COUNTY AGENT PALLEYER SAYS:
To assist Motley County farmers in grain selection, a small grain variety demonstration was planted by Alton (Susie) Marshall in the northeast part of Matador on Sept. 28th.

Oat varieties included are: Bronco, Cimarron, New Norx and Norwin.

Barley varieties include: Cordova, Tokak and Will.

Wheat varieties are: Caddo, Improved Triumph, Scout 66, Tascosa and Warrior.

Rye varieties are: Elbon, Elk and Gator. Speltz was also planted.

Purpose of the test is to obtain information on grazing provided and yields. Darrell Marshall assisted with the planting.

All seed except the following were furnished by the Foundation Seed Section of Texas A&M University. Improved Triumph and Warrior wheat, Crown Seed Co., Tulia; Cimarron oats by Glynard and Wayland Moore, Matador; Elk rye by Thompson Feed & Seed, Matador; Tokak barley by Furman Vinson; and speltz by Bundy Hal Campbell.

Farmers in the county are urged to watch this variety test.

It has been cussed and discussed as to what new industrial jobs mean to a community, but the following information has been provided by the Chamber of Commerce for communities to think about.

One hundred new workers means an increase in annual retail sales as follows: Grocery stores - \$72,000; Automobile deal-


ers - \$47,000; Eating and drinking places - \$25,000; Gasoline service station - 24,000; Department stores - \$22,000; Clothing and shoe stores - \$21,000; Lumber, building materials and hardware dealers - \$18,000; Furniture, home furnishings and household appliance stores - \$14,000; and other stores - \$88,000. Grand Total - \$331,000.

In addition, 100 new factory workers bring into a town: More personal income - \$710,000; More retail sales per year - \$331,000; More bank deposits - \$229,000; More people - 359; More households - 100; More passenger cars registered - 97; More school children - 91; More employed in non-manufacturing - 65 and more retail establishments - 3.

Even though it was late in the year when the last case of screwworms was found in Motley county for several years, we can still get a buildup. For this reason, all livestock producers are urged to watch their animals carefully, and if worms are found, submit a sample to the lab in Mission for confirmation.

If worms are found, all livestock in the vicinity should be sprayed to help reduce fly population. As long as screwworms exist to the south of us, we still have the possibility of an outbreak, but when one considers the money and time saved over the screwworm free years, isn't the program worth our 100% support?

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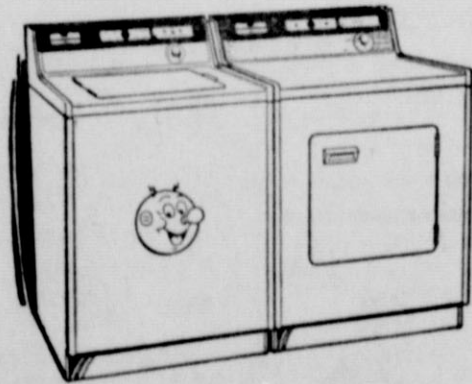

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

TOPIC: WITHHOLDING TAXES

For a number of years the withholding tax system has worked well. Wage earners find that it is a lot easier to pay their tax throughout the year than to try to save enough to make a big payment at the end of the year. Changes such as this year's surtax charge perturb many taxpayers when they think of coming down to April 15 and having to pay additional tax.

While most employers do an excellent job of withholding income and social security taxes for and paying these taxes to Uncle Sam, there is a small group who misunderstand the law.

These employers feel that they are not required to withhold on a student working during the summer, or a housewife who will work at Christmas, since the employee will not earn \$600 and will not be required to file an income tax return. IRS points out that this is wrong, since the housewife would ordinarily be liable for tax on community income here in Texas, and that the student might well have income from other sources that would require him to file and pay taxes—or in either case they could work somewhere else during the year.

The good tax folks advise employers to withhold income and employment taxes in all cases not specifically exempt by one of the few exceptions provided in the law.
