## Final Rites for Former Banker Cites Community Service Over Long Period

Final tribute was paid to Elmer C. Stearns, 67, in Memorial services held Saturday at 3 p. m. at the First Baptist Church.

Rev. Miller Robinson, pastor, officiated together with Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister and Rev. Gene Hawkins of Lockney, former Baptist pastor here, who delivered the message.

Service to his community through civic organizations during depression and war years was cited. Mr. Stearns was associated with the First State Bank here from 1920 when he joined the personnel as cashier, until his retirement, January 2, 1958 at which time he held the position of executive vice president.

Under his management the bank achieved an outstanding position among small town banks and has been the only banking institution in the county since 1934.

A veteran of World War I and member of the American Legion, Mr. Stearns served as chairman of war bond drives during World War II. He was a charter member and past president of Matador Lions Club, having served twice in that capacity; a charter member of Khiva Temple at Amarillo; a member of all Matador Masonic bodies, Plainview Commandary and the Dallas Scottish Rite. He had been a member of First Baptist Church here since 1907.

## Celebration Honors Northfield Pioneer

THE PIONEER, B. F. Simpson, intended to stay when he arrived in the Northfield area in the fall of 1896. He filed on some land, built a dugout for his family and stayed. He has been a continuous resident of Northfield for 65 years. He is 90 years of age today. He said Sunday that none of the early settlers remain in Northfield and only a few in Matador, that were in the sparsely-settled county when he arrived.

Sunday the Pioneer was honored in celebration of his birthday by friends and relatives with a dinner at the Northfield school house. The event has been an annual affair for many years but the ranks of pioneer friends has become thinner in recent years. Many have died and others are no longer able to travel.

Problems of the early days have passed but at present Mr. Simpson is worrying about selling his "better than California" peaches which are ripening. "Everytime I bought some sandy land I always planted a peach orchard," Mr. Simpson said. He planted the peaches at his home just east of the Northfield school building, from the seed about 12 years ago. The sweet, yellow fruit is of extremely large variety.

Religious Leader

Deeply religious, Mr. Simpson has been church leader in his community. About ten years ago he built (entirely from his own funds) and equipped the modern Church of Christ church at Northfield.

B. F. Simpson was born August 10, 1871, in Martin County, Missouri. He was four years of age when his parents moved to Texas and settled in Parker County, where he grew to manhood.

His children are Mrs. Claud McDonald, Mrs. Pete Timmons, A. B. Simpson, P. A. Simpson and T. B. (Boon) Simpson. Five generations were present at the birthday celebration Sunday. Mr. Simpson, Mrs. McDonald, his daughter, Mrs. Frank Jameson and daughter, Mrs. Gene Head and her small son, Rodney.

## Weldon Fromm To Get Promotion in Move To Amarillo

Motley County is losing Game Warden Weldon Fromm, effective September 1. He has received a promotion to the office of Conservation Chief or Supervisor over 26 counties in the Amarillo District.

Warden Fromm, who came here from the game warden school six years ago, has been recognized for his outstanding work with the Game and Fish Commission of Texas. He has many friends among the sportsmen and landowners of the county, and both he and his wife have many friends in this community who regret losing them as citizens. They have advertised their modern home for sale.

The state has been divided into five game and fish regions, with four districts in each region. Motley County is now in the Lubbock district which is a part of the San Angelo region.

Frank Ordner of Paducah will serve Motley County (possibly with a trainee) until about June, 1962, when another game warden graduate from the game warden school will be located here. At present the state has approximately 215 game wardens, and is seeking additional personnel.

In a statement to the Tribune Monday, Warden Fromm said: "It is through the cooperation and friendship of the sportsmen and landowners of this county that I have received this promotion for which I am extremely grateful. Both I and my family like Matador very much and regret that the change makes it necessary for us to leave."

## Old Settler Plans Scheduled in Meet

PLANS have already been started for the annual reunion of Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers at Pioneer Park in Roaring Springs, August 24-25 and 26th. A meeting of the directors has been scheduled in the pavilion for Saturday evening at 7:30.

John Stotts, director of the rodeo division, has contracted livestock to be used in the event. He has also placed an order for the program and rodeo rules to be printed. He said this week that he already had requests for the programs.

The amateur rodeo has frequently been declared one of the most outstanding in West Texas and attracts a wider range of fans each season. The program and rules will be substantially the same as last year, with about the same prizes offered, Mr. Stotts said.

