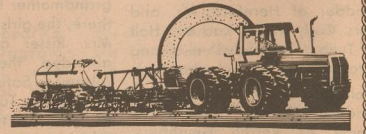

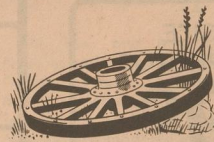

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by this summer's drought and extremely high temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHa) office located in Spur, Texas, FmHa county supervisor Larry J. Clements said today.

Motley County is one of three in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

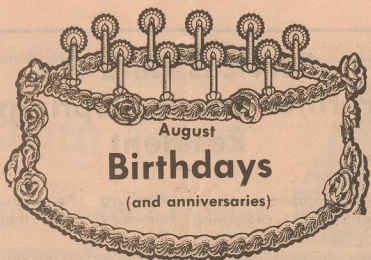
Clements said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrowed is 5 percent; interest rate if 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can obtain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 13.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHa emergency loan, Clements said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 10, 1986, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, Clements said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. Citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Spur, Texas is open from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 and 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Chemical Damage To Cotton Crops

If the Motley County farmers haven't encountered enough problems in 1985 with excessive rain, hail, late planted cotton, dry winds in July evaporating away the moisture and combatting grasshoppers, they have another disaster to add to the list. There has been extensive damage to cotton crops, gardens and fruit trees by the spraying of 2-4D chemical on mesquite trees and weeds around field turn rows.

Steve Jones, USDA agent of Paducah, has been taking soil samples and pictures of crops throughout the county for damage verification.

It is no wonder that studies are showing an increase of stress for farm families.

According to Steve Jones of the USDA office in Paducah, anyone with garden produce concerned about contamination can take their garden goods to Ray Minkley at the County Extension Office. He can send a sample of the produce and have results in three days time and report the condition.
