Two Boys Win In Cotton Contest

Two Motley County boys, Bert Green of Roaring Springs and Pete Chambliss of Matador, have been named district winners in two 4-H cotton awards contests, with their records now in competition for state honors.

Green's record is entered in the Extension Service 4-H cotton program, with the winner to receive a \$3,600 college scholarship.

Chambliss' record is entered in the Cotton Ginners Association 4-H awards program, and the state winner will receive \$100. The district winner will receive \$10.

The cotton program gives boys with crops a chance to enter competition, and the awards help stimulate cotton demonstrations designed to improve methods of production, and to produce better cotton for the market.

Chambliss is the second Motley County boy to win district in the ginners contest. George Reed of Flomot was district winner in 1957. Previous winners in the Extension Service contest are Boyd Long, Roaring Springs, and Leo Reed, Flomot.

FIRE DESTROYS WIDOW'S HOME

Fire destroyed the home of Mrs. Bobby Lou Thompson, a widow, shortly before noon Tuesday. The home, which was located in the same block as the Matador colored school in the northeast area of town, was a total loss.

Poll Taxes Gain Here

Voting strength has increased by 90 over the last election year (1958). Poll taxes paid and exemptions issued totalled 910 late Saturday when the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor & Collector Jinks Wilson closed.

Two years ago (1957) poll taxes paid to vote in 1958; total of poll taxes and exemptions was \$20. During the 1958 primary County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan received the largest vote, a county total of 1012, which would indicate approximately 200 "overs" who are exempt. On the same basis the county should poll more than 1100 votes in this year's elections, if the full voting strength is exercised.

Some observers are puzzled at the increased number of poll taxes paid (\$82 as compared with 799) since no particular exciting races are indicated on the political screen. The fact that 1960 is a presidential election year is believed to be partly responsible for the increase.

New Candidate

Area politics sputtered to new interest at the last moment with the information that Roy L. Taylor, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. "Doc" Taylor of Matador and a student at Texas University, has filed as a candidate for the office of State Representative for the 88th District of Texas.

The office is now held by Will Ehrie of Childress.

Taylor's announcement will appear in a future issue of the Tribune.

Estimate 5 Million Texas Cars, Trucks

Texas is expected to register in the neighborhood of five million motor vehicles in 1960, according to State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer. He said that 4.7 million motor vehicles were registered in 1959.

Greer urged Texas vehicle owners to register early (Deadline is April 1). He also stressed the importance of registering all automobiles and trucks in the home county of the vehicle owner.

"Take your certificate of title and your last year's registration receipt to the tax collector in your home county. Penalty for improper registration of a vehicle can be as much as \$200. Don't risk an illegal registration. Remember, too, that a portion of all registration fees stays in your home county to benefit your local community," Greer said.
