EARL W. OSBORN INJURED BY SHOT

Earl W. Osborn, 46, self-employed Roaring Springs mechanic was reported in fair condition at Stanley Hospital yesterday after suffering a gunshot wound in the chest shortly before noon Tuesday.

Osborn was found about 11:35 a.m. on the floor of a small garage he operated at the rear of his home. Investigating officers said he had obtained a revolver from a friend about 20 minutes earlier.

Hospital attendants said a single bullet went all the way through Osborn's body but missed all vital organs and arteries.

Deputy Sheriff S. A. Conway and Texas Highway Patrolman W. A. Richardson, who investigated, said Osborn had been looking at a .22-caliber revolver for several days and talking to Corby Lee (Corky) Marshall about trading for it.

Tuesday morning, the officers said Osborn told Marshall he would like to try out the pistol. Marshall said that the weapon "hung" while the two were looking at it. However, Osborn left with the pistol.

About 20 minutes later, members of his family found Osborn. A neighbor, Eugene Watson, said Osborn told him, "I just shot myself." The pistol was found a few feet away. Officers discounted any theory of foul play.

Osborn was brought to Stanley Hospital by a Eudy Seale ambulance.

Desegregation Will Be Subject Of Meet In Roaring Springs

Financial problem involved to provide equal educational privileges for (approximately) eight Negro children in the Roaring Springs school district will be the subject of a community meeting in Roaring Springs Saturday night.

The meeting will be held in the school gymnasium, beginning at 8 p.m., it was announced yesterday by M. J. Schofield, superintendent. He urged all residents, tax payers and patrons of the schools to attend. The announcement was made following a meeting of the school board Tuesday night.

Purpose of the meeting Mr. Schofield said, was to decide whether or not to call an election. If the election is called, the voters will decide whether or not to continue the present dual school system, or to change to a single system.
