## FEED GRAIN PLAN YIELD SET HIGH

Average yield has been set at 1220 pounds per acre for Motley County in the government's new feed grain program, it was announced this week by Tommy Moore, ASC office manager.

He said payment rate would vary according to the class of the land, from 80% to 120% of average. County average is about \$11.60 on first 20% and \$14 per acre on second 20%. The limit is 40%.

Sign ups on the program have already started with the deadline being through May 31. Notices have been mailed to growers of acre rates and amount of feed grain base.

Mr. Moore said the farmers of Motley County have been very cooperative since the program was announced and have responded to requests and attended meetings in a sincere effort to become familiar with the plan.

Mrs. King was born Jimmie Jane Hodges, in Indian Territory, Okla., February 9, 1888, and came to Motley County in 1898 from Grayson County with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Hodges. They settled in the Roaring Springs area before the town was organized.

She was married to Tom King, November 11, 1906, in Matador, and had made her home here since that time. For a number of years they were engaged in business as owners of the Texan Cafe here. Mrs. King had suffered arthritis over a period of years and had been receiving treatment for the ailment in Hollis for some time. She died April 20, 1961 at the age of 73 years, 2 months, 11 days.

She is survived by her husband, Tom King, Matador; one daughter, Mrs. Tom Spears, Matador; three sons, Curtis, Matador; Carl, Glasgow, Montana and Leonard, Yuba City, Calif.; one half-brother, Gordon Hodges of Houston; and three grandchildren.

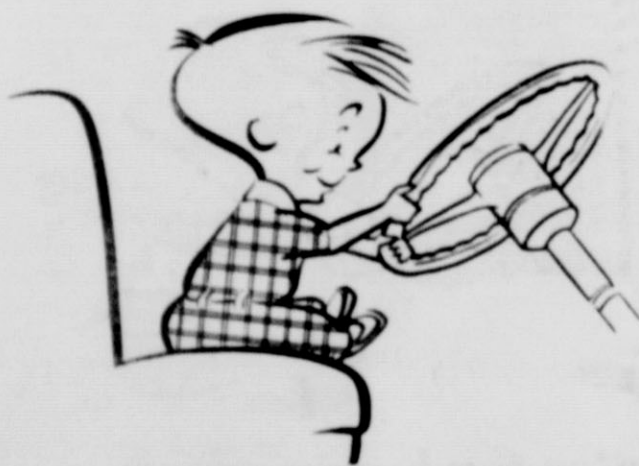
