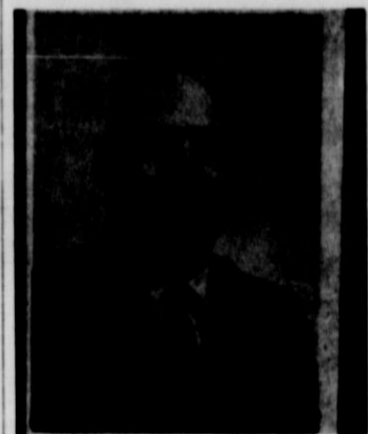

TV TOWER SHUT OFF

Service was shut off the television tower in the Foothills west of Matador, Monday. Closures of the service will be permanent according to Bob Tipps of Canadian, manager of the station unless at least 40 new customers are willing to sign up to pay.

This would be in addition to the customers who have been paying for the service. Tipps said that unless there is a movement to secure the additional needed customers, the tower will probably be dismantled and removed. He said there would be no rate raise.

In addition to the many rural families who are denied television, it is pointed out that many old people who have no other entertainment are being denied the service. Mr. Tipps said that all paying customers who have paid in advance, will be refunded the unused portion of the charges, if the shutdown is continued.

Anyone who desires a continuation of the service should write a letter immediately to Bob Tipps, in care of the First State Bank in Matador. The letter should contain a statement of willingness to pay regular monthly charges.

Motley County Oil Vital to Economy

Motley County oil and gas wells pumped some \$1.1 million into the county's economy last year, according to a study just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Value of production from oil wells was \$1.1 million and from natural-gas wells \$5,000, based on the most recent U. S. Bureau of Mines figures compiled by the Association. The county ranked 165th in the state in value of production.

"Output from Motley County is part of this country's domestic oil supply which is endangered by some of the proposals now before Congress," commented Corbin J. Robertson, Association president. "Attempts to destroy percentage depletion provisions of our income tax laws and to nullify present con-

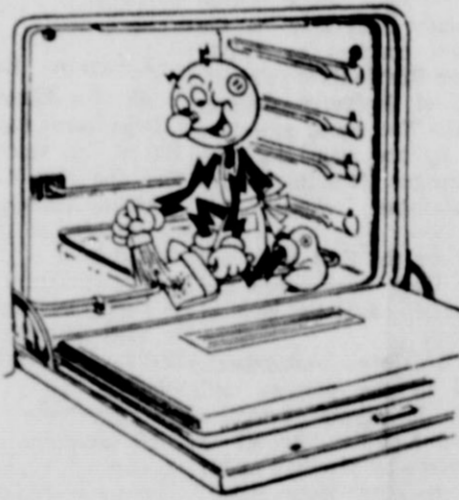

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association of Gorman, Texas proposes a referendum election on September 24, 1969, under provisions of House Bill 764, 61st Legislature on the proposition of whether or not peanut producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of \$1.00 per net ton (farmers stock basis) to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members for a 9-man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of peanuts.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced peanuts for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referen-