Arrangements are not definite but it is assumed that the annual parade will begin at 10 o'clock, Thursday, August 24, followed by memorial services at 11 a. m. at the pavilion. Rodeo and two dances are usually held each of the three evenings.

## Eagles Show Class in Tournament

Matador Eagles baseball club proved themselves one of the classiest teams in the Region 5 tournament of the Texas Teenage Baseball Association held at Munday, Texas, August 3, 4 and 5.

Baird team won the tournament and cost the Eagles their first loss, August 3. The Eagles were suffering somewhat from "tournament jitters."

The Eagles defeated Seymour 22 to 1 on August 4, playing outstanding defensive ball. Four Eagle players, Johnny Pearce, Tim Green, Frank Urias and Robert Cootee each made three hits in the team's 17-hit attack. Gary Campbell and Charles Ezzell contributed two hits each.

In the first homerun ever recorded in the Munday baseball park, the ball cleared the left field fence 320 feet away. Cootee was one of the two Floydada players the Eagles were permitted to add to their club for the playoffs. Other player was Jerry Allen.

Saturday afternoon the Eagles met Ranger in consolation finals, in a game declared one of the best of the tournament. Trailing for six innings the Eagles rallied in the seventh (after two men were out) to take the lead 7-5. Ranger however pulled the game out in their half of the inning to win 8-7. The game was a hard one to lose as the Eagles were left with 12 men on bases, and were the victims of a freak triple play in the fourth when they had the bases loaded with none out.

Pat Green and Jimmy Don Green have done outstanding work with the teenage team. Their season record is 18 games won and only three losses. The Eagles should be equally strong next season as most of the team will be eligible for another year of play.

## Formby Will Make '62 Governor Race

Marshall Formby, Plainview attorney and former state senator and one-time chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, has all but tossed his West Texas hat in the ring for governor of Texas.

Formby said he expects to make formal announcement of his Candidacy in December or January but has written letters to friends over the state recently saying "I am going to make the race for governor in 1962."

## Encouragement Received

"The answers I am receiving by mail, phone calls and telegrams are very encouraging," he said.

"I feel that Texans are ready for new leadership in Austin and some new faces in executive positions. They are wanting new leaders to prepare Texas for the 12 million persons we will have in the state by 1975, maybe sooner," he said.

"New jobs must be created, our agriculture must be expanded, and new industries located in the state. At the same time, economy measures must be effected. There must be some relief for the small businessman (which includes the farmer), and for heavily-taxed homes and businesses."

## Reared At McAdoo

Formby was born in Hopkins County, reared at McAdoo in Dickens County, and first moved to Plainview 20 years ago.

At one time he published the Plainview Tribune. He is co-owner of several West Texas Radio stations, is a farmer and a practicing attorney.

In 1959 he completed a six-year term as member of the Texas Highway Commission, being chairman his last two years.

He was state senator prior to entering military service in World War II. He is a graduate of Texas Tech, where he edited the campus newspaper.

### PIED PINIONS

There's pleasure in meeting new friends and happiness in visiting with old friends and our recent trip east turned out to be a combination of both. New friends were women we met whose husbands were in the same business conferences in Hartford and New York, with Mr. M.

Highlight of our trip was the visit with our old friends, Hattie and P. Y. Springer at their lovely New Jersey farm, which is surrounded by historic memorabilia.

There were Underwood agents from Florida, Arizona, Wisconsin, Colorado, New Jersey, and of course Texas, in the class and several were accompanied by their wives.

Those whom we met included Jane (Mrs. Erling) Hjelsett of Hudson, Wisconsin; Ann (Mrs. James) Knapp of Hackettville, N. J.; and Vi (Mrs. Donald) Nolan of Boulder, Colorado.

While the male contingent was hustled off to class daily, we had three days of browsing about Hartford, the capital of

Connecticut. With our new friends we visited two historic homes which have been restored by the Connecticut Society of the Colonial Dames of America, and the Mark Twain home, now a library and museum.

The oldest restored dwelling open to the public, is the Buttolph-Williams House, built in 1692. While the furnishings are not the original, great care has been taken to duplicate items which were in use at that time. These included wooden dishes, and long-handled cooking utensils, as all cooking was done over an open fireplace.

The second oldest home open to the public is the Webb House, built in 1752 by Joseph Webb, where, in 1781 General George Washington spent five days during the celebrated Yorktown Conference. In the bedroom where he slept, is the original red flocked wallpaper said to be hung in honor of his visit.

