**Little League has Successful Season**

Matador Little League baseball has completed a successful season both game-wise and financially, according to a report made Tuesday at the Lions Luncheon meeting, by Forrest Campbell.

Scores of the games have been published in the Tribune. The financial statement of the league was distributed by Lion Campbell, who has provided most of the leadership in getting the Little League to functioning.

The report shows that 50 firms and individuals contributed a total of \$652 in gifts from \$2 to \$25. Sale of baseball supporter cards at \$2 each brought in another \$52, and with net profit from concession stand of \$307.54, resulted in total receipts of \$1011.54.

Expenses including \$740.35 worth of equipment and \$82.49 lights, showed a total of \$1023.35, leaving an operating deficit of \$12.81. With \$322.14 added to this for 16 new flood light fixtures, leaves a total indebtedness of \$334.45.

The league, however, has total equipment valued at \$740.35 of which \$505.66 is permanent temporary equipment, to be replaced next season, is \$241.94.

Acting Boss Lion Hoyle said the Lions directors had approved payment of the League's \$334.45 indebtedness.

**Wheat Quota Vote Set For August 24**

Wheat producers will determine whether or not wheat marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1962 wheat crop August 24.

The decision farmers make is extremely important to them and to the rest of the Nation not only for 1962 but also for many years to come," said Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman when he announced the referendum date.

If two-thirds of the referendum voters favor quotas, cooperators will be eligible for full 1962 wheat price support. Although the level of support has not definitely been determined, it will be higher than the present level of \$1.79 per bushel if proposed legislation now before Congress becomes law. At a recent press conference, Secretary Freeman said that the national average support for wheat would likely be in the neighborhood of \$2.00 per bushel.
