Matadors Lose in Regional Classic

ON THE TRAIL of their first regional victory, the Throckmorton Greyhounds Thanksgiving afternoon freed the Matador Matadors 34-28. The Matadors started scoring when the game began and held early leads of 14-0 and 22-8, but the 'Hounds came back to a 28-22 advantage. The Matadors tied the score again but the Greyhounds scored with 1:27 left in the game, to grab the win.

On the ground the Matadors dominated 274 yards to 52. The Greyhounds, however, went overhead for 325 yards to the Matadors' 66, which included two touchdowns. The Matadors were out in front with first downs by a 23-13 margin.

Quarterback Gary Lancaster was the leading Matador rusher and most of the offensive show. His opposite number, Corkey Boland, was the Greyhound's chief threat with his accurate passing mostly to end Pete Hitch. He caught three scoring passes and gained a total of 244 yards on six grabs.

The Matadors marched 71 yards to score when they first held the ball. After going on the ground nearly the entire distance, Lancaster tossed a 9-yard TD pass to left end Robert Brown, with 4:52 left in the quarter.

The second scoring drive covered 68 yards and ended when Lancaster connected with fullback Ros Bearden on a 52-yard scoring pass. Lancaster went around right end for a 14-0 lead with 1:20 to go in the first quarter.

Throckmorton took the kickoff and went 59 yards to score with 10:59 remaining in the second quarter. Fullback Larry Rankin went over from one yard.

Completely New Mercury Meteor Scheduled Here

A Matador automobile dealership, the Matador Auto Company, has been appointed to sell the Mercury Meteor, a completely new-sized car which is now on display.

The Mercury Meteor will be unveiled across the country on Thursday, Nov. 30 at about 2,000 dealerships in the Lincoln-Mercury organization. Its introduction will climax the auto industry's fall showings of the 1962 models.

The Meteor is regarded by the Lincoln-Mercury Division as a balance between big cars. Compared to its companions in the Mercury line, the Meteor is nine inches longer than the Comet and nearly a foot shorter than the Monterey.

In appearance, the Meteor emphasizes clean-lined styling. The car, which is built with a unitized body, incorporates features designed to reduce maintenance costs.

The new Meteor will be offered in four body styles—two- and four-door sedans in both a standard and custom series.