This conference between General Washington and Count de Rochambeau resulted in the surrender of the British forces in Yorktown, the final and decisive battle of the Revolutionary War.

Webb House just this year was designated a National Shrine by the Secretary of the Interior. Here one may see fine examples of the work of early Connecticut cabinetmakers, Chinese Export porcelain, English silver, period furniture and early crewel work.

Only one piece of furniture however, is claimed to have belonged to the Webb family. This is a large, ornate hand-carved chest.

The Springers took us on a tour of the countryside in the Allentown and Cream Ridge area where they live.

All the old churches have cemeteries where graves date back to the eighteenth century.

The oldest in that vicinity, the Old Yellowhouse Church was being readied for an annual all-day meeting with dinner-on-the-ground. Services are held here once a year and contributions are used to keep the grounds in condition and the building in repair.

At Tennent we visited the Old

Tennent Church (Presbyterian) which was built in 1751, and is still being used for regular worship services each week. It was here the Battle of Monmouth was fought, June 28, 1778 between the armies of General Washington and General Clinton. Surrounding the church is the cemetery, also still used, which contains the graves of British and American soldiers who had died in the battle.

We had the added pleasure of a brief visit with the Springers daughter and family, Sarah and Gus Walldow and children, Alhson and Andy, and with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gustav Walldow, who live in Tennent, and who accompanied us to Asbury Park for a seafood dinner and strolling along the boardwalk on the shores of the Atlantic Ocean.

The moon was a golden apple, and the restless waves rolled petulantly in, as if protesting against the intrusion of Man.

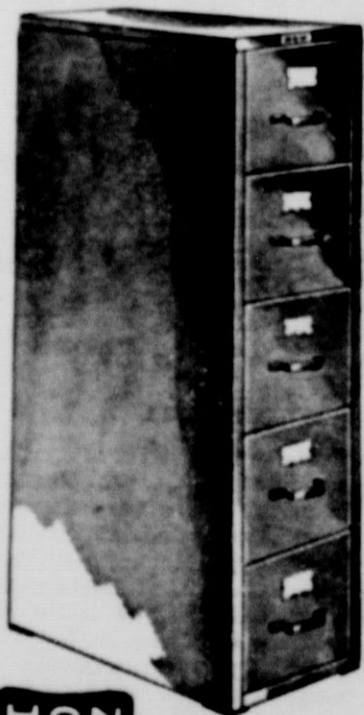

## Former Matador Resident "Honest John" Missleman

A former Matador resident, Thomas E. Jameson, is now project manager at White Sands Missile Range. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Jameson of Carlsbad, N. M. and nephew of local residents, Misses Roberta and Ona Jameson and Mrs. Jim Ratcliff. The following feature appeared recently in Carlsbad, N. M., Argus-News.

For a missileman like Thomas E. Jameson, former Carlsbad resident, the aerial spectacle of a rocket launching does not end when the "bird" fades from sight — there's ever tomorrow with quests for greater possibilities; new tests, evaluations and statistical reports.

A one-time mathematics instructor at Carlsbad High School Jameson is now project manager for the "Honest John," the U. S. Army's surface-to-surface unguided missile, which has been under tests at White Sands Missile Range since 1951.

Due to its mobility, reliability and simplicity of operation, the Honest John is an effective artillery weapon. The rocket, with its 27-foot body, solid propellant motor and range in excess of 15 miles, has been operational for several years.

Liaison and Coordinator  
As manager for the dependable Honest John, Jameson serves as liaison and coordinator for the system; directs activities connected with testing and evaluation; provides information on the capabilities of the system, and makes recommendations for improvements towards providing the best weapon possible for the army's men in the field.

In day-to-day activities, Jameson and four employes under his supervision devise test plans and programs for evaluating the system, compile various evaluation reports, and prepare budget estimates for overall project activities.

The 34 year old missileman, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Jameson, 505 N. Lake St., and a 1943 graduate of Carlsbad High School, came to the missile range in 1951 from Cheyenne, Wyo., where he was an instructor in a technical training school at Francis E. Warren Air Force Base.

He has some 12 years in government service including two years in the Navy during which time he studied as radio technician and was stationed in San Diego, Chicago and Washington, D. C.

Former Math Teacher  
Prior to entering the missile field, he was a high school math teacher at CHS, an instructor in a service technical school and guide with the National Park Service at the Caverns.

He holds a bachelor of arts degree in mathematics from Haverford College, Haverford, Pa., and is a member of the American Ordnance Assn.
